ing buds. Older larvae are green -1te If larvae numbers are high enough If larrave numbers are high enough
to reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should
give control. Treatments should be give contro. Treatments should be
applied in alfalfa two to six inches tall when two or more larvae are found per plant or when 30 to 50 percent of the plant terminals show weevil

## or more weevil larvae per square foot are present. Several edfective for

 are present. Several effective in-secticides are registered for alfalf weevil control.

The alfalfa. weevil has only one generation per year and is only a pest
of first cutting, said Gooch. After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid May in our area, the larva spins a net-like cocoon on the plant or in the
soil debris. soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves
the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa all summer and re-enter them in the fall. The adults overwinter in the field and the cycle then repeats.
