Some rain gauges in the east part of town showed 1 1-8 to 1 1-4 inch of moisture fell dur-ing that weekend. Total rainfall for the year now stands at 1.82, which is ap-proximately one-half the nor-mal amount of moisture for this date.

situation, no choice in the mat-ter. The cross, on the other hand, is always avoidable. The individual can refuse to accept the cross; he can refuse to suf-fer; he can refuse to die. Thus, to "take up one"s cross" means voluntarily to accept and fol-low a course of action that will lead to suffering and perhaps to death in order to do the will of God. Today, we want to be Chris-"And he said to them all, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." Luke 9:23. me." Luke 9:23. The fundamental question Christians need to ansyer is whether they are willing to 'take up their cross" with Jesus in order to accomplish the will of God in the world. Through the centuries the cross has been central in the Christian faith. On it Jesus died that we might live. By the cross He did for man what man could never do for himself. It is no wonder that the "emblem of suffering and shame" is central in the love and devotion of Christians. But the cross is more than an event of the past; it is a present re-ality which the Christian must experience." I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me." (Gal. 2:20). Nor is it a 'once time" experience; it is a way of life. As Paul said, "I die daily." I Cor. 15:31). For manly people any tragedy, disaster, or affliction is con-sidered a "cross" which one must bear. But this interpreta-tion mistakes a "cross" for what Paul called a "thorn in the flesh." "A thorn in the flesh" is some affliction or tragedy which is unavoidable. The indi-vidual had no control over the B & PW Club Heors

We rationalize, compromise, wa-ter-down, and become like those about us who have rejected the cross. Not so with Peter and John. Coming into conflict with the world, they said, "We can-not but speak the things which we have seen and heard." (Acts 4:20). They had good reason to follow the principle of expe-diency. They could have reason-ed that considerable progress had been made through early preaching of the Word of God. Perhaps they should slow down and consolidate their gains. They might be able to win more of the Jew if they did not get into serious conflict with the authorities. Why risk antagon-zing them? After all, one could not do much preaching from prison. 

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
