What Lunch Rooms Mean To Schools

Since October 28, the W.P.A. school lunch room, operating in the Junior High building has served lunches 135 days to approximately 75 underprivileged children daily.

The total number of lunches served to date is 12,600. Approximately 2000 of those were paid The remaining 10,600 were served

free to underprivileged children. Foods consumed in the lunches are from two sources. The Surplus Commodities program of the Federal Government has furnished 7,869 pounds of food, while local funds have bought food to the amount of approximately \$400.

The lunches are prepared and served by a group of four women, all of whom have had much experience in cooking and serving lunches, as well as in the canning

This lunch room, together with others in Donley and Armstrong Counties, is under the supervision of Mrs. Edythe Maher. Much credit is due both Mrs. Maher and the workers for the excellent service to the school and commun-

Of the funds spent locally almost \$300 has been realized from paid lunches while local contributions have accounted for approximately \$75.00. These contributions are greatly appreciated by program. Donations have been made by a great many civic and social clubs, as well as by many individuals, ranging in amounts from \$1 to \$10. Without this help ARE APPRECIATED the lunch program could not have





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

IN CAPTURING ALLEGED WIFE MURDERER

On the morning of March 20 of this year, the body of a woman was found in a ditch near Spearman, Texas with her head crushed in, places by hammer blows and identifying marks removed from the body. The bloody hammer was found later under a culvert nearby.

Sheriff H. L. Wilbanks found parties who had seen the couple and the car in which they were touring. They were strangers and no further progress was made until the sheriff began tracing from a trade mark inside the lady's ana, according to records of the shoe factory.

Brown's wife, the former Erna Mae Auweiler, was questioned during the day. She said she was living at San Mateo, Calif., when she contacted him through the Stanley Ideal Hearts Club of Oakland, Calif. She added that they were married Oct. 29 at Reno and came to Chicago.

She said she knew of no other women in her husband's life and asserted: "I never want to see him

Sheriff Wilbanks said Brown's criminal record, dating back to 1915, showed that he was sentenced to San Quentin prison in 1935 on charges of stealing \$3,500 in jewels from the home of Earl M. Daniels at Highland Park, Calif. Sheriff Wilbanks did his sleuth-

ing in Texas boots and ten-gallon hat. He drawled to reporters that he enjoyed the city, particularly when the fire trucks were screaming to fires. He was especially interested when they came to put out a fire at his hotel.

Fame came to West Texas when Frank Norfleet turned detective and succeeded in placing over seventy criminals behind the bars three of whom had swindled him of his life's savings.

Will Sheriff Wilbanks become another Norfleet? Only time will tell. But Texas has always resorted to stern methods of disposing of highway killers in her courts. Brown was returned to Texas after an extradition fight, and

was taken to Perryton Monday. Orin J. Brown of Chicago, was identified positively there by seven Perryton people as the man who was seen there in the com-pany of Mrs. Leota Murphy the morning of March 20, the day her body was found on a highway in Hansford County, according to District Attorney W. L. McCon-nell. An eighth witness was not

positive of the identification. When confronted in a hotel room by those making the identi fication, Brown claimed that he had never been in Texas except once when he passed through the Panhandle in 1934 and that he had never seen any of the persons identifying him. He maintained that he was in Chicago at the time of the slaying
