A correspondent of the Dallas News says that Texas cattlemen who have been induced to leave West Texas and settle in New Mexico on account of the free grass, have found after their arrival in the land of promise that the difference in taxes is a very important item. The News representaive was talking with the representative of a big outfit that ranches both in Texas and New Mexico, and the question of State and Territorial taxes came up for consideration. The ranchman remarked that his outfit rendered $\$ 100,000$ worth of cattle in New Mexico for taxes, and the Territorial tax on that amount annually aggregated $\$ 3,500$.
