

# Local Man Dies in Wreck

James Allen Ariola of Clarendon was killed early Friday morning in a single car accident south of Clarendon. According to the Department of Public Safety, the driver lost control of the vehicle on a curve about eight miles south of Clarendon on Highway 70. At the second curve, the vehicle crossed back over the road going partially sideways, traveling some 453 feet. The vehicle was then airborne for 65 feet before rolling over five times. The driver was thrown from the vehicle. and died at the scene.

DPS officials estimated the vehicle's speed at 112 mph. They believe that the accident occurred about 1:45 a.m., but the accident on the lightly-traveled road was not discovered until just before dawn Friday.

The pickup was extensively damaged, but the cab interior remained virtually intact. Officer Jerry Morris looked at the wreckage and said sadly, "If the driver had been wearing his seatbelt, he probably would have survived with relatively minor injuries."

In virtually every accident in Donley County this year, seatbelts made or would have made a big difference.

# Broncos Beat Vega 9 to 7

Che Shadle scored a touch-down and kicked a field goal as the Clarendon Broncos beat the Vega Longhorns 9 - 7, Friday night to snap a 15 game losing streak.

The Broncos received the opening kickoff with Desmond Johnson receiving the kick on the 20 yd line and returned it to the 35 yd line. The Broncos could not move the ball and Michael Adams punted on 3rd down to the Vega 33 yd line. Vega had moved the ball to the Broncos 40 yd line when Michael Adams intercepted a pass and returned it to the Bronco 25 yd line. The Broncos could only manage to gain 6 yds and was forced to punt. Neither team could move the ball and traded punts. The Broncos recovered a Vega fumble on their 45 yd line. The Broncos again could not move the ball and punted to the Vega 5 yd line. The Bronco defense held and Vega was forced too punt from their own end zone. Randy Allen took the punt on the 25 yd line and returned it to the Vega 12 yd line. The Broncos moved the ball to the 1 yd line and a first down. Three tries later Che Shadle ran the ball into the end zone at 8:14 of the second quarter. The extra point kick missed wide. Clarendon led 6

Vega took the kick off and moved from their 33 yd line on 3 first downs to the Bronco 27 yd line where the ball was turned over to Clarendon on downs. The defense held again. Two plays later quarter back Jonathan Stewart passed to Mark Auston who ran the ball to the Vega 28 yd line and a first down. The Broncos moved to the 19 yd line where Vega took over on downs. The Broncos could not effectively move the ball on the ground again. On the second play Michael Lopez ran 79 yds for a Vega Touchdown with 17 seconds left in the half. The kick for the extra point was good. The first half ended Vega 7 - Clarendon 6.

After the half time activities, where Brandie Stroup, daughter of Jean Stroup, was crowned Homecoming Queen, the Broncos kicked off to Vega who in turn was able to pick up a couple of first downs and moved to the Clarendon 41 yd line where they punted to the Clarendon 9 yd line. The Broncos could not get a first down and Michael Adams punted to the Vega 27 yd line, a 57 yd punt.

Vega fumbled on their first play and Chance Fletcher recovered for the Broncos on the 19 yd line. The Broncos picked up a first down at the 9 yd line on a Vega penalty. They moved to the 3 yd line. On fourth down, Che Shadle, kicked a

# Seat Belt Laws Will Be Enforced

Justice of the Peace W.W. Lovelady reminded The Clarendon Press Thursday, October 5, that Texas' seatbelt laws are being and will be enforced in Donley County. Such enforcement has made a significant difference in accident statistics statewide, but more important, it has saved the lives of hundreds of people in Texas.

Sergent Mike Thomson told *The Clarendon Press*, "There is probably nothing else we can do that would save more live in Donley County than encourage people to wear their seatbelts." The day after the Court visited with *The Press*, the importance of seatbelts

was underscored by a fatal accident south of town. But that is not the only instance of seatbelt use or non-use in wrecks covered by the paper. A few weeks ago the paper carried a story about a train-truck collision

near Lelia Lake. The accident victim struck his head on the right door. sustaining serious head and neck injuries. EMS personnel lamented that he had not been wearing his safety belt. They felt that his injuries would have been significantly reduced.

A few days before that accident, two Wichita Falls women were killed when their Jeep overturned near the east edge of Donley County. DPS personnel estimated the vehicle's speed at about 45 mph at the time of the alive and complaining than complacent and dead.'

accident. One woman was ejected from the vehicle, and the other was partially ejected. Neither was belted in.

By contrast, a few days earlier, an elderly couple on Highway 287 headed for Mineral Wells escaped serious injury even though their car collided with a pickup in Hedley. Both were wearing safety harnesses.

In view of statewide statistics and recent local events, The Clarendon Press has agreed to cooperate with local law enforcement and court officials to try to encourage seatbelt use. Lovelady said, "We are trying to save lives. Seat belts help. Some people may be too stubborn to believe it, but they save lives." A Justice of the Peace is required by law to make an official ruling whenever a person is killed in an accident. It is not a pleasant duty.

The editor voiced similar sentiments, "I do not enjoy taking pictures of smashed vehicles belonging to my friends or relatives of my friends. But it is even worse when those friends are seriously injured or killed. And the thought that so many injuries are preventable makes it even more horrible."

Beginning this week, the court will send a report of seatbelt violations to the paper. "I hope that this does not hurt people's feelings" said the editor, "but if it does, their feelings will eventually recover. They do not recover from smashed skulls or being ejected and rolled over. I'd rather have them

Funeral services for James Allen Ariola, age 20, were held at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 8, 1989 in the First Baptist Church in Clarendon with Rev. Bill Hodges, Pastor of the Clarendon Church of the Nazarene, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Ariola died at approximately 1:30 a.m. on Friday, October 6, 1989 in a one vehicle accident 8 1/2 miles south of Clarendon of Texas Highway 70. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Donley County Justice of the Peace W.W. Lovelady at 6:59 a.m. Mr. Ariola was the lone occupant of the pickup which left the roadway and overturned several times ejecting him from the vehicle. He was bon January 23, 1969 in Memphis, Texas and had lived all of his life in the Brice area. He graduated from Clarendon High School in 1987 and attended New Mexico Military Institute. He was a farmer and a member of the Clarendon Church of the Nazarene.

On Feb. 23, 1989 at 10 years of age, James A. and his mom were hauling cotton for his dad. They were listening to a christian radio station and James A. said, "I can't wait to die to go to Heaven to be with Jesus". His mom explained that he must ask Jesus to come into his heart After being silent for some time, James Allen said, "Mom, I did, and I felt like he just opened the door and came in." James Allen was baptized on November 11 of that same year.

#### Gift Book Received

Students in the fourth grade at Clarendon Elementary School have received the gift-book entitled "Feeling Good About Me" It is a handsomely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem.

"Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such lessons as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's full potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but SHE has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a

conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for other, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers discussion starters, lesson objectives, and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

Some folks seem to make a hobby of criticizing "the younger generation". Yet much of that criticism would be better directed at irresponsible adults.

Adults decry the fact that so many teen-agers get pregnant. Yet it is adults who are making millions of dollars from programs that make casual coupling seem like a routine, harmless activity. And Donley County parents who allow unlimited, unsupervised televiewing simply reinforce the corrupt standards of the broadcasters.

Many "grownups" worry about adolescent drunkeness. Yet young people cannot obtain alcohol without the cooperation of someone of legal age. By their fanaticism, other adults make alcohol seem irresistibly attractive. And children sometimes see local alcoholics who never seem to be jailed, never stopped from driving, indeed, who appear to be getting along

Most parents worry that their children may be tempted into experimenting with drugs and the inevitable addiction that follows. Yet far too many parents have done nothing to fill the spiritual vacuum in their children's lives. "People [young or old] who have nothing to live for may fall for anything." If living has no purpose, then what difference does it make if drugs or

alcohol or tobacco shortens life by a few years or a few decades? "Preaching" at kids will not help. Forbidding sex or alcohol or drugs is

not enough. There has to be a positive influence that outweighs temptation. Children cannot have a positive self image if their parents do not care enough to spend time with them. Children find it hard to believe in anything if they see parents who are only concerned with getting another dollar. Parents who never bother to go to church fail to take advantage of the positive peer pressure that their offspring could get from associating with believers.



The house was packed with relatives and friends for Larry and Barry's birthday dinner. #### Model T Graffiti

66Little Go-Creep," "Leaping Lena," "Puddle Jumper," and "Public Enemy No. 1"--what are

These are all names that Texas teenagers gave to their Model T Fords sixty years ago.

By the end of the 1920's, millions of Model T Ford cars were scattered around the country. Fifteen million of them had been produced from 1908 to 1927, and many of these had been cast aside by their owners in favor of shiny new Ford Model As, Chevrolets, or Dodges. This made the broken-down Model Ts available and within the price range of teenagers--the first generation of American adolescents able to buy cars in large num-

No sooner did the teenagers start buying the old Model Ts than did they start covering them with graffiti, including such painted-on names as those above. The spontaneous painting, however, did not end merely with names.

The flivvers often became virtual canvases for their creative owners.

One of the characteristics of the Model T was that its engine often far outlasted its body. Consequently, the cars didn't necessarily look bad, although they didn't look completely disreputable either. For many of the teenaged drivers, the latter state was far preferable to obscure mediocrity, so they began covering their car bodies with painted-on epigrams and graffiti.

The painting usually began with a name. A sophomore at T.C.U., for example, called his car "A Chemical Disturbance." West Texas State University professor Fred Rathjen told me that he remembered a flivver in Corpus Christi named "Bored of Educa-

tion." A number of epigrams referred to the sheet iron from which the Model T bodies were made. "Beauty is only tin deep," "The tin you love to touch," "The spirit is willing but the body is weak," and "Don't laugh; you may be old yourself some day," were widely popular. "Fishy Body," on the side of the car, referred to the Fisher Bodies used on General Motors

vehicles. The broad rear body panels on the Model T cars offered a wide canvas for painting. Some of the typical teenagers' comments included "My rear is no bumper,"
"To pass right, pass left," "Don't
rush me, Big Boy," and "If you hit
this car, you have gone too far."
One of the Model T epigrams which survives on present-day cars is the occasionally seen, "Follow

me for parts." Almost anywhere on a Model T might be seen such inscriptions as "A wreck but nobody killed," "An accident ready to happen," "Don't laugh; I once was the property of a Detroit millionaire," "Almost human," and "Beauty in every jar." If a door refused to stay closed, it might be marked, "Open at all hours." Convertible touring cars frequently bore such inscriptions as "Fresh Air Taxi," "Sun Parlor," and "Sun Tan Special."

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

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### **How Not To Prepare For An Electrical Fire**

Some time ago-more than a One Group Ladies Clothes year--I made some comments and posed some questions about

fires--one of which was whom to call in case of fire.

Having attended school as a pupil or teacher for some three generations, I have become rather familiar with fire drills. For a dozen years, I've had a fireman son-inlaw; for some thirty-five years I've lived with a very safety conscious husband; I have a nephew whose roommate sells fire extinguishers. As a part of my "fire background" my sister's home burned to the ground because of faulty wiring; my brother's home burned to the ground from faulty wiring.

One would think that background would to some degree

prepare one to remain sane when the smoke alarm jars one from an afternoon snooze--but no, I looked at my smoke filled kitchen and sort of went scare crazy. My stove was not the source of fire; the utility room was not the source, but there was smoke "a plenty", and when there is smoke, there is fire, and when there's fire, you call for help, and when you've lived in Hedley thirty-five years and need help quick, you call O'Neil Weatherly. (He's not the fire chief, he's not the city manager anymore, but calling him is effective.)

I saw the flame of fire behind the refrigerator I yanked the cord from the outlet, and ran to look for anybody on the street. And then I remembered there was a fire extinguisher in the garage. I ran for it. Now we know every family needs a fire extinguisher, and we are proud of having a good one--so proud that we have been taking care of it; it was still in the cardboard packing

Now I know that being scared is commonly cause for greater strength. Well, when you have a bit of arthritis in your fingers, that is not necessarily true. I did get the gadget out of the box. Then I had to read the instructions three times before I could understand them. They said "Pull the plastic ring to free the pump." That plastic ring was tough--twenty mule team tough, I think. But after a number of yanks and an eternity later, I broke the little plastic thread. I began to pump the "volcanic ash or whatever the dust is" onto the flame and then for good measure over everything else in the kitchen. It worked! About that time, the fire truck arrived. In fact, two fire trucks arrived along with Bob White, Bryan Hill and Steve Mullins and I don't know how many others. O'Neil came in and our son Lyndon arrived. They all looked like knights in shining armor to me. After that---Well, I started out to tell you how not to prepare for a



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
