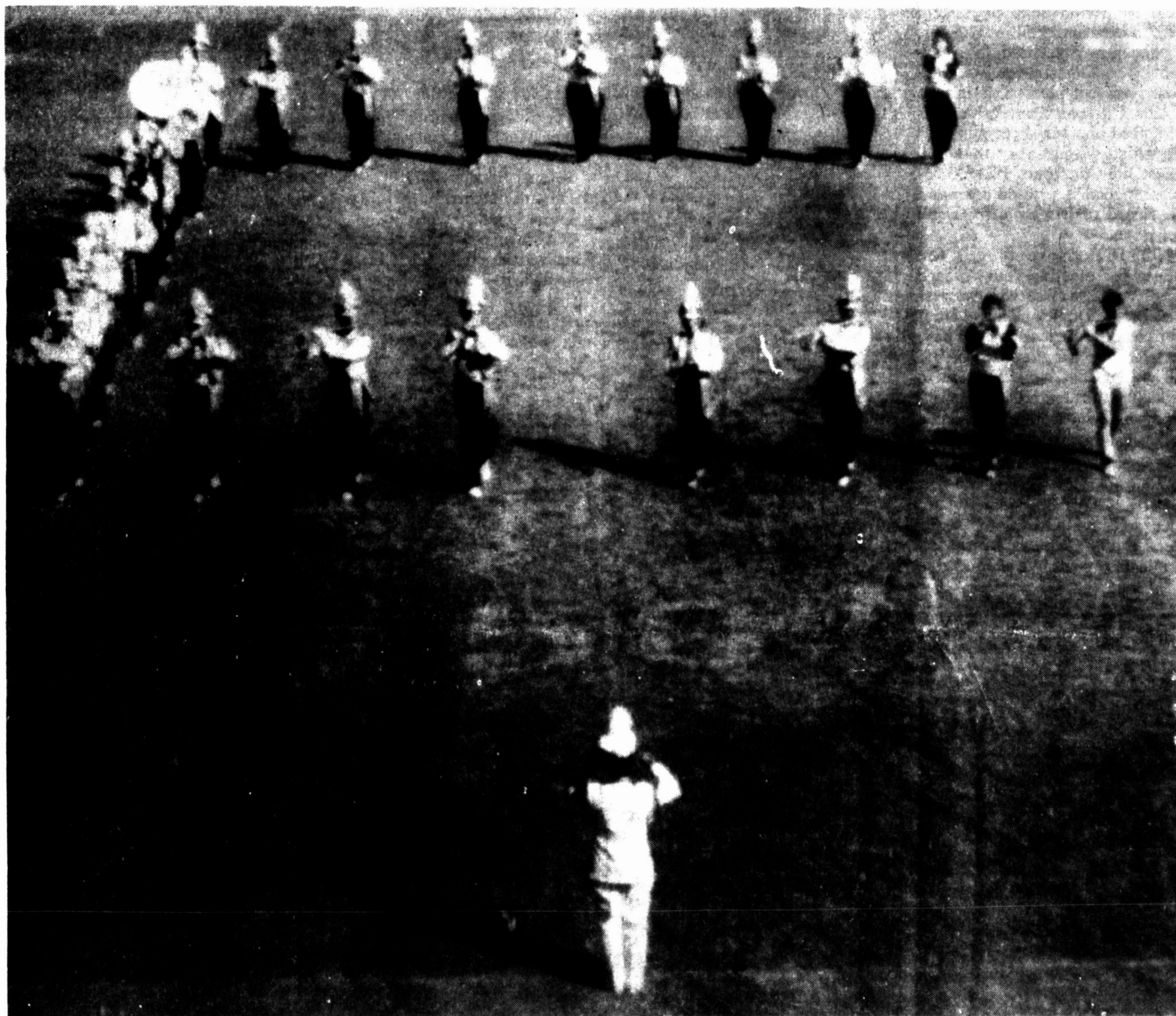

Band Earns Best Rating In 14 Years



THE CLARENDON BRONCO BAND finishes their routine at the University Interscholastic League contest at Borger, Saturday, October 21st.

The Clarendon High School Band earned a Two at the UIL marching contest in Borger Saturday, October 21st. That is the best rating for the school since 1974.

The band looked sharp in new uniforms: white jackets and maroon pants. They marched with a snap and purposefulness.

Band members are already looking forward to next year, planning for the hard work and extra rehearsals that will be necessary to make a One. They will be reinforced by a number of students moving up from Junior High.

The band's performance at this year's marching contest was a special accomplishment in view of the group's small size. In fact, Clarendon had one of the smallest groups in it's class, yet one of the judges commended the band on its balance.

Clarendon High School is well into a rebuilding program. The band had been troubled in recent years by too much turnover in directors and by low morale. That appears to have changed. Mr. Hankins has pledged to see the job through, and the band is rapidly developing the *esprit de corps* that is so necessary for a quality band. A new, active Band Booster Club helps in a variety of ways, including encouragement. And the entire community seems to be behind rebuilding the program. Proposition 17 To Be On Ballot

Special legislation passed by the 71st Legislature will give Texas voters the opportunity to have direct input into life safety and property protection for years to come. The special law creates an emergency fund for the fire service of Texas and does so without an increase in taxes or fees. Texas voters will decide the issue on November 7, in the general election.

The proposed constitutional amendment, Proposition No. 17 on the ballot authorizes the creation of the fund which can be used by all

fire departments in the state, paid or volunteer, large or small. The fund may be used only for training and equipment and will be distributed on a priority basis with the most urgent needs being served first.

The fund will be administered by a board under the direction of the State Fire Marshall's Office. The seven member board, appointed by the governor, will include fire members representing the fire service and two members representing the general public and will serve without pay.

If approved by a majority of Texas voters, the fund will address

Halloween Mischief Will Be Prosecuted

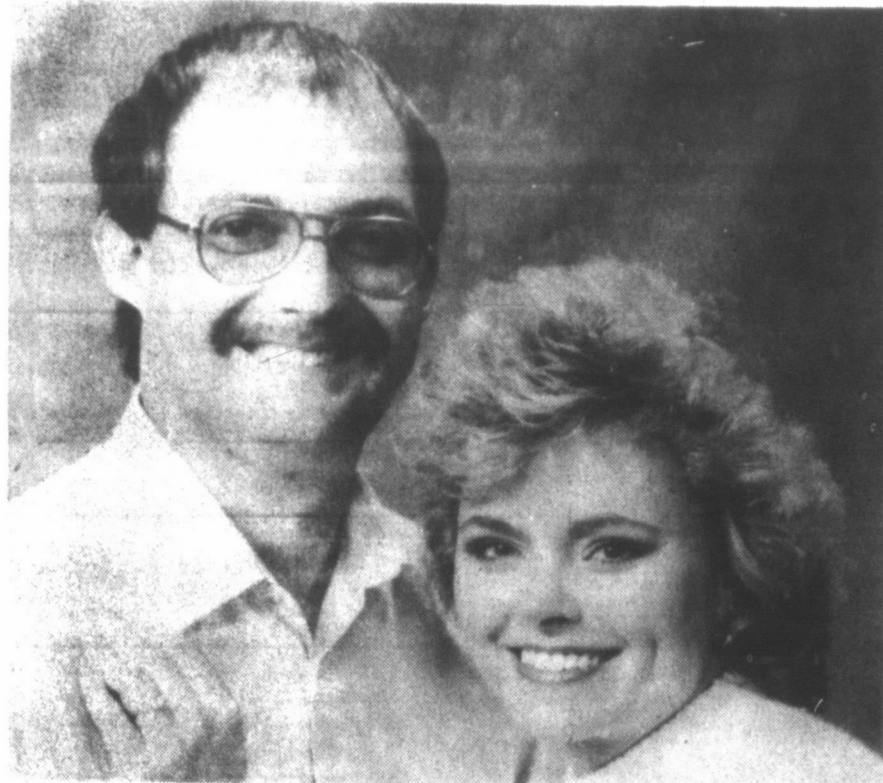

Halloween Safety Urged

A very special time for lots of little ghosts and goblins is just around the corner. Halloween is fast approaching and hundreds of our little children will be taking to the neighborhoods for that familiar fun filled, "Trick or Treat".

Major V.J. Cawthon, Region V Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "We, as motorists, can prevent many disasters this Halloween, if we will take a little more time on our streets and highways remembering that this is a special time for our children." Cawthon stated; "Small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating should be confined to those areas that the adults are familiar with. Costumes should be

light in color, non-flammable and any type of mask used should not prevent the child from being able to see."

Parents should also instruct their children in traffic safety tips, insuring they look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by the child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks, whenever possible.

Motorists should use extra caution in residential areas and be on the look-out for kids darting into the streets from all directions. Remember, they are excited and pre-occupied with trick or treating. Drivers need to be extra alert.

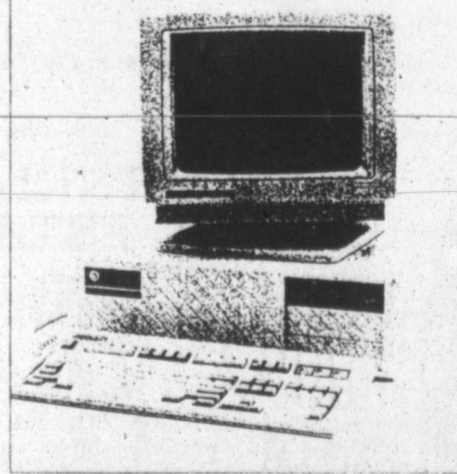

The serious problem of funding for the almost 2,000 fire departments in the state. Fire departments across the state will be eligible to apply for low interest loans or grants in an effort to address unnecessary deaths and injuries as well as the needless loss of property due to fire which could be prevented with better training and equipment. During 1987, 322 Texans died in fires which caused \$486,000.00 in damages.

The Broncos could never quite put their offense together and were unable to score.

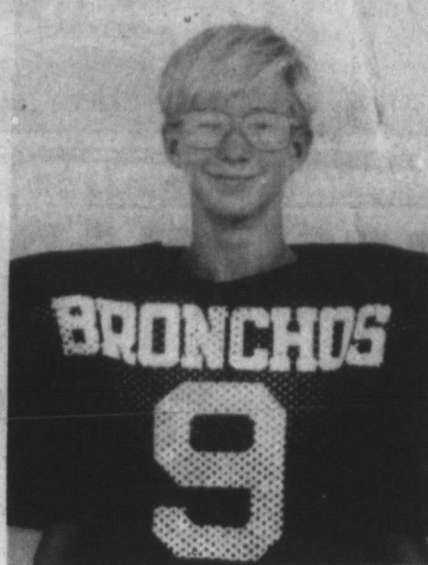

The JV Broncos will take on the Quannah Indian JV Thursday, October 26 in Bronco Stadium. Game time is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

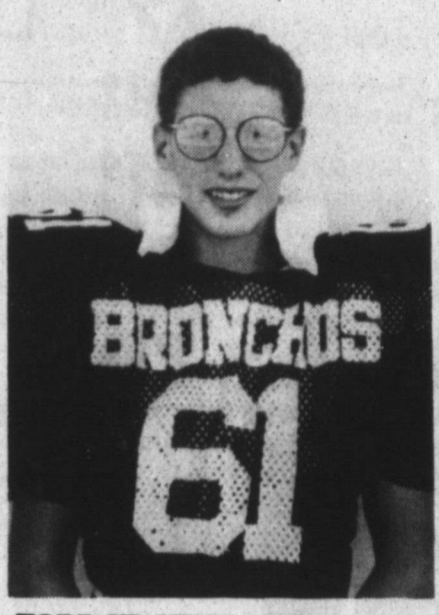

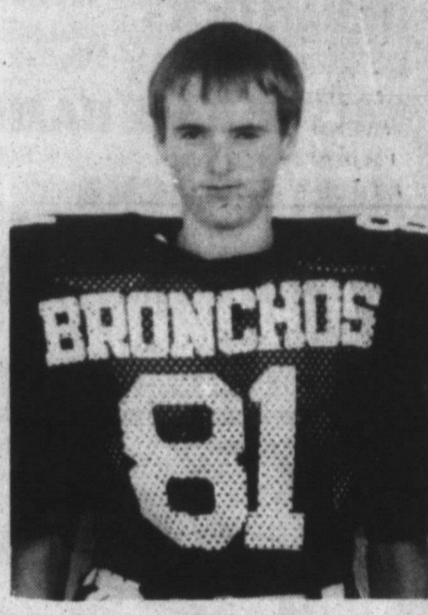

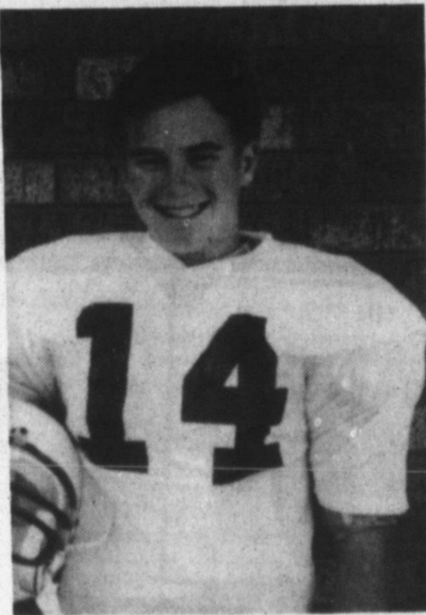
Colts Play Wellington

On Monday, City Manager Mack Garrison and Mayor Jon Leggett traveled to Amarillo for a meeting with Texas Department of Commerce officials, who explained procedures and presented an application package for loans and grants under the Texas Capital Fund.

This fund provides \$10.1 million in its 1989 program to encourage business development or expansion. Specifically, it is intended to provide economic opportunities that create or retain jobs, principally for low- and moderate-income persons.

The Texas Capital Fund provides resources for, among other things, loans for real estate acquisition, new construction or rehabilitation of commercial or industrial facilities, purchase of machinery and equipment, and working capital. Further, it provides outright grants for certain infrastructure projects.

The program, in effect, allows a local government, such as the City of Hedley, to become a financial agent for the Texas Department of Commerce. To such an agent, businesses wishing to locate or expand in the area may apply for aid.

At one time, the program was administered in such a way that, if a city received a grant, it advertised the fact that money was available, and waited for businesses to apply for assistance. Now, the program requires that a city have a specific business named in its application, along with that business' specific financial needs.

More information about this program may be obtained at City Hall. Hedleyans would do well to be on the lookout for businesses that might locate here if they knew financial aid—up to one-half million dollars—was available.



Relief of Sinus Headache

Recent statistics indicate that every week about fifteen percent of the American population experiences at least one headache. Americans are reported to go to the doctor 50 million times a year and spend approximately \$400 million on nonprescription medicines for the relief of headaches. Muscle tension, sinus congestion, mental depression, and blood vessel dilation are some of the more common causes of headaches.

Sinus headaches result from congested or clogged sinus passages in the head. The sinuses are cavities lined with mucous membranes within the facial bones. Sinus headache relief may be achieved with nonprescription *pain relievers*, *nasal decongestants*, and *antihistamines*. Nasal decongestants may help drain congested passages in the sinuses and reduce pressure in the sinus cavities. Because sinus problems are sometimes also associated with allergies, antihistamine-type medicines may help relieve sinus headaches.

Application of warm, moist heat over the sinuses may aid drainage and hasten the relief of headache pain. A damp towel may be used. Special heat pads are available for this purpose, but may be difficult to find.

Stocker Cattle Seminar

The Donley County Livestock and Range Improvement committee is sponsoring a Stocker Cattle Seminar for beef producers in the area on Thursday, November 2, 1989. The Seminar is co-hosted by the Armstrong County Extension Livestock Committee. It will start at 1:00 p.m. on November second at the Clarendon Community Center.

The Seminar will be open to anyone interested and will cover a wide range of topics. Dr. Charles E. Deyhle, Sr., of Deyhle Veterinary Services, Inc. in Clarendon, will be on the program to discuss health related problems, symptoms and treatment in stocker or cattle as well as other health related cattle problems in the area.

Dr. John W. McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will be on

hand to discuss stocker grazing management, nutrition and supplementation. Dewey "Tex" Vaughn, of Pioneer Feeders, will be on the program to discuss marketing cattle. Tex will visit with producers about grouping cattle, buying cattle, culling, options, hedging and more.

There will be several animal health industry representatives present with booths at the seminar showing their latest products. A catered meal will also be provided for participants that evening. The meal will be sponsored by the animal health industry representatives and others. Those wishing to participate in the seminar must contact the Donley County Extension Office (806/874-2141), or the Armstrong County Extension Office (806/226-3021), by October 30, 1989, in order to get a head count for the meal. The meal should be served around 5:30 p.m. that evening.

At the seminar, plans are to also have demonstrations of some of the

latest technology in health care as well as other management practices.

Surveys on Crops and Livestock

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1989 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

"Adverse weather conditions this year have certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture, and these surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1989," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mail, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year.

"sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans," Findley added.

As always, the Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible to avoid follow-up contacts.

"Remember, these are sample

surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one producer represents similar operations of the same type and size. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley noted.

Results of the surveys will be published in early 1990. Anyone wanting a copy of the results can write Information Section, Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767.

Responsibility

Some days it seems that everywhere one goes there are excuses instead of performance. The repairman did not get the tractor repaired "because the part did not come in". Of course he did not mention that he forgot to order the part. The kids got sent to the office for talking in class, but they had such a good excuse (to their ears, at least). Granny did not take her blood pressure medicine, but had fifteen reasons why.

Excuses are nothing new. In Genesis 3 Adam tried to excuse his actions: "The woman you gave me - she gave me ..." And Eve also tried to blame someone else, "The serpent deceived me ..." Yet their excuses did not alter the consequences of their action. They were expelled.

The same principle is repeated in the New Testament: "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows," (Gal. 6:7). And that is still true. The parent who fails to train his or her child finds heartbreak and tears. The child that sows disobedience reaps tragedy. The spouse that cheats hurts himself or herself as well as everyone dear to them. Trying to "get by with it" will not work for long. The consequences are not dissolved by excuses or rationalization.

God did not classify some actions (or failures to act) as sinful because he wanted to deprive us. Sin is wrong because it is likely to hurt. It may hurt someone other than the one who commits it, but usually sins hurt the offender as well. There is a reason why it is illegal to drive 70 through a school zone. Likewise, God's rules make sense. Our excuses really don't.

Those who claim to be Christians should be an example. There are alternatives to excuses. Perhaps it is time to remember some "old fashioned" words - words like character, integrity, fidelity, honesty, chastity, devotion, hard-working, fairness, self-control and responsibility. These are noble aspirations.

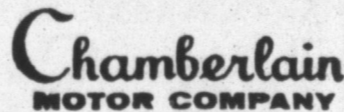

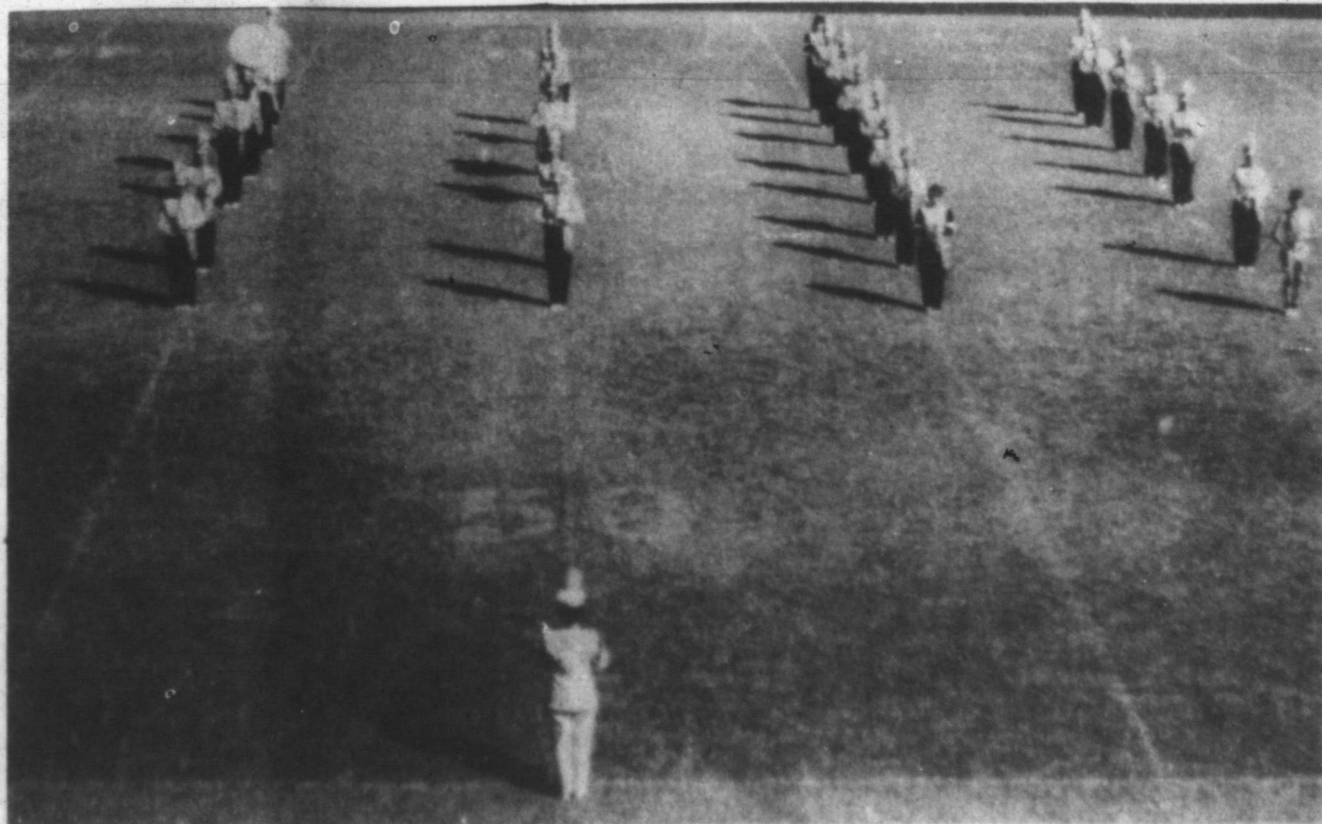

Moreman Recognized For Contribution

Jack Moreman of Clarendon was recognized for his outstanding contribution to the field of range management at the Texas Section meeting of the Society for Range Management recently held in Wichita Falls. Moreman is on the teaching staff at Clarendon College and is in charge of the Ranch and Feedlot Management course offered at the school. Students come from all over the Southwest to enroll in the program which is in the seventeenth year with Moreman at the helm. Classes are limited to 25 students each year. Number of applicants exceeds available slots each year.

Moreman's purpose is two-fold

in equipping his students. "We want to provide a good basic program in range livestock management for young people that may not get a 4 year degree but return to the ranch to be actively involved," says Moreman. "Our program will also blend well into a 4 year degree program in animal nutrition or range animal science for those students who wish to transfer to a school such as Texas Tech or Texas A&M", Moreman adds.

The Clarendon campus has a great advantage in that it is located in the heart of the ranching county. "We can have our students on a working ranch within 20 minutes time which is important to us," says Moreman.

Some of the emphasis items taught in the course are principles of range condition and trend, grazing systems and range plant identification. Also, stressed are aspects of livestock marketing including contracting, futures and options, and animal health. It is a complete animal management course.

Moreman also serves as a director on the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District Board. He has also operated feedlots in the Panhandle area and served as superintendent of the J.A. Ranch.

The Society for Range Management is an international organization fostering the art and science of wise use of the world's range resources. The Texas Section recognizes individuals who make significant contributions within the State.

Shields Re-Elected To Board

Earl Shields of Lelia Lake was recently re-elected to the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors Oct. 2, 1989. Shields represents zone 5 of the district.

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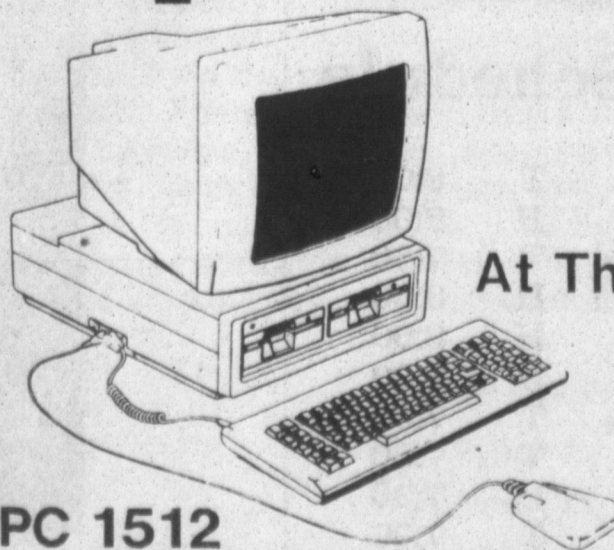
