Historical Markers Placed At Various Places In County

Callahan County Historical the older parts of cemeteries. Survey Committee met Monday evening, July 29th, in the home of Mrs. S. L. McEiroy. B. C. Chrisman, chairman, presided for the business meeting.

Mr. Chrisman read a list of the historical markers which have been placed in various parts of the county, on homes, trees and graves, which are of special significance in the his-tory of Callahan County. It was voted that, as soon as funds can be secured, markers will be placed on the Presbytcr-ian Church in Baird (the oldest church building in town); on the Jim Prew home in Clyde (the home of pioneer settlers in Clyde); and on the old Var-ner home at Cottonwood (the former home of a pioneer school

former home of a pioneer school teacher, the late H. S. Varner).

teacher. the late H. S. Varner). Mr. Chrisman reported that the marker has been received to mark a location on the "Old Corn Road" on the John Berry ranch, north of Clyde. This road, extending from Austin to Fort Phantom Hill, was used before the Civil War for transporting, among other things, feed for the horses used for soldiers at the forts. forts




