GTE to install fiber optic cable

Jerry West, Memphis Operations Manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, announced the beginning of a major service improvement project for GTE customers in Memphis, Hedley, Clarendon, Groom and Panhandle, Texas. The service improvement, scheduled to begin the middle of April and complete in later October, involves the placement of over 90 miles of fiber optic cable.

The cable will be installed by a special six-person crew trained in the placement of the highly sensitive fiber optic cable. The crews will be operating specialized machinery designed specifically to plow the cable 48 inches deep. The cable will be placed along Highway 256 from Memphis to Clarendon, along Highway 70 from Clarendon to Interstate 40, then over to Groom and to Panhandle, making this one of the longest fiber optic routes in the Texas panhandle area.

West stated, "A single fiber optic cable measures about one-thousandth of an inch in diameter, which is about the thickness of a human hair. Four of these hair-like cable wires will be running through the underground system. Since these fibers

are like hair, the process is extremely difficult."

"Fiber optics is helping us solve some of the problems related to the expanding communication needs of our customers while we try to maintain our stance as a low cost provider of quality service," West added. "The optical fiber can carry over two thousand telephone calls, date messages, graphic materials and television pictures, meeting a variety of demands from both our business and residential customers. In fiber optics, normal speech signals are changed into light pulses and then sent through the fiber. If you wanted to send data from a complete set of encyclopedias using this process, it would take only a few seconds."

"Another major improvement with fiber optic cable is that unlike metal cable, it is less likely to be adversely affected by lightning or noise on the line, and it provides customers with a higher level of privacy."

West concluded, "The transmission of both voice and data will be greatly enhanced by the use of fiber optics. We at GTE are working today for the customers' communications need of tomorrow."

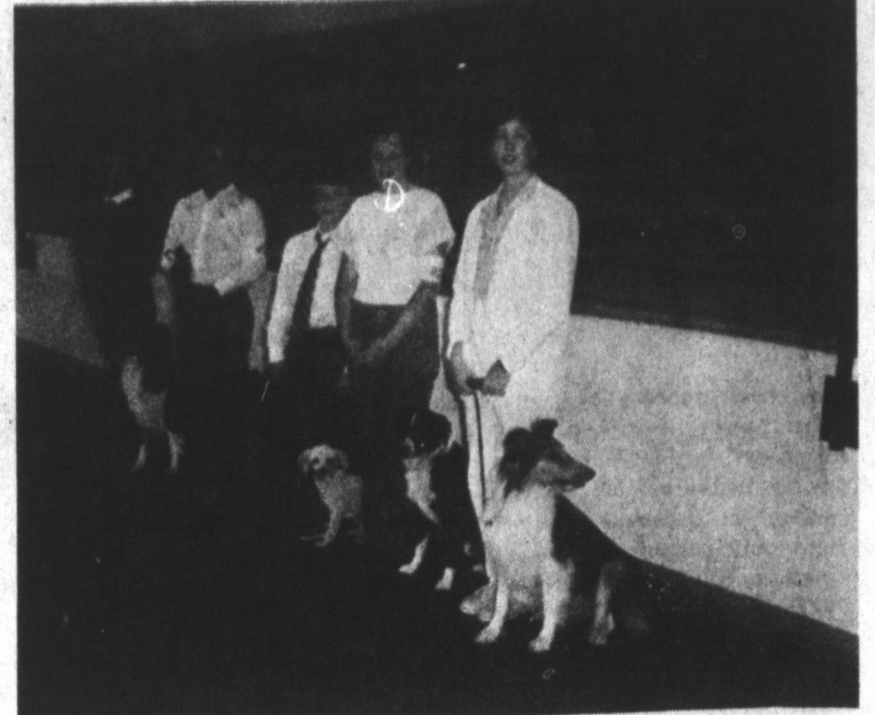

Topper receives top of show award

Two area residents and a Texan claimed top honors at the 1986 annual University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma Student Art, judged late last week by professional Oklahoma City artist Bob Blair.

The show will officially open Friday, April 11 in the Davis Hall Art Gallery, located on the third floor. An open house is scheduled from 4-8 p.m. that day and the public is invited to view more than 200 pieces of art by USAO students and enjoy refreshments. There is no admission charge and the show will remain on display through April 18.

A pencil drawing by Jeff Berry, originally of Moore and now a Chickasha resident, a color pencil portrait by Lindsay resident Beverly Caldwell and an oil painting by Jeff Topper of Clarendon claimed "Top of

Show" awards. Each of the artists were awarded a \$100 scholarship, provided through the USAO Foundation, Art Fund.

Three other pieces of art were awarded \$50 cash prizes, with Topper receiving one of those for a pencil drawing. Also receiving \$50 each were Dan Hazel of Lindsay for a porcelain ceramic piece, and Kathy Peters, Oklahoma City, for a photograph entry.

The entries drew raves from professional artist Bob Blair, who said it was a difficult show to judge and "trying to choose three top awards and three seconds was tougher." He added, "I hope all of you continue to do such good work, and from the atmosphere of the arts area and student interest, you certainly will."

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I read in Monday's Amarillo paper that State Representative David Hudson is "puzzled by the strong reactions from teachers" about the TECAT since he found it rather easy. Apparently, Rep. Hudson suffers from an inability to read or to listen with adequate comprehension.

We teachers have repeatedly written or spoken with legislators saying that it is not the difficulty of the test that is at issue. The issue is whether it is legal under the Texas Constitution to have ex post facto law regarding teacher certification.

We believe constitutional rights are being abused. We worry that further abuse might occur. We also believe that Texas tax payers have been burdened with the enormous expense of the TECAT, variously estimated between 4.5 and 17 million dollars, in order to promote the "do-good" egos of a governor and his cronies.

For several months we teachers hoped that the State Board of

Education would rectify what seems to us to be a mistake. When it became apparent that no one was going to lead the fight for constitutional rights for us, we decided that we had to speak out.

Now, if Rep. Hudson and the other members of the Texas Legislature will sharpen their reading and listening skills and put aside politics long enough to consider the harm and potential danger of ex post facto law, I hope they might better understand what has teachers upset.

From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



America would be hard-pressed to locate many genuine followers of Christ, reports George Barna of the American Resource Bureau. Many of the 50 million self-professed Christians are profoundly secularized: only occasionally do they respond in a uniquely Christian manner.

While we do not enjoy hearing these reports, as Christian leaders we must be informed ourselves in order to equip church members for battling against the current to ultimate victory.

SECULAR VALUES

The percent of believers with materialistic values is the same as the percent of non-believers with similar views! In other words, Christianity is having limited effect in setting the material values of believers.

Hedonistic attitudes are found in seven of ten people who claim to be Christians. Two of five Christians felt that "a person is free to do what pleases him, as long as it does not hurt others."

Regarding materialism, more than half "never have enough money to buy what they need (want)." One of four believers claims that "the more things you have, the more successful you've been."

Barna concludes that too few professed Christians in America avoid the entanglements of materialism and hedonism.

MORAL STRUGGLES

Our society is becoming steadily more secular, and believers are not sufficiently armed for the moral battles that obviously lie ahead.

X-rated cable TV with sexually explicit programming is wired into 23 percent of those Christian households on cable.

Divorce is just as likely among professed believers as among non-believers. In 1983 there were ten million "born-again" people (20%) who had been divorced. Worse still, Christians agreed with non-Christians - 61% to 69% respectively - that divorce is an acceptable solution, if the couple has tried to work it out and failed.

Moral revolution has led to a do your own thing philosophy. Effect: Two of five professed Christians argue that there is no right or wrong side to abortion. The consensus in 1966 was that abortion was murder; there were only 5,000 legal abortions that year. In 1983 more than 1,500,000 abortions were performed!

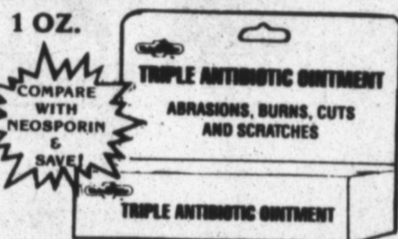
SPIRITUAL COMMITMENT

In an average week, the typical professed Christian spends only 68 minutes reading the Bible - a very low priority. Many read little or none at all. The effect is a dramatic lack of Bible knowledge.

George Gallup, Jr., discovered that less than half of those "born again" could list five of the Ten Commandments. Only three of five could recall the names of the first four books of the New Testament.
