Details Of Fighting.

Chefoo, Nov. 3.-When the Japanese drove the Russians from the strong positions on the last range of hills in front of the fortress by surprise attack July 30 the Russians retired to the forts, but they also strongly held previously prepared advance lines to prevent the Japanese from closing up the fortified ridges. The division was ordered to take Taku and Shahku mountains August 7 and bombardment began in the afternoon. Eight Japanese regiments gained a foothold on the encounter compelled the Russians to retire westward into their permanent forts. The Japanese regiments then combined for an attack on Shahku mountain, but were repulsed and compelled to spend the night in their trenches in the foot hills. At 11 o'clock in the morning the attack was renewed and the hills captured. The Russians left hundreds of dead on the abandoned positions. The Japanese casualties were fourteen hundred.

Japan's Worst Enemy.

One of the most serious proplems confronting the Japanese army surgeons at the seat of war in the prevalence of beri-beri. It is stated and open session at the Baptist that the losses from this disease exceed the total casualties in the fighting, Every transport bound for Japan takes hundreds of sufferers. One general has been invalided by the disease. The beseigers of Port Arthur are suffering the worst, and it is said that between this disease and casualties one division has been Mrs. Gray. almost extinguished. The cause of the outbreak is unkown, though believers in the nitrogen-starvation ry spirit.-Miss J. Hunt. theory of the desease find support for their views in the epidemic.

At Waco Thursday, Melvin Peters, charged with false swearing in cases where he secured a considerable sum of money from the International and Great Northern railway by claiming that he had been injured while in the service of the road, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. The case is an interesting one. Peters got money from the Katy railroad on alleged injuries. Between five and six thousand dollars was secured from railroads in all.

In considering the matter of filling the vacancy caused by the death of our late County Judge, there was an aspirant for the office who graclously offered himself as a sacrifice in "the ring," and the Commissioners Court, in the plentitude of its power, saw fit to thwart this noble sacrifice, and to tender the position to the present incumbent, who was not an applicant for the same, believing that he possessed qualifications which best fitted him



Holding up Decision.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 1.-The origin and scope of socialism. railroad commission is holding up its decision in the case of the alleged consolidation of the Fort Worth and Denver City and Colorado Southern railways, on account of the multitude of other things demanding attention.

The commission has not stated what its final action will be, but it is generally believed they will instruct the attorney general to institute suit to forfeit its charter.

The commissioners believe a practical consolidation of these lines has been effected in violation of the laws of Texas, or they would not have moved against. The attorney general holds that consolidation has been made and so advised the commission, and upon these hypotheses the opinion is based that the Denver people will be proceeded against.

Judge Spoonts, the general attorney for the road, made a very learned and elaborate talk before the commission at the late hearing, several hours in length, showing from his point of view that no consolidation had been accomplished, and the apparent union was merely a change in the ownership and character of stock to subserve business ends, but it is not believed that he converted any member to the legality and correctness of his view.




