This vote, taken only a few minutes before 6 o'clock, was the climax of a notable day in the senate. It began one hour earlier than the usual time of convening, to enable Mr. Beveridge to finish the speech that he had begun yesterday. After he had concluded the debate continued until 4 o'clock under the ten-minute rule. A number of the best debaters in the senate took advantage of the opportunity, and the crowd which, beginning to gather at noon, began to fill the galleries until every foot of standing room was occupied, was repaid by such forensic displays and scenes of animation as do not often occur in the senate.

The Dubois amendment forbidding any Mormon from voting or holding office in either state was adopted without objection.

The Foraker amendment striking out all provisions and granting statehood to New Mexico and Arizona was defeated by a vote of 112,000 acres in Garza, Lvnn and 36 to 35.


