Lady Bulldogs thrash Frank Phillips

The Lady Bulldogs embraced their entrance back into the competitive WJAC with a 73-52 thrashing of Frank Phillips Monday in Borger.

But they can't sit on their laurels as they prepare for a Thursday meeting with Odessa College in Clarendon. Tip-off is set for 5:50 p.m. Play in the WJAC continues Monday in Snyder with a meeting of Western Texas College.

"We've played (Odessa) twice and split with them," head coach Joel Zehr said. "We've got to play well. We didn't play well down at their place, but I think we'll be ready to play and start conference play 2-0."

The Lady Bulldogs started off slow against the Lady Plainsmen, trailing 12-8 with 12:00 to play, Zehr said. "We didn't play good, our posters played well, but we had too many turnovers and we weren't making good entry passes."

Clarendon committed 13 turnovers in the opening period. Kirl Neptune came on with 16 points in the first half, and Clarendon High School product Corey Knorpp hit two treys for a 38-23 half-time advantage.

"(Knorpp) sparked us and right before half," Zehr said. "A Frank Phillips player was about

to hit a three when (Knorpp) took her out of it, and she made an air ball."

The Bulldogs started off sluggish before the Lady Bulldogs started going strong to the inside, Zehr said. Andrea Watson scored 11 of her 18 points in the second half.

"Four of our people had the bulk of our scoring," Zehr said.

Scorers for Clarendon were Neptune, 22; Watson, 18; Maxie Flores, 12; Knorpp, 6; Shania Laury, 6; Kasey Parks, 4; Trish Castillo, 3; and Mahilia Simpson, 2.

Abdullah, Elliott named to All-State Football Team

Two members of the 1997 Clarendon Broncos football team — wide receiver Kareem Abdullah and quarterback Scotty Elliott — are recently named to the Class 2A All-State team.

Abdullah, who also starred in the defensive secondary and as a kick returner, reeled in 59 passes for a total of 827 yards and five touchdowns. The speedy senior averaged 14 yards per catch.

His 59 catches led all Texas Panhandle receivers in any school classification.

Of making the elite team, the three-year starter said, "I have really enjoyed playing football for Clarendon. Making the All-Star team my senior year is an honor."

"One of my biggest thrills of the year came in our last game when I caught a touchdown pass against White Deer to keep them from shutting us out. White Deer shut out a lot of teams this season, so it was kind of special to bust up that shutout and finish my career that way."

Elliott completed 131 passes for a total of 1804 yards and 14 touchdown passes. The junior signal-caller connected on 53 percent of his attempts.

Elliott, who has thrown 20 TD passes in his Bronco career, led the Texas Panhandle in all school classifications in completions and yardage. He finished second in the Panhandle in all school classifications in completions and yardage. He finished second in the Panhandle in TD passes, missing that title by one scoring toss. Elliott also tallied six rushing touchdowns.

"I am honored to have made the team," Elliott said. "I gave the credit to our offensive line for some solid blocking and to our wide receivers for making some great catches. Our coaching staff gave me the opportunity to throw the ball a lot, and my teammates came through for me time and again."

Elliott was named the Class 2A

"Player of the Week" in the Panhandle after throwing for 318 yards and three touchdowns against Sunray to lead the Broncos to a homecoming victory in a lightning shortened game.

Both Abdullah and Elliott were also named first team All-District. Abdullah made it on both sides of the ball.

Also named to the All-District first team for the Broncos was wide out Brent Gaines.

Flanker Cael Shields notched second-team honors, as did defensive tackle Brandon Word and noseguard Oren Shields. Gaines also made the second team in the secondary.

CC Livestock Judging Team wins Arizona contest

The Clarendon College Livestock Judging team started off 1998 with a first place win at the Arizona National Livestock Show in Phoenix on January 3.

The Clarendon College team defeated competitors such as Linn Benton College (OR); Coffeyville State College (OK); Coffeyville Community College (KS); and Modesto College (CA), to bring home the championship title. The team also placed second in cattle, second in swine, and sixth in sheep.

"The competition was truly tough," Coach Jerry Hawkins said. "Connors State College won both the American Royal and Louisville, and Linn Benton College placed third at both the American Royal and Louisville."

Individual honors include the following: Jason Hoffman, fourth - cattle; Ross Dalby, sixth - cattle; Jason Hoffman, sixth - sheep; Clint McWaters, fourth - swine; Mick Clark, sixth - swine; Kelli Griffith,

eighth - swine; Jason Joffman, fifth - reasons; and Ross Dalby, ninth - reasons.

Hoffman was the second highest scoring individual in the contest, while Dalby finished sixth overall, Clark eleventh, and McWaters twelfth.

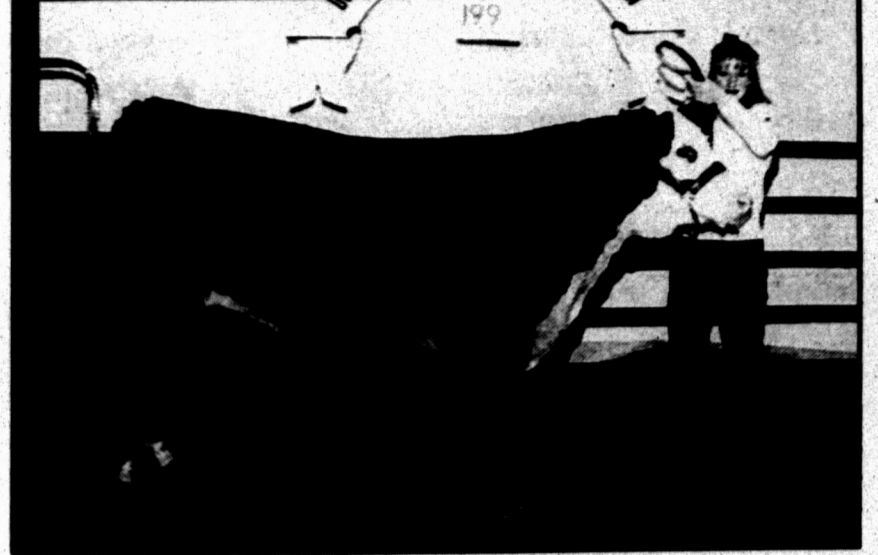

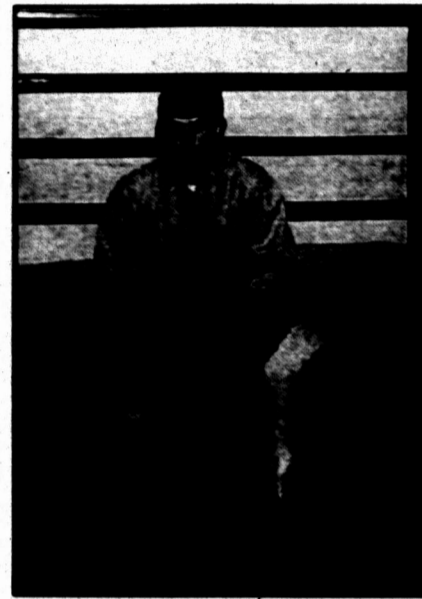

Farm Service Agency offers loans to special groups

The Farm Service Agency has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Gray, Donley, Armstrong, Wheeler, and Carson counties, Larry J. Goetze, FSA Ag Credit Manager, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans,

Asians, and Pacific Islanders. FSA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for a FSA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make loan for purchase of land on the open market, Goetze said.

FSA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the bor-

rower get started. People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farm Service Agency county office in their area.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibits discrimination of its programs on the basis of race, color, national origin,

sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, and marital or familial status. (Not all prohibited basis apply to all programs.) The following are requirements for enrollment: child must be four years old on or before September 1, 1997; family meets income guidelines; family on public assistance; child had documented disability, or a foster child. Children

are enrolled based on need, not first come first serve.

Guardians of the children wishing to enroll in Head Start must bring with them the child's birth certificate, income verification (check stubs, income tax, etc.), immunization records, social security numbers, documentation of disability (if applicable), and proof of assistance (food stamp card, AFDC benefits, Medicaid, WIC, SSI, or HUD).

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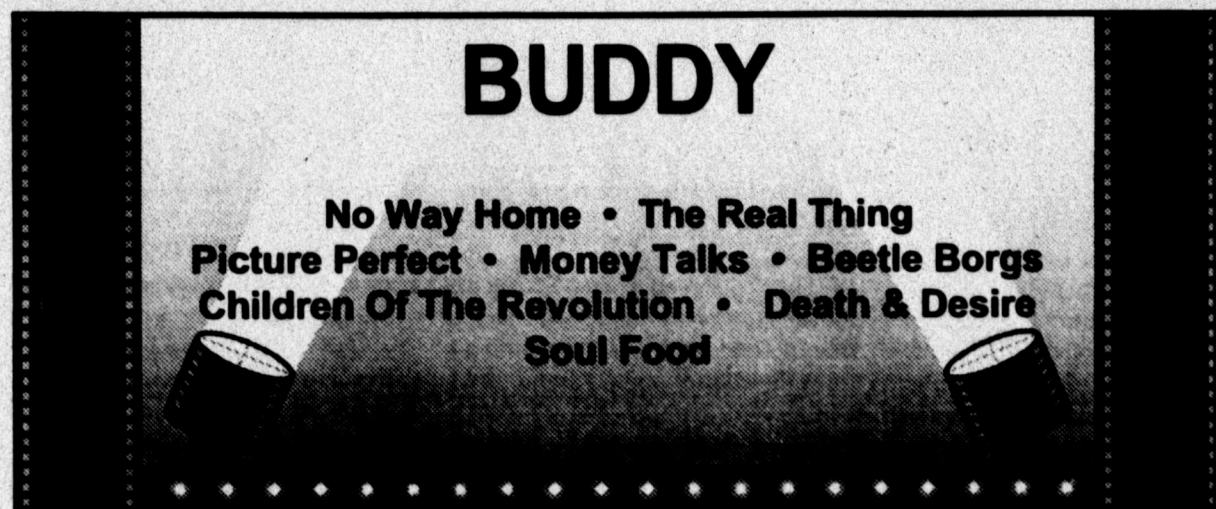
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Lady Broncs win Salt Fork Classic Tournament

The Clarendon Lady Broncs played near-perfect basketball as they defeated number one ranked Farwell in the final round of the Salt Fork Classic Jan. 3 at Clarendon College.

Clarendon held off the Lady Steers 60-43 in a round in which they trailed only once 0-2.

"I thought the Lady Broncs put on an amazing display," head coach Steve Schmidt said.

The Broncs made number seven ranked Panhandle Friday at 6:30 p.m. in the Bronco Gym in their second district game of the year.

Clarendon, particularly senior Kasi Ashcraft, shot well from the line in the final period to keep Farwell at bay.

"The whole team did a great job on the free throw line when it counted," Schmidt said.

Clarendon shot 19 times from the charity stripe, connecting on nine of those. Ashcraft was 4-for-4 in the final quarter and 6-for-6 in the contest. Clarendon led 14-13 after one quarter behind tournament MVP Melisse Campbell's seven points and went on a wild scorefest in the second quarter with 22 points and a 36-22 lead. Catherine Chamberlain a try and hit three free throws while all-tournament selection Kim Alexander made three baskets.

The Lady Broncs led 47-30 at the end of three periods behind Alexander's seven points. Farwell, who is ranked number one in the TABC Class 1A, and who have beaten defending Class 1A champ Whiteface and Class 2A 1997 regional finalist Spearman on their press to take them to their number-one ranking. But the Lady Broncs had no problem busting the press.

"We also outrebounded and

outlasted a team that works about as hard as anyone around," Schmidt said. "It was a great win heading into district."

Scoring for the Broncs were Alexander, 15; Campbell, 13; America Santos, 8; Lindsey Eads, 8; Ashcraft, 8; Chamberlain, 6; and Geri Butler, 2.

"(MVP) Campbell did a sensational job leading the team, and (all-tournament) Alexander was very impressive," Schmidt said. "She had 16 rebounds to go with her 15 points."

To get to the final round, Clarendon had to get by a feisty Allison squad, who did not go down easy. Clarendon led 16-13 after one period and 36-30 at halftime as Campbell connected on 5-of-6 from the free throw line.

"We knew Allison would be tough, but not this tough," Schmidt said. "I thought we weren't playing well, but I think Allison works hard and does things that make you look bad."

Allison took the lead after three quarters as they led the Lady Broncs to five points and scored 13 of their own. Clarendon was down nine points with less than 5:00 on the clock, making the final minutes a battle, Schmidt said.

The Lady Broncs relied on the free throw line in the fourth quarter, shooting 23 free throws and making 14. They outscored Allison 17-8 in the fourth quarter as Campbell made a free, a field goal and shot 8-for-12 from the charity stripe for the 58-51 win.

Scoring for the Broncs were Campbell, 20; Alexander, 10; Ashcraft, 10; Eads, 8; Santos, 5; Chamberlain, 3; and Butler, 2.

"This is the type of game we

needed to prepare us for district," Schmidt said. "Allison's victory over Spearman on Saturday showed us even more what a good team we beat."

The Lady Broncs had an easier time with Wheeler as they steamrolled the Mustangs 72-37 in the tournament's opening round. Ashcraft scored a team-high 23 points, converting 5-of-7 free throws. Campbell and Eads were in double figures with 16 and 13 points.

"We started the tournament off with a dominant win," Schmidt said. "Our good ball movement gave us a lot of easy, open shots. I really like to see the balanced scoring."

Scoring for the Broncs were Ashcraft, 23; Campbell, 16; Eads, 13; Alexander, 9; Santos, 4; Butler, 4; and Chamberlain, 3.

The Lady Broncs also had an easy time with Shamrock Dec. 30 in the Bronco Gym coasting to an 81-39 victory. "I was very proud of the effort and the intensity the girls played with," Schmidt said. "The girls played really well against a team that is not near as bad as they looked on that particular night."

Clarendon was 7-of-13 from behind the arc. Scoring for the Lady Broncs were Eads, 21; Campbell, 15; Ashcraft, 15; Butler, 11; Alexander, 11; Santos, 6; and Smith, 2.

Class 2A rival Canadian put a damper on the Lady Broncs' four-game winning streak as they outscored Clarendon 57-44 Jan. 6 in a final. The Lady Wildcats led 15-5 after the first quarter as Campbell hit a try and Ashcraft was 2-for-2 from the charity stripe. "We really picked a bad night to come out flat and injured," Schmidt said. "We didn't bounce back from the tournament with that same kind of emotion, and Canadian was very ready

to play and hungry to win."

The Lady Broncs made some headway in the second quarter rattling off 15 points to Canadian's 11 as Canadian led 26-20. Clarendon struggled in the third quarter with seven points and allowed Canadian to score 10 as they pushed the lead to 36-27. The Lady Broncs shot 3-for-7 in the final period as they scored 17 points and Canadian scored 21-10 from the charity stripe.

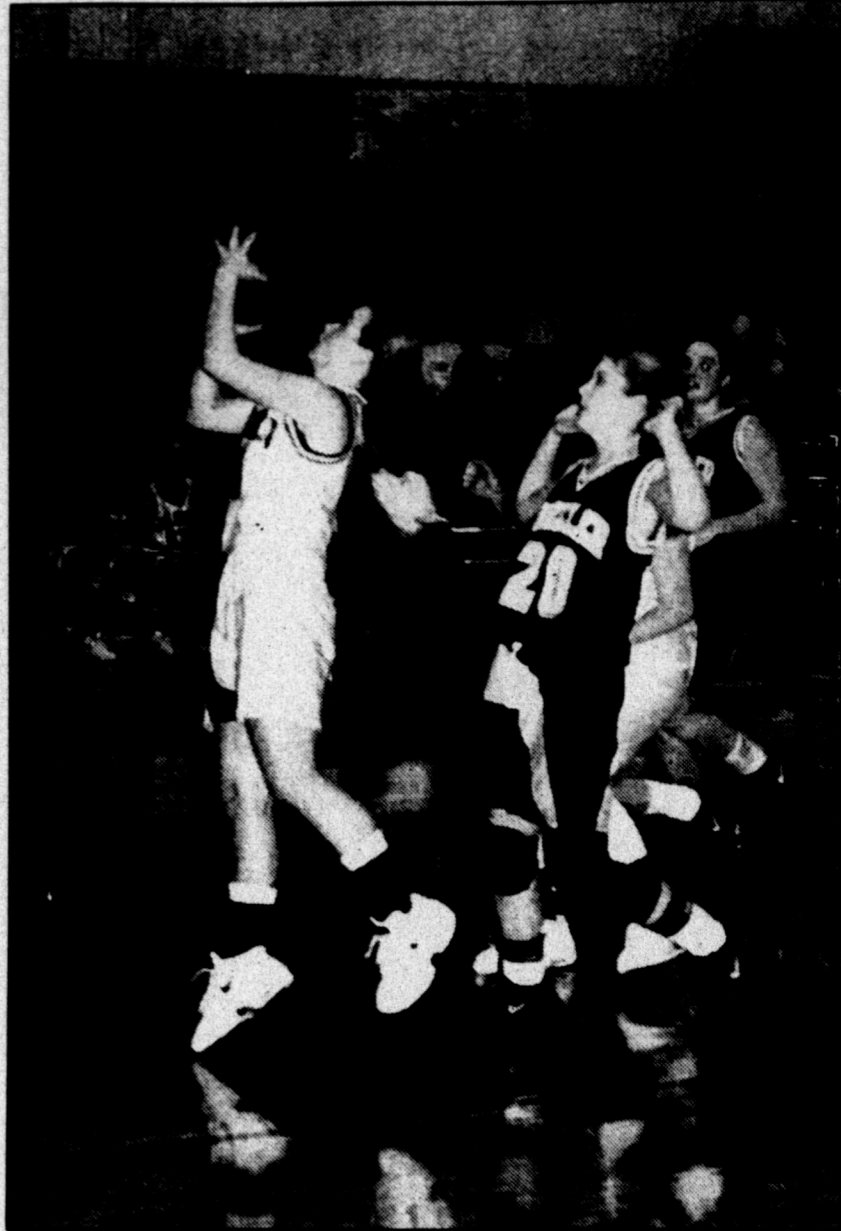
"It was probably good to bring us back down to reality," Schmidt said. "We must be ready to play every night against every one."

Scoring for the Broncs were Campbell, 19; Ashcraft, 16; Santos, 3; Eads, 3; Butler, 2; and Chamberlain, 1.

Groom put up a challenge early on in their Jan. 9 contest, leading 13-11 after the first quarter. But Clarendon outscored the Lady Tigers 17-10 in the second quarter for a 28-23 halftime advantage. "It was not a great game for us, but we'll take the win," Schmidt said. "I think the district games getting ready to start had us going through the motions for this last predistrict game. "We'll really need to wake up and get the fire and intensity back for district."

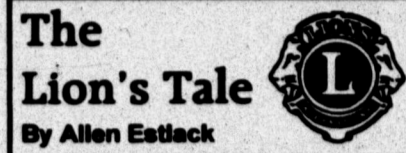

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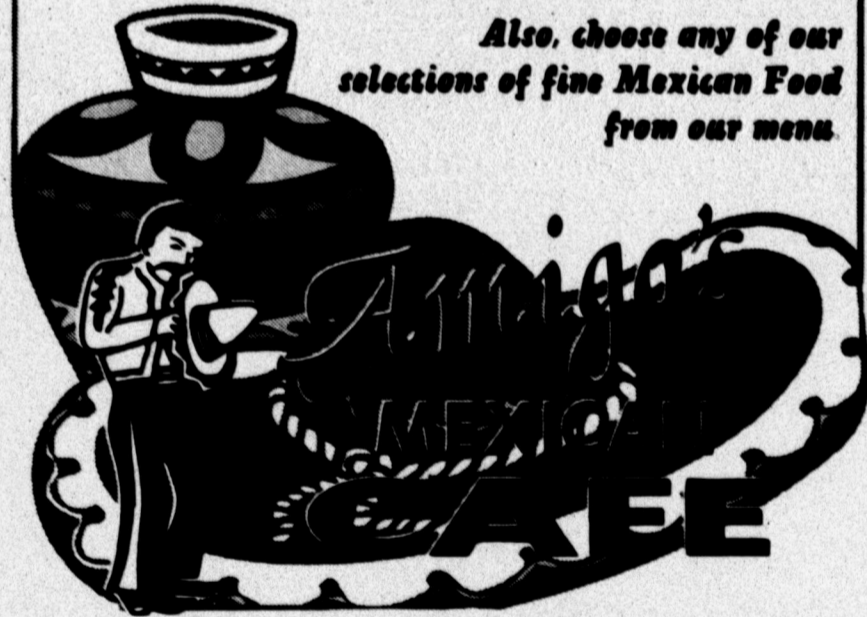
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CC's Judging Team places at in Oklahoma

Breastfeeding benefits extend beyond the baby

HOUSTON — Mothers who breastfeed are not only making life better for their infants but are also paving the way for a healthier life for themselves.

"Studies have shown women who breast-feed have a reduced risk of contracting pre-menopausal breast cancer," said Dr. Judy Hopkinson at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "A woman's risk of bone fractures from osteoporosis later in life may also be reduced."

Mothers who breast-feed also benefit from hormones released during breastfeeding.

"One of these hormones, oxytocin, helps a mother's uterus return to

its pre-pregnancy state more quickly," said Hopkinson, a Baylor assistant professor of pediatrics. "Hormones also help mothers to relax and focus on their infants. Many women who breast-feed report feeling a special closeness with their babies."

While mothers benefit in many ways from breast-feeding, infants are the biggest beneficiaries.

"Breast-fed babies are less likely to develop allergies or serious illnesses, such as diarrhea, and bacterial meningitis, and one-third less likely to be re-admitted to the hospital in the first year of life," said Hopkinson. "Other studies suggest breast-feeding may prevent a child from contracting diseases such as diabetes, and lym-

ph nodes. Recent studies have also found parents of babies who are breast-fed spend fewer dollars on medical care.

In addition, breast-fed infants may be more intelligent than formula-fed infants. New evidence suggests that breast-fed infants have higher IQ's and perform better in school than formula-fed infants, despite socioeconomic differences.

"Mothers who breast-feed are providing their infants with the best possible nutrition," Hopkins said. "They are also protecting them from disease and maximizing the chance for optimal neurological development, reducing their health care costs and improving the mother's long-term health outlook."
