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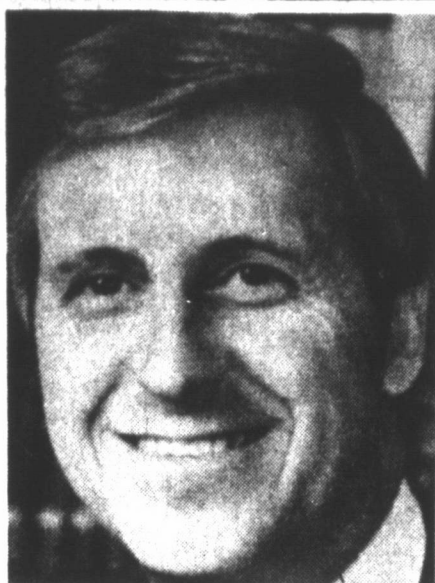

CISD to sponsor for parents only nights

When the family is home in the evening, some topics of discussion include who's turn is it to do the dishes, who forgot to fill the car up with gas, and perhaps the need to buy new tires for the teen-agers car.

These topics are fairly common in most families. However other problems seem to consume other families such as teens staying out too late and smelling of alcohol when they do come home; periods of deep depression where the child stays by himself too often and too long or perhaps the child's friends who seem to be doing all the wrong things.

To address these problems, the Clarendon Independent School District is sponsoring For Parents Only: Coping with Current Social Concerns. This program will be divided into two separate sessions, one presented to parents of elementary and junior high students May 1st, and to parents of high school students May 8th. The sessions will begin at 7:00 each night with one

hour programs given by representatives from such organizations as Suicide Prevention and Crisis Intervention, Catholic Family Service, Panhandle Planned Parenthood, and the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism.

A certified private applicator can use or supervise the use of any pesticide that is classified for restricted use for producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer.

First Bank & Trust to display Texas flags

Representative of the most important moments in our state's history, moments of the Texas spirit and gifts grand enough for The Prince of Wales...all of these describe the historic flags of Texas which will be displayed at a special reception at the First Bank & Trust of Clarendon, April 18, from 6:30 to 9:00 p.m.

In celebration of beginning its 75th year of service to Clarendon and the Panhandle area, and of the Texas Sesquicentennial the bank has purchased these ten limited edition replicas as their gift to the people of the Panhandle for their enjoyment and education.

"We're proud to have this set of historic flags," said Bronnie McNabb, president of the bank "This is our gift to the community and our area. We want these flags to be used as exhibits in libraries, schools and museums for many years to come."

The flags, which have been carefully researched the faithfully re-created, are entirely handmade from pure silks and cottons that match the fabrics used 150 years ago.

Only 950 sets of these flags will be produced and because they are considered so rare and rich in heritage a set was presented to Prince Charles during his recent visit to Texas.

Each flag on display is framed and has a descriptive plaque giving the history behind it.

This historical collection includes replicas of The Alamo Flag, the first Lone Star Flag and the First Flag of the Republic. Also included is the San Jacinto Flag. This flag was carried into battle by Sam Houston and his men when they declared victory over Santa Anna. The attack began with the cry "Remember the Alamo" and ended less than 20 minutes later. The original of this

flag is the only original of the ten flags to survive those historic times. The original San Jacinto flag is now hanging in the State Capitol in Austin.

The flags are the brainchild of Ted Pearsall, Director of The Gallery of the Republic, in Austin.

Pearsall thought up the idea of researching, reproducing and selling the flags two years ago. He thought the flags would give Texans a focal point and would help spark interest in learning more about Texas.

"Sets of these flags will be used as rotating exhibits throughout schools

in Texas for decades, not just during the Sesquicentennial," Pearsall said.

Currently, First Bank & Trust has the only set of these flags for public display in the Texas Panhandle. Following the 18th the flags will be on display during regular bank hours for the community to enjoy.

The Clarendon Bronco boys track team won their fourth straight track meet Saturday at Levelland. The meet was very tough as the winning Broncos scored a total of 72 points.

Once again several of the boys improved on their times. Clay Sharp got the only first places the Broncos could get. Sharp won the 1600 meter run and the 3200 meter run. His times were 10:26.65 and 4:49.48.

VICTORY TO A TEENAGER

The Lord has promised to all believers victory over sin, the flesh, and the Devil, yet many Christian young people do not experience the overcoming power available to them. There are many areas where young people are defeated in their Christian life, but I believe the following three to be the most common.

Priorities. If you will get your priorities in their proper order, you will have won half the battle. Of course, the number one priority is to have been born again by faith in Jesus Christ. Before anyone can ever attempt to live in accordance with God's laws, he must first know Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour. Thank God, one can know his sins are forgiven and that he is going to Heaven (1 John 5:12,13)!

After you have been saved, you must develop that close personal relationship with Christ that can only be experienced as we "Abide in Christ" (John 15). The desire for every believer, young or old, ought to be, "That I may know Him..."

Third, one should strive to love, honor and obey his parents (Eph. 6). You cannot be right with God if you are not right with your parents! Some teenagers think they can bypass their parents in obedience and still be in fellowship with Christ.

An impossibility! God has given to you young people parents to protect you and to train you.

Fourth, a Christian teenager should desire to work for the Lord Jesus during and throughout your teen years. Serving Christ through

your local church and your youth group is your opportunity to be used of the Lord while you are still young.

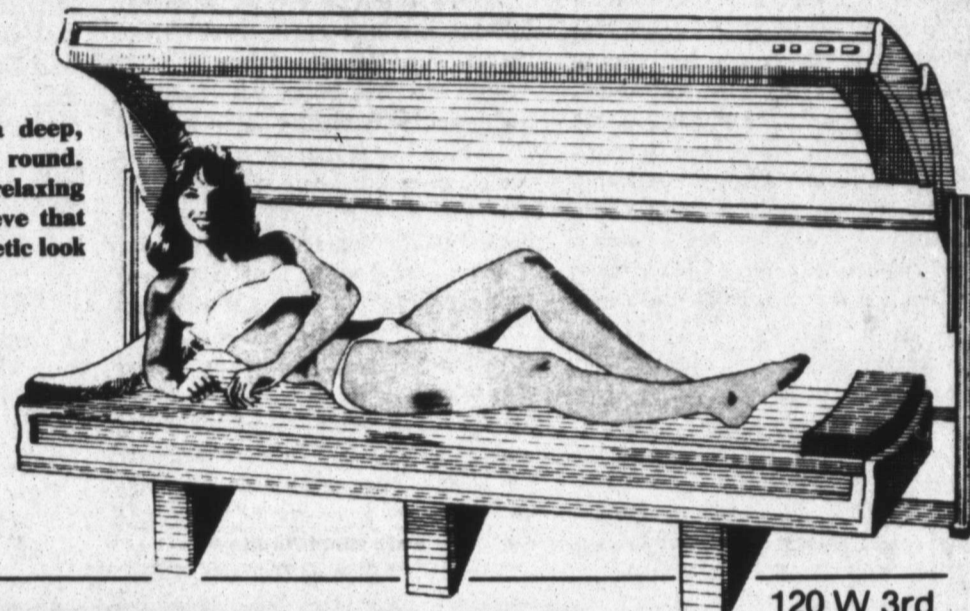

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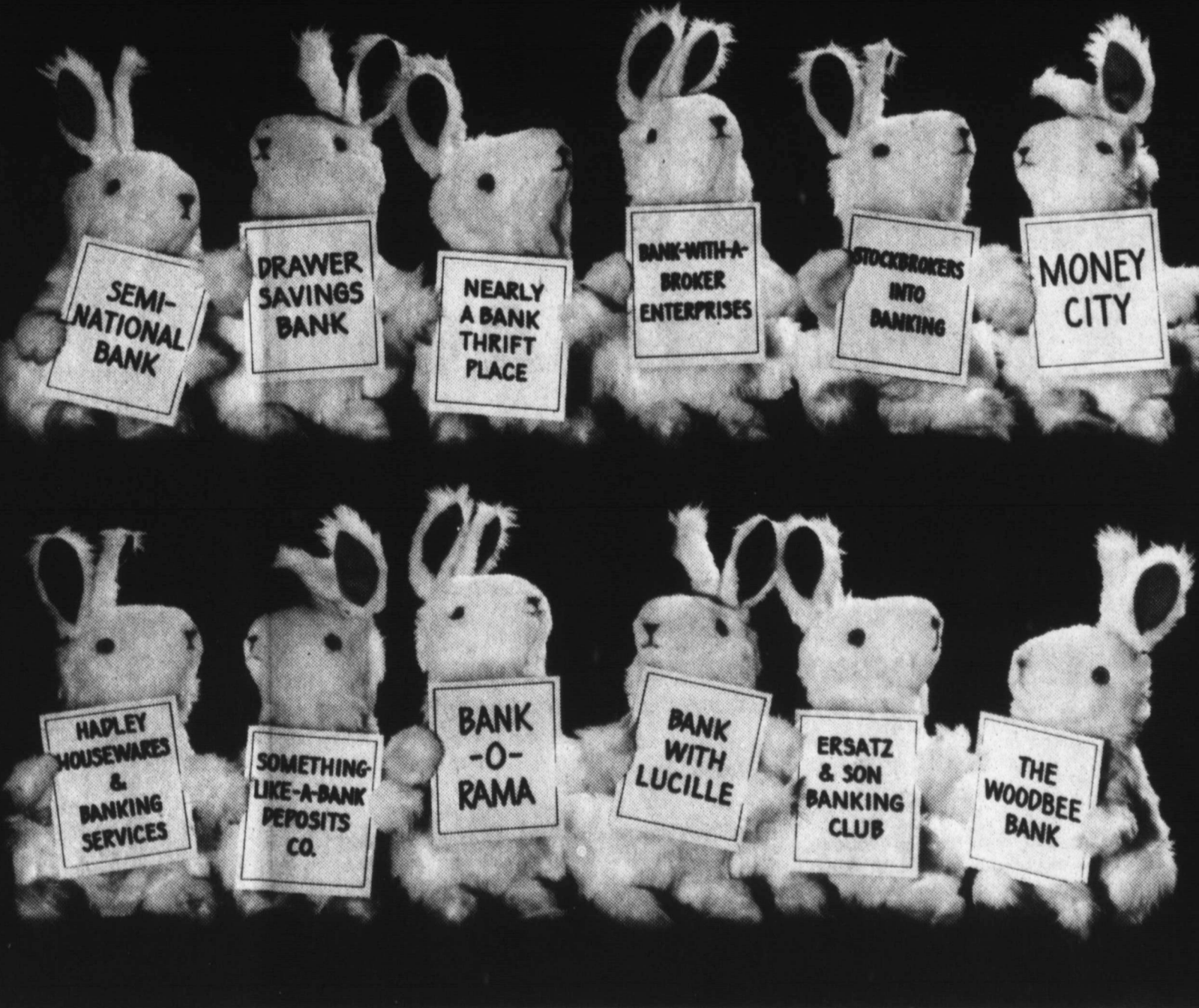

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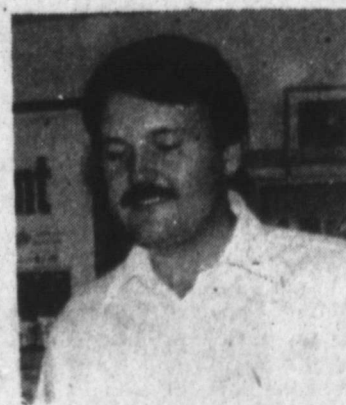
There are alternatives to shaving, plucking, bleaching, and waxing unwanted hair. Many women, and a few men, have found that depilatory creams and lotions quickly and safely remove hair without burning or skin damage.

With depilatories, the hair is essentially dissolved by a chemical that breaks apart the molecules in the hair. After five to 15 minutes of application, hair can be wiped or rubbed from the skin. Hair is removed beneath the hairline, and when it begins to grow back will not have bristly ends.

Most products available commercially contain chemicals called thioglycolates. According to the American Pharmaceutical Association [in their publication, "Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs"], such products seldom cause skin reactions. The small amount of irritation that may occur can be relieved promptly with application of dilute hydrocortisone cream.

Electrolysis is yet another hair removal alternative. An electronic instrument is used to damage the hair root. Hair growth does not reoccur. This technique is especially good for permanent removal of small patches of hair.

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


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WTU to refund more than \$9 million

West Texas Utilities Co. has received permission from the Public Utility Commission of Texas to refund more than \$9 million in over-collected fuel costs to its retail customers.

The PUC's action was in response to a request filed March 17 by WTU. The total amount to be refunded includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel costs savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in interest.

The refunds will be made through one-time credits on bills customers will receive in May. The typical customer should receive about \$22.

Also approved was WTU's proposal to reduce its fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quar-

terly Fixed Fuel Factor, for the three-month period beginning in May. WTU officials estimate that fuel charges to customers will drop by 8.2 percent during that period. Base rates for kilowatt-hours used have not changed since 1984 and will remain the same.

WTU's fuel costs have declined for two years in a row, largely due to a softening natural gas market. Utility companies are allowed to pass the fuel costs to customers. Adjustments for over-collections or under-collections formerly were made automatically each month, but since 1983 utilities in Texas have collected fuel costs through fixed factors, which have necessitated refunds. This will be WTU's second refund within a year.

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteer-to-patient relationship," added Henson. "We have many volunteers who are themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Henson cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate the name to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

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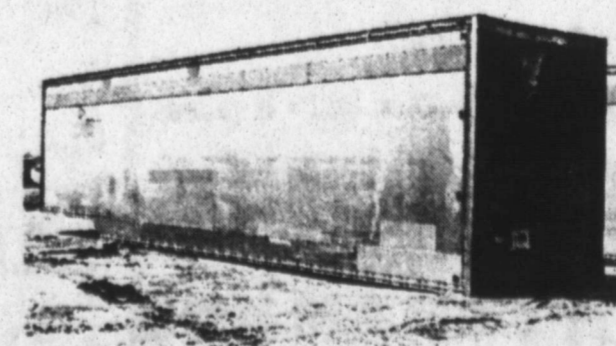

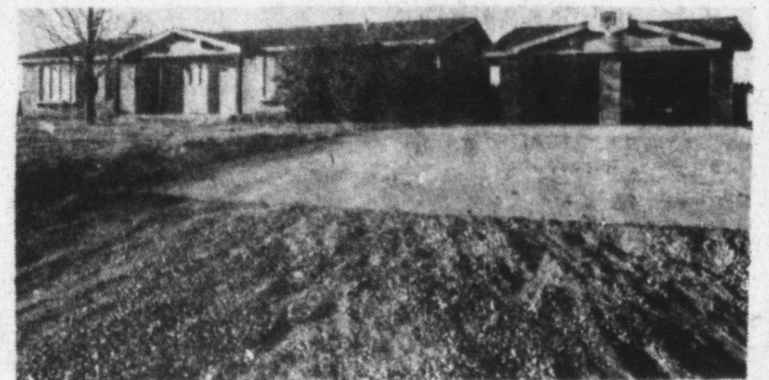
