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



HIGHWAY BONDS

Several objections offer themselves to the plan, reported in about 38 Texas counties, under which county road bonds would be voted and the State Legislature asked to assume this local indebtedness with the interest cost.

The first objection is that roads, financed by bonds, would cost more than those constructed for cash by the State Highway Department under joint federal and state financing. The substantial element of interest would make the roads more expensive, and federal aid would be lacking in the financing of county-built roads. Likewise, federal supervision of construction and plans would be wanting in the case of county-built highways. A third objection is that the counties, voting bonds, rather than the State Highway Commission would determine the development of the state highway system.

Thus, efforts of several years to insure better roads, to improve their quality and to devise a statewide network of paved highways would be prejudiced by the bond plan as sponsored by the various counties. Hence, the plan appears to be a step backward rather than forward.

Under the joint federal-state program, thousands of miles of first class, continuous highways have been built in this State. It is possible that certain communities have been overlooked in a program of that nature, and the bond proposals in the 38 counties afford a prima facie presumption that they may be entitled to more federal-state highways, in return for the taxes they pay. On the other hand, locally-built roads under the bond assumption plan fall into the general category of 'something for nothing' in the form of public works.

Local government, notably in the cities, suffers under the present system in which gasoline taxes go entirely to the State. Cities, in particular, lack revenue for maintaining streets, while their motorists are taxed heavily to finance state highways. Some counties no doubt are in the same predicament. But this situation would be cured by equitable allocation of gasoline taxes, giving a portion to local government, rather than by the patchwork plan of county road bond issues.

It appears, therefore, that the counties and cities have a case for the attention of the Highway Commission or the State Legislature in the matter of highway improvement, but that the remedy is not by an extension of the road bond assumption plan. Star-Telegram, in issue of December 4, 1940.

CHANGE THE GUARD

If you want a truly merry Christmas be sure that the frivolity of the season doesn't turn it into tragedy. The Na-tional Safety Council points out that the Holidays are the most dangerous part of the year, replete with auto casualties, home accidents, burns and falls. Keep these "don'ts" in mind and you'll live to see the new year:

DON'T give children dangerous toys, or toys with sharp points. If they operate with electricity, be sure you supervise their use. DON'T decorate the tree with

lighted candles unless it's absolutely unavoidable. Carefully wired electric bulbs are much safer. DON'T place the tree near a stove

or fireplace.

DON'T leave a lighted tree un guarded at any time; you must be

It was not until several years later, however, that the first lithographed Christmas card made its appearance. Originality was almost completely lacking. The greeting was invariably "A Merry Christmas" or "A Jolly Christmas." Designs seldom had anything to do with the season, but contained pictures of birds, flowers, animals or

A N ILLUMINATED tree in front of a house always makes it look more "homey" on Christmas eve. It need not necessarily be a pine or fir tree-it may be any evergreen standing apart or in shrubbery hugging the house.

The lighted tree or shrub not only makes the home look more beautiful, but also serves as a definite contribution to the community Christmas spirit.

There is, of course, a right and a wrong way to do this, as there is in doing everything else. 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How To Cook Venison Meat

AUSTIN.-Tens of thousands of Texas deer hunters are bringing home venison this season and many wives do not know how to properly prepare venison. The results of their attempts are often soggy, greasy pieces of meat which is as tough as the hide of a longhorn. Thus the following recipes, tested and approved by members of the Game Department may be of some help.

Venison is a dry meat. The Fernandez family recipe, which is famous in the Rio Grande Valley, overcomes the dryness. A roast, or an entire leg is prepared for roasting by making numerous deep slits in it. Into these are thrust pieces of ham or bacon

The green coffee is withdrawn from storage in amounts specified by requisition orders for each in-

dividual brand. It is taken to the mixing rooms and there is blended by mixing the proportionate weights of each particular kind of coffee. The mixture is run through ingenious cleaning machinery that removes all stalks, leaves, dust, and other lightweight, objectionable matter before the coffee goes to the ovens, where it is subjected to a thermoroasting process, a scientific method of heat application, that roasts the beans thoroughly and evenly to bring out all the fine flavor of the individual blend. After the coffee has been thermoroasted for approximately eighteen minutes, it is removed from the ovens and allowed to cool for five or ten minutes, depending upon the amount of coffee in the lot. Once cool, the coffee is again run through a cleaning machine, this time to remove all heavy matter, such as rocks, from it. Christmas Season Celebrated Before Christ Was Born

Strange as it seems, the Christmas season was celebrated long before Christ was born. Of course, it wasn't called Christmas then, but many religious and pagan ceremonies were held during the Christmas period.

This period is celebrated by the Jews as the Festival of Lights or Dedication. According to Jewish history, a large force of Maccabees defeated an army of Syrians in 165 B. C. The victors began the work of purifying the desolate Jerusalem, completing their task on December 25. The Jews have celebrated the eight days previous to December 25 ever since that time.

The proximity of Christmas to the winter solstice caused many pagan ceremonies to be held during that period. In Scandinavian countries, great fires were kindled in the middle of December to defy the Frost King.

Centuries before this, the ancient Druids of England observed this season in their roofless temples. Torches blazed as strange ceremonies were performed, dealing with the cutting of the mistletoe.

Several accepted Christmas customs of today originated with the old Roman celebration of Saturnalia. The higher class of free Romans exchanged presents with their friends. Inside houses, candles were lit and the rooms and halls adorned with laurel and green trees.

These festivals in honor of the god Saturnus were started before the earliest recorded history of that great empire. The pagans celebrated from December 17 to 24 in honor of their sun god. Among the slaves and lower classes, the celebration was transformed into unrestrained




