## RUSSO-JAPAN WAR NEWS.

Japs Best Russians at
Port Arthur
Tokio, June 26,6 p. m.-Ad miral Togo's detailed report o his effective attack on Por Arthur last Thursday nigh reached Tokio today. The report confirms the reported destruc tion of a Russian battleship of
the Peresviet type, the disathe Peresviet type, the disa-
bling of a battleship of the Sebling of a battleship of the Secruiser resembling the Diana cruiser resembling the Diana
and the injurning of a torpedo destroyer, but throws no light on the Russian plan. In this report Admiral Togo gives the facts as follows:
The exit of the Russian fleet from Port Arthur began early Thursday. The battleships Per esviet, Poltava, Sevastopol, the armoured cruisers Bayan, the protected crusiers Pallada, Diana, Askold and Novik cam first, a steamer leading them clearing mines.
A warning, flashed by wireless telegraphy by the Japanese patrol, brought up Admiral Togo's fleet at full speed to a series of prearranged stations.
Three flotillas of Japanese destroyers and torpedo boats watched the Russian vessels At 11 o'clock the Russian bat tleships, Czarevitch, Retvizan and Pobieda joined the other Russian shipsoutside the harbor. Several steamers and boats were engaged in clearing and exa passage seaward.
At 3 o'clock seven Russian destroyers appeared and the Ja panese vigorouly attacked them One of the Russian destroyers,
which was hit and set on fire re treated to the harbor burning. The Novik attacked the Japa The Novik attacked the Japan ese whols engaged in clearing the varbor finally harbor finally made a passage and the Novik led the Russian fleet seaward. In the meantime Admiral Togo concealed the positions of his ships and at 4 out into the vision of the Russians with the object of drawing them seaward. The Russian fleet stood southeastward and then southward. During this
time Admiral Togo had concealed his first squadron south of Gugan Rock. As the Russians approached Admiral Togo as sembled his fleet and prepared to
attack. The Czarevitch led and the nine others followed in single line.
The Novik and seven destroy ers were placed at the right of the line. At 7:30 p. m. the Rus sians headed for the Japanes and Admiral rogo veered lo the right in order to bring pressure against the head of the Russian formation. At $8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. the Russians changed their Admiral Togo followed in a long single line, ordering the destroy ers and torpedo boats to prepare for an attack after sundown.
