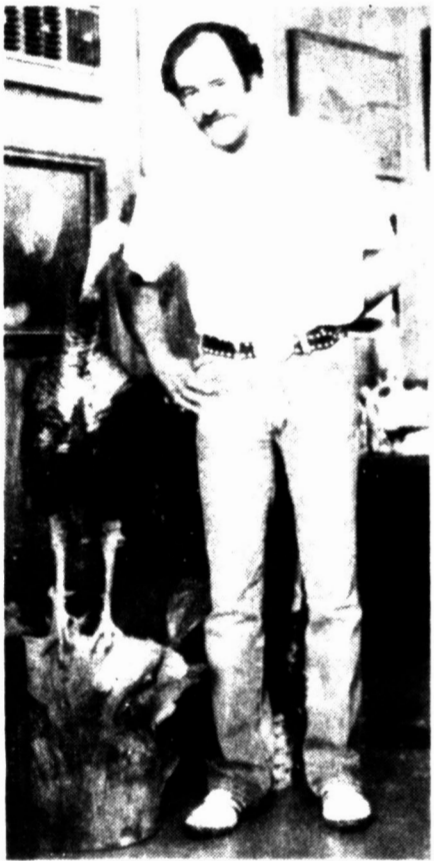
You Are Invited to Attend Church

Goldston Reunion Held July 15

All highways and byways seemed to have led to Clarendon over the weekend of July 15th. Over 175 residents, former residents and friends convened for the first reunion of the old Goldston Community. They converged from all over Texas, from Sunray to McAllen, and from Del Rio to Ft. Worth, and from the six states of Arkansas, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, South Dakota and California.

The Jack Pegrams from Ft. Worth were the first to the Community Center. They came by on Friday afternoon as the workers were preparing for the big day. They "just wanted to snoop around and see if there was anybody around that they knew". They were delighted to find there was. Hildon Simmons came from Santa Fe, New Mexico. He came early and stayed late--visiting with relatives and fishing with his old buddies, Herman and Bill Mooring. He stated that "he intended to hike all over the place out there", and he did. Walter and Wilma Smith Bible, from Borger, were the first eager registrants followed by Bonnie Rowe Christenson of Dallas, South Dakota. Her sister, Alice Rowe Hood of Amarillo came with her, sporting a beautiful decorated cake that said, Happiness is Goldston Togetherness".

Chairman of the reunion, Ed Reynolds from Amarillo, thanked several who helped to organize the function. They were: Charlene Owens Reynolds, Doyle and Cora Littlefield, T.G. and Pauline Reynolds McAnear, Lorene Reynolds McAnear and Naoma Mooring Spann. He then introduced Houston McDonald from Madill, Oklahoma, who gave the blessing. McDonald was a long-timed resident and former Sunday School superintendent.

There was an abundance of food--so much so that a re-assembled group met and ate again at five o'clock. Lemonade, tea, cookies and cakes were served about 3 o'clock courtesy of Cora Littlefield, Charlene Reynolds, Naoma Spann, Anita Mooring and Juanita Mooring Dickenson of Midland.

The attending teachers were especially recognized--Lola Maness Seago taught from 1929 through 1934. Lola now lives in Waco. Gladys Noble Seago, also from Waco., taught from 1930-1933. Nova Cook Little from Pampa taught from 1937-1940. Nova Had the largest representation of former students in attendance.

Lopez Hauck came from McLean and taught from 1948-49.

Special recognition was given to Maybell Elmore of Clarendon. Maybell is the granddaughter of the namesake of the community, J.J. "Uncle Jack" Goldston, who settled there in 1900.

Mrs. Tennie Smith of Clarendon, widow of Bert Smith, co-owner and operator of the biggest (and only) industry of the community, the Smith Brothers Gin Company was honored.

Traveling the farthest distance was Mrs. Jack Harris from Ventura, California.

Beautiful, 92 year old Irene Veazy stole the show and took the honor of the oldest.

These four honorees were each presented with a miniature cotton ball with the words Goldston Reunion, 1989 inscribed on it.

Reynolds honored the memory of the hot-shot Red River Valley baseball team of the 1930's. The remembered team was composed of Buck Parker, Edd Mooring, Lacy Noble, Roy Blackman, Perry Seago, Nelson Seago, "Schugg" Noble. Lacy Noble was the only team member there. Roy Blackman lives at the Medical Center in Clarendon. Lula Mae Parker from Memphis represented her deceased husband, Buck. Daughter Jimmie Nell Shoup from George West and daughter-in-law, Billie Parker from Memphis were also there. Bill, Herman, Juanita Dickenson (Midland), Naoma Spann and Genella Eads represented their Dad, Edd Mooring. Gladys Noble Seago, living in Waco, was unable to attend but was represented by his wife Lola.

The heritage and the love of baseball in the Goldston community was strong. The Caprock League was organized after World War II and the Clarendon and Hedley teams were well represented by residents and former residents. Members of that team who were in attendance were Ed Reynolds, Junior Spier, "Skinny" Putman, Junior Putman, and Bill and Herm Mooring.

The day will long be remembered. This letter was received from Jimmie Nell Parker Shoup of George West: "...tell each person involved in the work of getting the reunion together how much I appreciate all that was done... it sure brought back some good memories of good times we used to have. Most of the conversations started like, 'do you remember when?'...I sure hope we have another".

Agricultural News

Cotton insects are beginning to build up in cotton fields throughout the county. Boll weevils, fleahoppers and bollworms, have been noticed in some fields in light to moderate numbers. Beneficial insect numbers have also been good in most fields. Cotton is at varying stages throughout the county but most of the fields are squaring and some should be starting to bloom. Now is the time producers should be checking the fields closely for insect problems.

The Donley County Extension Service has invited Extension Cotton Entomologist Emory Boring III down on Friday, July 28, 1989, to assist producers in learning how to check fields and identify insects. Producers interested in attending the Cotton Insect Field Meeting should meet at the Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake at 10:00 a.m. Different fields in the county will be toured by participants to determine insect problems and solutions.

Although boll weevil numbers seem to be dropping off, flea hopper numbers could, and likely will, increase in the next several weeks.

The cotton fleahopper can be a cotton pest, or a cotton beneficial insect, depending on the field conditions. Early in the spring, fleahoppers build up large numbers on alternate weed hosts. As these hosts mature and become less succulent, the fleahopper searches for more preferred hosts such as cotton. The cotton fleahopper feeds on anthers of small squares and sucks sap from leaf buds. This feeding causes squares to die and turn brown, resulting in a "blasted"

appearance. When fleahoppers are abundant, heavy fruit loss may occur on preflowering plants.

Although the cotton fleahopper is considered an important cotton pest, it also should be considered a predator. The flea hopper will feed on bollworm or tobacco budworm eggs. Under the right field conditions the fleahopper may eat about one bollworm or tobacco budworm egg per day. Since fleahoppers generally are considered pests only on preflowering cotton, they might be considered beneficial after flowering. Both adults and nymphs are predaceous but also serve as food for many other predators.

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Obituary

Charlie Russell Prickett

Charlie Russell Prickett, 69, of Howardwick, died Wednesday, July 19, 1989. Burial was in the Citizens Cemetery, Clarendon, Texas, July 21, 1989, under the direction of Robertsons Funeral Home of Clarendon.

Mr. Prickett was born in Lockney, Texas, May 9, 1920. He married Jettie O'nita Ray, March 5, 1956 in Clovis, New Mexico. He moved to Panhandle, Texas in 1964, where he was engaged in ranching and farming until he retired in 1979. He moved to Howardwick that year and resided there until his death. He was preceded in death by one step-son, Ronald Eugene Bellah, who died in October 1964, while serving with the U.S. Army.

Mr. Prickett was a veteran of the Army Air Corps in World War II. He was a member of the Howardwick Lions Club where he had held the post of Vice-Presi-

dent, President and Zone Chairman. He was Deputy District Governor when he became ill and had to resign in 1986. While a member of the Lions Club, he was instrumental in raising funds for the Eye Bank and was made a lifetime member. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Howardwick where he was a past Sunday School Superintendent and songleader. He was a former City Alderman, member of the Friendship Club and was retired from the Howardwick Volunteer Fire Dept.

Mr. Prickett was an outdoors person who loved to hunt and fish. In March 1963, he, his wife and step-daughter left Amarillo with wagons and mules for the New York World's Fair. They arrived there in 1964, and were part of the Montana Exposition. They returned to Amarillo by mule train in October 1965.

He is survived by his wife of the home; three daughters, Louise Popplewell of Amarillo, Willa Lou Fowler of Winston, Missouri, and Margaret Ann Dudley of Clovis,

New Mexico, a son Russell Prickett of Nashville, Tennessee, a step-daughter, Carol Ann Autrey of Amarillo; a step-son, Dennie E. Bellah of Watters, Oklahoma; 23 grandchildren, including Neal Bellah, formerly of the home, now living in Amarillo; and 9 great grandchildren.

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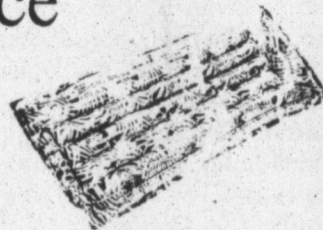
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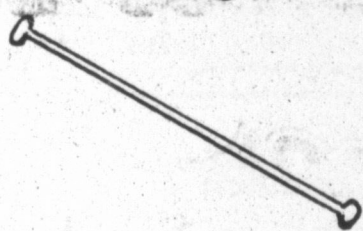
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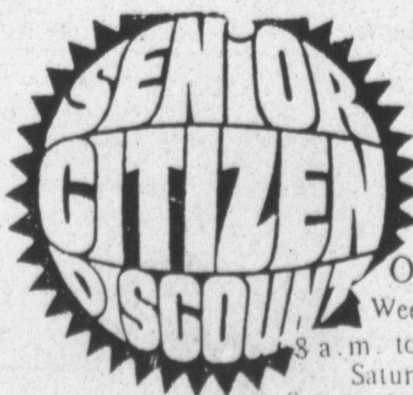


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What Do You Mean?

Several religious groups claim to be "New Testament christians". Perhaps it is natural for other people to ask, "What do you mean by that?" The answer--like many profound religious truths--is both simple and complex.

Almost from the start, some christians wanted to make changes--and sometimes christians even changed things unconsciously. The early church quickly recognized that such changes would eventually result in a degenerate system that bore little resemblance to what our Lord intended. They are a timeless constant against which to compare all life and teaching.

"New Testament christians" seek to constantly analyze and compare. Ideally, they would like to practice and teach just what Jesus did. They have learned that traditions are unreliable. They know that human reasoning is fallible. Human authorities can be mistaken or even deceitful. But the Scriptures exist to correct, to instruct and sometimes to rebuke. They provide equipment a christian needs [IITimothy 3:16,17].

"New Testament christians" do not claim to be perfect. They only claim to be seeking. They may fall from time to time, but their quest is noble and their source is pure. And those who pursue the Lord's teaching earnestly find life to be exciting and rewarding.

If you, too, would like to seek the original christian path, we invite you to join us in trying to seek our Lord's will and in trying to serve those whom he sought.

At the convention, one of the four finalists will be chosen National winner and will be awarded a plaque, an additional \$250, and the opportunity to participate in an International Travel Seminar.

There are twenty-nine National FFA Proficiency Award program areas recognizing FFA members for achievement in activities leading to careers in agriculture.

The Oil Crop Production Award program is designed to encourage vocational agriculture students to become established in crop production. Each student's practical experience program will be different but will involve employing the best management practices available for the efficient production and marketing of oil crops. Crop programs included in this category are: flax, mustard, rape, castor beans, sunflower, peanuts, safflower, and soybeans.

The awards for the Oil Crop Production Award program are sponsored by The Chicago Board of Trade and FMC Foundation as a special project of the National FFA Foundation.

Curtis will be a Junior at Hedley High School this year.

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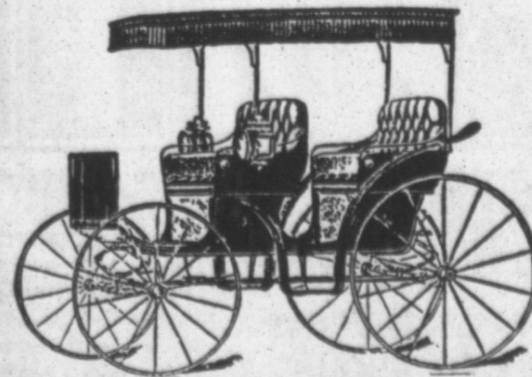
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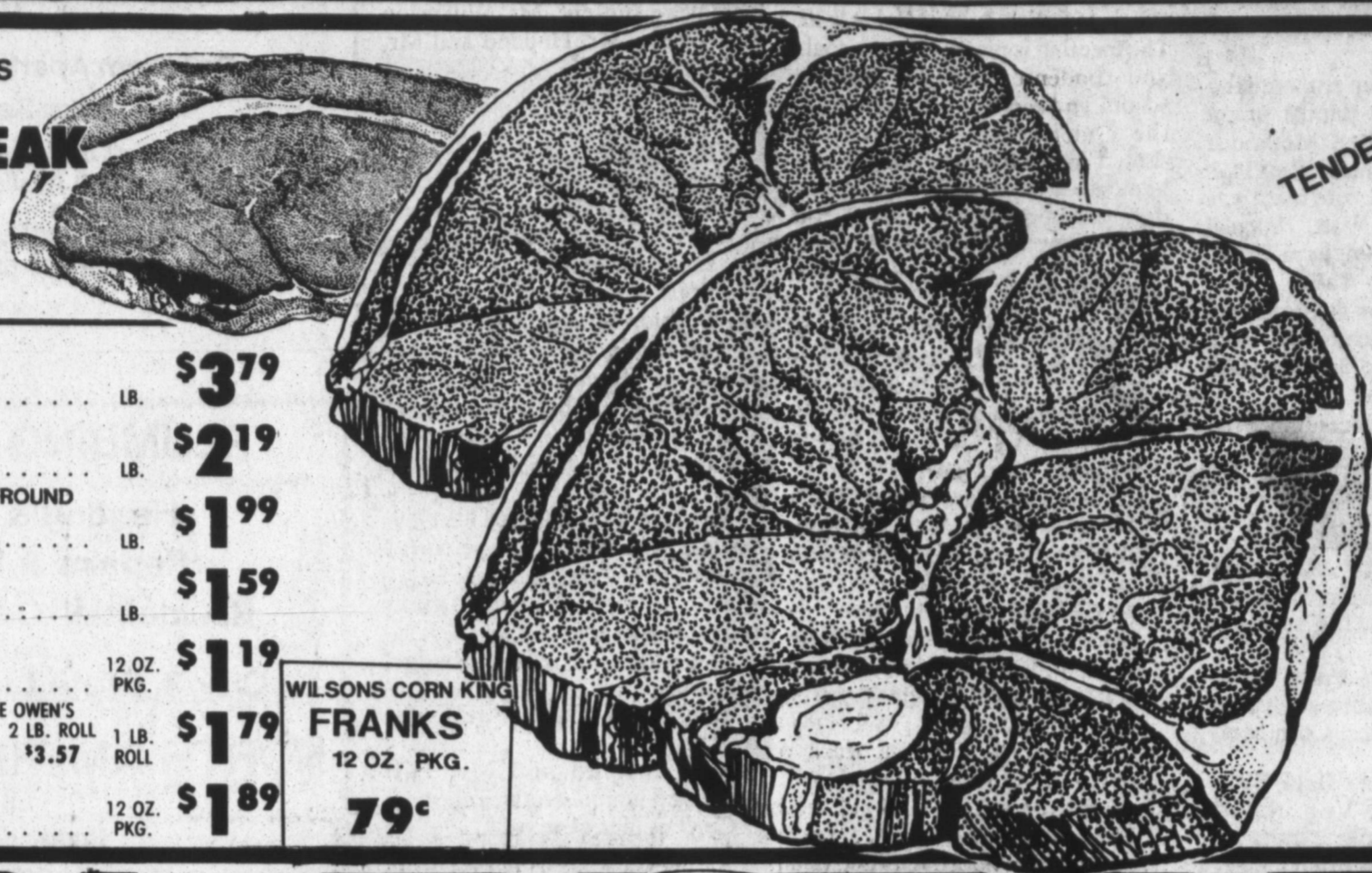
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
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Life in Clarendon

How To Pick Out A Good Horse

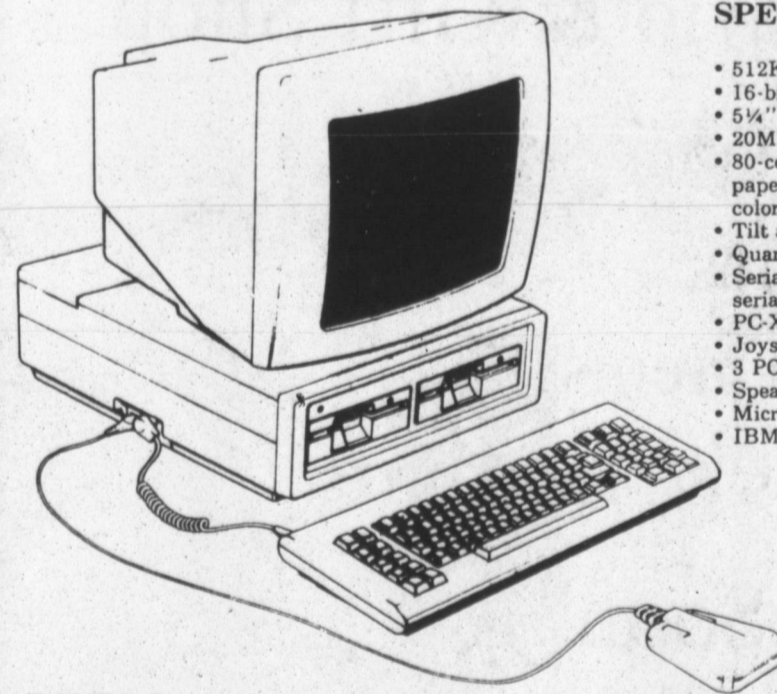
