Died To Make Good.

You can't tell what is inside of a man by looking at him.

There is Robert H. Plank of Macon, Ga., the banker whose recent failure and suicide created a great sensation in his section. No man in the community stood higher than Plank, but when he failed thousands proclaimed him a criminal. He was charged with deliberate misappropriation of the funds of hard working people and the pittances of widows and children. On every street corner he was denounced as a scoundrel. The sequel shows that he overreached himself in enterprises for the public good and was thoroughly honest.

"It wrings my heart," said Plank, "to think of the widows and orphans who have lost money." Whereat the populace cried out, Hypcrite! Villain! He adds insult to injury by an exhibition of false pity for his victims.

They did not know what was going on in the breast and brain of Robert H. Plank. For years he had carried some \$800,000 life insurance, the policies being made payable to his family. One day Plank sent a bullet through his brain.

Then it became known that aside from \$50,000 of his insurance, which had been hypothecated, the remainder-\$750,000 -was left entirely to his creditors. Not a cent was given to his family. And it was also apparent that he committed suicde in order to hasten the night to aid in paying a debt payment of the money to his




