Lakewood Control In Cotton

Lakewood, or Woollyleaf Bursage, is a problem in many cotton fields in Donley County. This past year it seems that the Lakewood problem increased in many fields and control of the lakewood is difficult. The Donley County Extension Service has a Lakewood control demonstration plot on the David Davidson farm, south of Lelia Lake to look at different herbicides that will effectively control or suppress the weed.

The demonstration was put out on May 8, 1990, with assistance from Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist. Several different treatments and rates were used and the following herbicides were included in the demonstration: Banvel, Tordon, Banvel + Tordon, Arsenal, Reflex, and Arsenal + Reflex.

To date, evaluations show very good control with Banvel and Tordon. Cotton was planted approximately one month after application into the different treatments, and cotton was adversely affected in each treatment except in the Banvel treatment, where no visible sign of residue damage has appeared. The plots with Arsenal and Reflex have shown unacceptable control to date.

These plots can be viewed any time by farmers. Signs will be placed on the plots for viewing.

Last week I wrote the article about nutsedge control in peanuts and I make a mistake about which herbicides were doing the best job of control in the Extension demonstration plots.

After evaluation of plots again, I found that I had used the wrong plot plan sheet which made the first evaluation wrong.

The herbicides that are showing the best results to date is the Dual + Basagran combination. The combination at both low rate and high rate shows excellent control of nutsedge in pea nuts. Pursuit only shows to have fair control at this point, and has shown some peanut plant damage in some of the plots.

Water Is Best Drink On Hot Days

A nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service recommends drinking water instead of iced tea or soda to quench your thirst. On hot days like these, it's important to increase your fluid consumption. The best

way to do this is by drinking water, according to Dr. Bethann Witcher. "The body needs more fluids when it's exposed to extreme heat, or during exercise, fever, infections or even when traveling to high altitudes," she said. Iced tea, like any other drink, is okay in moderation, Witcher said. However, you should not drink it with every meal, especially in the heat. Tea is a diuretic that takes fluid out of the body.

If you don't like the taste of water, try adding a twist of lemon, lime, orange or tangerine to improve the flavor, she said.

Drinking water is just as important as eating the right types of food, Witcher said. Here are some water facts:

- The body contains 40-50 quarts of water.

- Two to three quarts of water are lost daily through perspiration, urine and breathing and must be replaced.

- As little as a 3 percent reduction

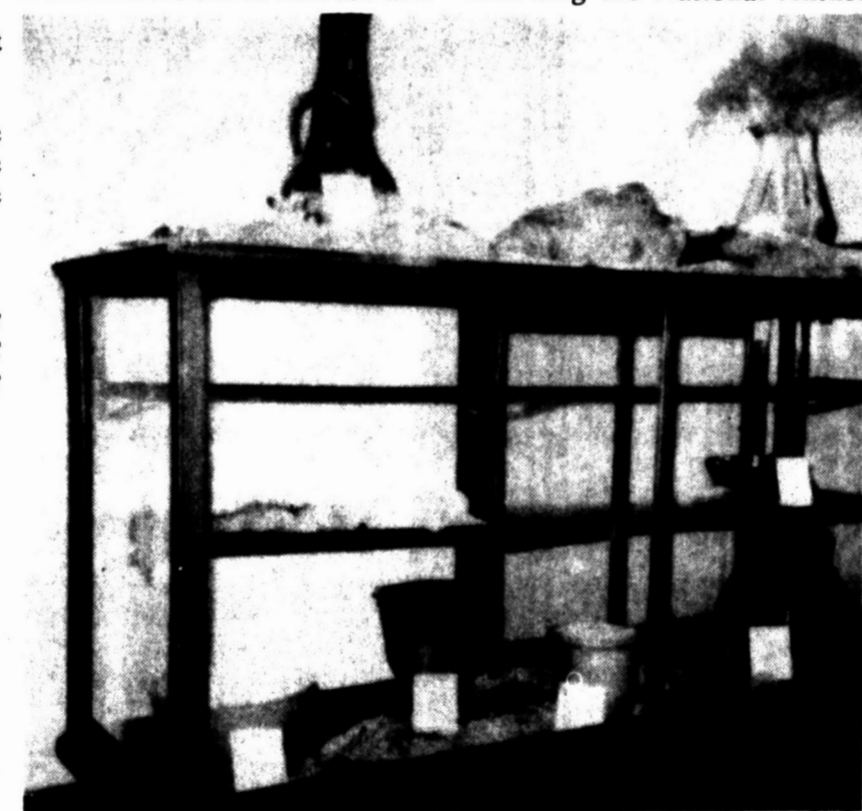
David and Alicia Hughes of Wichita State University are in charge of the excavation and gave a very informative tour.

of body weight from water loss can affect strength and endurance.

- A 15-20 percent water loss can be fatal.

- Water helps the digestive process.

- In the form of perspiration, water sets up a self-cooling system during exercise.

- Water carries nutrients to the cells and removes wastes.

- A healthy complexion depends on water-enhances skin tone.

- Joints are lubricated by water.

- "On the curative side, water can often help relieve head aches and decrease premenstrual bloating," Witcher said. "Also, drinking large glasses of water during the day and right before meals can help curb your appetite and avoid impulse snacking to help you maintain or

lose weight."

Witcher said that when nutritionists suggests drinking six to eight glasses of liquid each day, they mean water. Caffeine- or alcohol-containing beverages are not recommended because they are diuretics.

Alcoholic beverage consumption, which should always be in moderation, should include other liquids to dilute the effect of alcohol, she said. Soft drinks and milk shakes are not recommended in excess because of their high caloric count.

"Drinking sufficient water will help you look and feel your best," Witcher said. "Water should be an integral part of your dietary plans and practices."

Sign Permits Mandatory

Mr. Vance L. Castleberry, P.E., Childress District Engineer of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, announced today that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected and permitted before September 6, 1985 in Texas is required by recent legislation to renew each sign permit no later than September 5, 1990.

The new law is known as Highway Beautification Program under the Texas Litter Abatement Act 1990 Sign Permit Renewal and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located.

Cost breakdown for the new permits are as follows: \$50.00 for each sign no larger than 100 square feet; \$87.50 for each sign larger than 100 square feet, but no larger than 300 square feet; \$125.00 for each sign larger than 300 square feet; for each year being renewed with a maximum renewal period of five years at any one time.

Free Collection Days Set For Chlordimeform:

Farmers To Be Paid For Supplies

The Texas Department of Agriculture and two chemical manufacturers will collect leftover supplies of the banned pesticide chlordimeform at eight sites in late July, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower announced. "This is a free, no-strings-attached collection program to get rid of the banned chemical," Hightower said. "We won't even ask for names and addresses. And if farmers have unopened containers of the pesticide, the manufacturers will pay for them."

Chlordimeform, known by the trade names Galecron and Fundal, was banned by the Environmental Protection Agency in 1989 at the request of its manufacturers. EPA considers it a probable carcinogen. Its use, which was for control of budworms and boll worms in cotton, is no longer legal.

TDA, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has picked collection sites in Pecos, Lamesa, Veribest, Taylor, Burleson County, El Campo, Robstown and Weslaco. Addresses and collection hours of the collection sites are as follows:

Tuesday, July 17, 8 - 1, Pecos, Texas
Wednesday, July 18, 8 - 1, Lamesa, Texas

Friday, July 20, 8 - 1, Veribest, Texas

Monday, July 23, 8 - 1, Taylor, Texas

Tuesday, July 24, 8 - 1, Weslaco, Texas

Wednesday, July 25, 8 - 1, Burleson County, Texas

Thursday, July 26, 8 - 1, Robstown, Texas

Friday, July 27, 8 - 1, El Campo, Texas

The collections will be held rain or shine.

"Texas cotton farmers with leftover supplies haven't had a safe, proper way to dispose of Galecron and Fundal," Hightower said. "Now, thanks to excellent cooperation from Ciba-Geigy and Nor-Am corporations, the pesticide can be returned to the manufacturers, who will handle the disposal."

Hightower said that all chlordimeform should be kept in its original container. If the original container has deteriorated, producers should call John Stone of Ciba-Geigy at 800/334-9481 at least two weeks prior to the collection date. Producers who bring chlordimeform in unopened containers will be immediately reimbursed by the manufacturers.

No other pesticide should be brought to the collection sites.

The collection program is a cooperative effort of TDA, the Ex-

tension Service, the Texas Water Commission, the Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations and the two chemical companies.

Hightower asked that producers, particularly those with larger quantities, call TDA's Leslie Smith at 800/832-7347 with the amount of chemical and the disposal site they intend to use, to be sure that adequate disposal containers are available.

Not long ago, in an Amarillo restaurant, I looked across the room and saw a boy, perhaps eight or nine years old, in a wheelchair. He had no legs, deformed arms, and a face far too big for his misshapen little body. His speech could be understood; nonetheless, it was thick, abnormal.

His left arm had only a vestigial hand. He placed his hamburger on the end of his arm, at about the place we would call our wrists, and with a somewhat-better-formed right hand, directed the balanced burger mouthward.

Yes, everything was so very wrong, at least physically. What a pitiful little creature! And yet, everything was so right. He was so cheerful, and so obviously the delight of his parents. Incidentally,

he dropped not a crumb! I made a mess at our table.

Four things came to mind as I watched the family enjoy their outing.

First, how long has it been since you thanked the Lord for your good health, your limbs, your eyes? For me, it had been a while. Father, forgive!

Secondly, there was what I can only call a "special light" on his too-big little face. That light is often there, I've noticed, on the faces of those who (we say) are not "normal." And that leads me to point number three.

I think that light is indicative of the Lord's special protection for special needs. And, when you think of it, we all have special needs, and just the right kind and the right amount of His mercy and His grace, tailored especially for us.

Finally, I believe that one of Heaven's great joys will be to see such ones made right. That precious little one won't feast on Heaven's manna with deformed stubs. He'll do a "boarding-house reach" across that banquet table

with long, perfectly-formed fingers. He won't sing the Doxology with thick, slurred notes. "The Lark of Heaven," we'll call him, as we help him shout the victory. And he won't need that wheelchair to roll himself up to Jesus' welcoming hug. That chair, and every trace of his deformity, and every trace of the deformity of my sin, will be eternally gone. Hallelujah!
