## DAWN-DUSK WORLD

FLIGHT HIS DREAM
815 Miles an Hour Needed, Says Scientist.
New York,-Around the world in daylight period on a long summer day, Is the dream of Dr. Charles H. T.
Townsend of Itaquaquecetuba, Brazil, writing in the Scientific Monthly. To
do thls at ${ }^{-1}$ the latitude of New York would require a constant speed of 815
milles an hour, nearly three times the highest speed yet attained by airplanes over even short distances. Even at that, however, Doctor Town-
send does not think his dream outside fying only a short time ago, after centurles, and he has already far outdone the blrds in speed, in altitude
and in welghts carried, though be has and in welghts carried, though he has
not yet proved himself the equal of stop flights.
To reach the terrifle speed neces-
sary for a dawn-to-dusk flight around the world, however, a different ani-
mal model will have to be studled, in the opinton of Doctor Townsend.
He has made observatlons on the flight of a certain genus of large tlies,
known to sclentists as Cephenemyta, known to sclentists as Cephenemyla,
which have flying speeds of about 400 yards a second, or over 800 miltes an
hour. This does not equal the veloctty of a modern rifle bullet, but ts faster than an old-fashloned musket
ball and as fast as the prejectlles of certain kinds of artillery. If such
veloelty could be reached by a flying machine it would eastly accompllsh
the feat dreamed of by Dector Townthe feat dreamed of by Doctor Town-
send. It is ndmitted that this would not
be easy to nceomplish by any ulight
mechanlsm known at present but the fact remains that the flles do it. Thetr analogy to a long-flight alrplane is
the stronger, Doctor Townsend polnts out, in that the flles eat nothtng what
ever during thelr several weeks of adult life, Hthng and tlying entirety on energy stored up in the reserve
food matertal latd up in thetr bodtes during their prolonged feedting period
as grubs. That is to say, they carry fuel and ratlons for all the flying that
they exer do.

Ice-Bound Five Weeks,
Ship Crosses Sea in 12 Boston.-Nearly three months since ten, a voyage that usually takes less than three weeks, the steamer Baltic, Capt. O. Lodin, warped into dock at Charlestown with a story of having sea for flve weeks.
The steamer left Stockholm with a cargo of wood pulp, polished granite and other merchandise. It made the

where it finished loading. The five succeedling weeks were passed frozen In the ice of the northern sea, and it was only through persistent efforts to open a path with the assistance
of two fce-breaking boats sent out by the Swedish government that it was extricated.
With provisions low and coal nearly exhausted, the steamer Hmped bsck to Stockholm, where lts bunk-
ers were replenished. It next went Into drydock for minor repatrs. Through the unusually long voyage, Captain Lodin sald the health of his
