"The question to be decided," says the decision, "is, 'Has the court trying a contested election case the power to set aside a local option election for bribery where a sufficient number of bribed votes have been cast to affect the results?' This question, we think, should receive an affirmative answer. Article 3397 of our revised statutes empowers any court of competent jurisdiction (which is now the district court) to adjudge a local option to be void when it is made to 'appear from the evidence that the election was illegally or fraudulently conducted." We cannot well conceive of a clearer case of illegality, and fraud in the holding of an election than one in which a fair expression of the will of the majority is defeated by conspiracy and bribery."
