Shall Donley County be Mortgaged For \$565,000.00?

(An Editorial)

That is exactly what will be done if the present highway bond issue is voted December 28, 1940. The interest and sinking fund necessary to take care of this enormous bond issue each year will amount to approximately \$50,850.00. At 5% on 25-year bonds, this will more than double our present tax payments.

The statement has been made that the law expiring January 1, 1940 will be re-enacted by the next session of the Legislature. The Meyer and other relatives. At the majority of the law-makers say it will not. The assumption act, Section 8, provides in part as follows:

> "It is hereby declared that all eligible indebtedness as herein defined, shall remain indebtedness of their respective counties or defined road districts, which issue it; and said counties or defined road districts, shall remain liable on said indebtedness according to its terms and tenor; and it is not the purpose of this act, or any part hereof, to obligate the State of Texas, directly or indirectly or contingently, for the payment of any such obligations, and this Act is not ment. With plenty of water and to be construed as obligating the State of Texas to the holders of any said obligations to make payment of same or any part thereof."

In case the State assumed these bonds and interest payments of the several counties already voted amounting to more than \$18,000,-000.00, and did not have sufficient money in that fund to cover, each county voting the bonds would have to be taxed to meet the obligation







Believe It or Not!

New Year's day isn't always New Year's day. The actual date varies 10 a.m. among the Egyptians, Chinese, Jews, Romans and Mohammedans from September 6 to March 1.

January 1 was designated to be New Year's day when Julius Caesar established the Julian calendar in 46 B. C. However, the calendar year thus established was 11 minyear.

To correct this discrepancy, Pope Gregory III suppressed 10 days in new calendar until 1752. For almost Year's was celebrated twice every year-both times on January 1.


New Year's never fell on the same day two years in succession in old China. The new year began on the first moon after the sun entered the sign Aquarius. This date varied from January 21 to February 18. Jewish New Year's, when translated into dates of the Gregorian calendar, varies from September 6 to October 4.

Telescopic photography, begun last week with McDonald observatory's 82-inch reflecting mirror, is calculated to chart the precise path of the comet.


