



Home Cured Pork Is Best

Curing pork for home consumption is so simple the layman may practice it with assurance of success, says Roy W. Snyder, originally meat specialist of the Texas A&M College Extension Service.

The recipe is very simple—a mixture of salt, sugar and saltpeter in the ratio of 8 pounds of salt, 3 pounds of sugar and three ounces of salt peter. This quantity would provide for 100 pounds of tect false propaganda coming meat. Loan Shark Evil Is Revived

Texas has had loan sharks for nore than 100 years.

Not always have the collectors of usurious interest been known by the expressive name now commonly applied to them, but their munds Travis, widely known Texas newspaperman, in a brochure, "A Century of Usury in Texas," published this month by The Cordova Press, Inc., Dallas.

This 72 page booklet is the most comprehensive work on its subject that has yet appeared in Texas. It includes the history of usury, the law of usury, and the story of all forms of efforts that have been made to eradicate usury. Texas newspapers are commended for the work they have done in exposing the practices of loan sharks.

Usury, Mr. Travis points out, available at the county agricul- has existed from the earliest times, and nothing has ever cured it except legitimate competition with the usurers. Discussing the question of how such competition can be provided, the author of "A Century of Usury in Texas" declares that experience has shown that small unsecured loans cannot be made profitably if a taken up their abode in and flat rate of 10 per cent interest per annum, the limit provided in the Constitution, is made to cover all costs. He rejects as possible solutions all plans involving a higher rate of interest on small oans than that fixed for loans

generally. Instead, he suggests the application of Blackstone's

thought that a legal limit should be fixed for loans in general and that special hazards should be cared for by special fees.

"Each borrower," Mr. Travis says, "should pay the fair value of services rendered and experses incurred to give his loan the standing contemplated in the fixing of the interest rate." In commercial banking transactions, he reminds, the bank's rate of interest is offered only to those who can qualify for it-and the borrower himself must provide the proof that his proposition is "bankable." It is the application of this principle to the making of small unsecured loans that Mr. Travis proposes as a remedy for Texas' loan shark problem.
