### Welfare And Job Training Reform Becomes Law

The welfare and job training reform legislation that has now been signed into law by Governor Bush will fundamentally change the way Texas handles its public assistance and work force development programs. Most of the new welfare reforms follow closely the recommendations I made in a report entitled A Partnership for Independence, which was requested by Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock.

Perhaps the most far-reaching provision in the new law is the one which will limit the time a recipient can receive welfare benefits. The Texas time-limit proposal is one of the toughest in the nation. Many states with time-limits are piloting the concept in one or two countries, but Texas will be taking time-limits statewide.

These time limits range from one to three years. Recipients with more education and work experience fall into the shortest time-limit category, while those with the least experience fall into the longest timelimit category. Recipients will be allowed to return after five years, unlike in most states, which allow recipients to return after three years.

Also, beginning on September 1, 1995, every welfare recipient will be required to sign a Responsibility Agreement, laying out the state's expectations and reminding them that public assistance is not an unlimited entitlement.

Elsewhere in the new law is a provision that will require mothers who receive Aid to Families With Dependent Children to identify the father of their children and cooperate with child support enforcement personnel. Children will have to attend school, and those who can will be required to work. All recipients will be required to remain drug and alcohol abuse free. And failure to comply with any of the provisions of this agreement will bring penalties, sanctions, or the loss of AFDC benefits altogether.

### Bivens Granted **Certificate**

The Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation at South-

western Oklahoma State University School of Pharmacy recently granted Elmonette Branigan Bivens of Clarendon, a Consultant Pharmacist Certificate for demonstrating a commitment to excellence as a Consultant Pharmacist by virtue of completing a postgraduate certificate program and incorporating the acquired knowledge and skills into a consistent pattern of patient care service to improve the health care of the elderly.

After a month of studying module materials, pharmacists gathered for a monthly four-hour workshop session where they were evaluated over module materials and were provided the opportunity to develop their skills by participating in problem-solving exercises.

The Consultant Pharmacist Certificate Program is a curricular-based professional education program that addresses an expressed need of consultant pharmacists for an in-depth study of pharmacotherapeutic management of diseases and drug therapy of institutionalized geriatric patients. Pharmacists were provided the opportunity to enhance their knowledge and skills in the pharmacotherapeutic management of diseases, and to apply newly acquired knowledge and skills in performing clinical drug therapy monitoring in geriatric patients.

Several benefits resulted from the Consultant Pharmacist Certificate Program. It allowed pharmacists to obtain specialized knowledge in geriatrics, pharmacotherapeutics, and the function and role of a consultant pharmacist. It also provided pharmacists with an intellectual, challenging. and practical course of study that prepared them to provide a high level of pharmaceutical care to the elderly.

The ultimate beneficiary of the program is the elderly population. By virtue of acquiring rigorous training in a specialized area of pharmacy practice and with this increased knowledge and skills level, pharmacists completing the Consultant Pharmacist Certificate Program can be more confident and assertive in working with physicians and nurses to improve the quality of life and health care for the elderly.

As a participating pharmacist in the Consultant Pharmacist Certificate Program, Elmonette Branigan Bivens has shown a commitment to the rapidly evolving profession, of consultant pharmacy practice.




Mother tried several times to end their relationship but she just couldn't put him out of her life.

#### Livestock Owners Alerted To Viral Disease

Texas livestock and horse owners are being urged to be on the lookout for animals with excessive salivation, loss of appetite, blisters or lesions around their mouths, tongues, hooves, or teats, a sign that their livestock has been affected by the virus, Vesicular Stomatitis.

Vesicular Stomatitis, which is usually not fatal, has been confirmed in horses in New Mexico in three regions: in a 15 mile area around Las Cruces, and in 30 mile areas around Albuquerque and Silver City. A task force from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Veterinary Services has been dispatched to the state to assist state personnel with diagnosis and quarantining of infected animals.

In Texas, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) is urging producers to be alert to signs of the infection, so that immediate action may be taken to halt the spread of disease, which has an incubation period of two to eight days. If compatible symptoms are noticed in any animals in a herd, veterinarians or owners would call their TAHC area office, or the headquarters in Austin at (512) 719-0700, or the USDA at (512) 482-5555. An animal health inspector or veterinarian will be sent to the premise to assist in making a diagnosis. Affected and exposed animals will be guarantined for 30 days after the last lesions heal.

Vesicular Stomatitis is usually not fatal and has occurred with varying frequency in North and South America. Typically, the infection affects cattle, horses or swine, but sheep and goats, deer, bobcats, and raccoons can also be-

come infected. Initially, an outbreak may be caused by insect vectors, but then the virus can move from animal to animal by contact with the fluid from ruptured lesions, or saliva. Persons who handle potentially infected animals should wear rubber or latex gloves, as they can contract the virus and develop symptoms including fever, muscle aches, and headache.

Infected animals develop painful blisters that swell and break, leaving raw tissue that cause them to refuse water or food. The blisters also may appear around the top of hooves, resulting in temporary lameness. Severe weight loss accompanies the infection, and in dairy cattle, a dramatic drop in milk production occurs.

"Animals with any Vesicular Stomatitis symptoms should not be moved from the premise, as this could spread disease to other farms and ranches. The owners or veterinarians should call the TAHC or USDA immediately for diagnostic assistance," said Dr. Max Coats, state epidemiologist for the TAHC. "To aid in preventing infection, flies should be controlled, and persons should remember to use rubber gloves if they handle any animals that appear to have been infected."
