Every advertiser benefits from everything in a newspaper. He buys the support of the whole newspaper. In contrast, he certainly cannot draw benefit from a full day's run on radio or TV, according to one of the nation's leading foodstore executives.

The grocer was speaking to a group of small retailers.

He explained that everything in the newspaper leads some attraction to even the smallest advertisement.

"We know that when the newspaper has good local coverage, good feature articles, or an interesting editorial page, the content is part of our supporting program.

"As a matter of policy, our stores use full page displays, but we are aware that smaller advertisers get the same support we get," he said.

"Ten, twenty or thirty dollars, depending upon local rates, will buy you the attention value commanded by a whole newspaper. This makes every effective consumer in your community a potential reader of any newspaper ad.

"What could you get for the same money in any other media? On the air, an accidental audience of limited quantity and uncertain quality. It could buy a few pieces of direct mail or circulars of even more questionable value. But some merchants continue to pour money down free running drains."

The grocer added: "I challenge any small retailer to use a two-inch newspaper ad consistently for two months. If you are not convinced of its comparative superiority at the end of that time, I stand branded as a public liar."

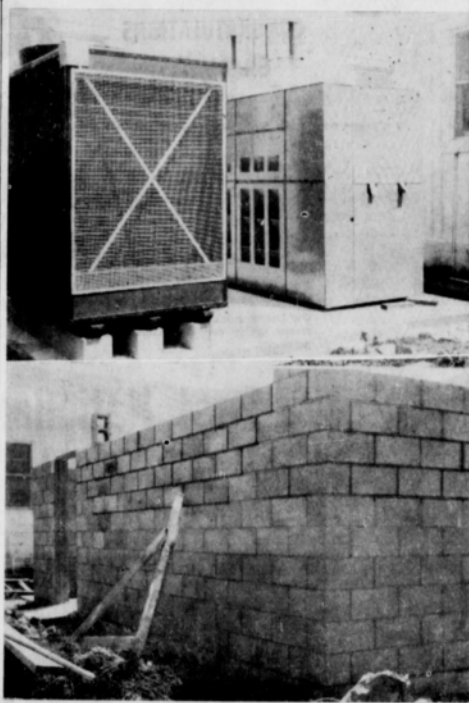

INSTALLATION OF COOLING, HEATING UNITS UNDERWAY

The goal of \$3,500.00 to purchase a central heating and cooling system for Callahan County Hospital has been reached and installation was begun about two weeks ago. A total of \$3,591.59 has been raised since the drive began in early April.

The 25-ton unit, located outside, behind the hospital, has a life expectancy of 25 years and will heat and cool the entire hospital building.

Installation of the system should be completed and in operation by June 1, according to Bob McKennon, local Lone Star Gas Co. manager.

Also, construction of the outside storage building for oxygen, etc., is well under way and should be completed in the near future.

Lt. Larry Gardiner, Former Baird Resident, Receives DFC in Vietnam

Lt. Lawrence E. Gardiner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gardiner of Roswell, N. M., formerly of Baird, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and Navy Commendation Medal for heroism while serving as a pilot in Attack Squadron 25.

A successful night rescue of an Air Force F-105 pilot last November brought the honors to the Roswell man, who is currently stationed at Lemoore Naval Air Station in California.

Lt. Gardiner was piloting an A-1H Skyraider flying off the USS Coral Sea as a wingman of a two-plane escort for a rescue helicopter and flew above and behind the rescue aircraft providing effective flank suppression and navigational aid to the rescue helicopter pilot who

was unfamiliar with the area and hampered in his navigation by dusk and heavy overcast.

Lt. Gardiner, with three missile sites and numerous anti-aircraft artillery emplacements sending up fire, acted as decoy to the enemy's ground fire and "demonstrated superior airmanship," a citation reads.

With two minutes of fuel remaining, the helicopter landed aboard a destroyer.

"Lt. Gardiner's superior airmanship, professional competence and gallant tactics were instrumental to the success of this rare night rescue. His actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Navy Service," Admiral Roy L. Johnson said, in awarding the DFC.

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

"And he goeth up into a mountain, calleth unto him whom he would; and they came unto him. And he ordained twelve, that they should be with him, and that he might send them forth to preach. And to have power to heal sickness, and to cast out devils." Mark 3:13-15.

It is very important to remember that Christianity began with a group. The scripture very clearly indicates that the Christian faith must be lived out in a fellowship. The whole essence of the way of the Pharisees was that it separated men from their fellow men; the very name Pharisees means the "separated one"; the whole essence of Christianity was that it bound men to their fellow men, and presented them with the responsibility of living with each other and for each other.

Christianity, therefore, began with a very mixed group. In the experience of Christ by faith the two extremes met. Matthew was a tax-collector, therefore, an outcast. He was a renegade and a traitor to his fellow countrymen. Simon the Cananaean is called by Luke, Simon the Zealot. The Zealots were a band of fiery and violent nationalists who were pledged to murder and assassination to clear the country of the foreign powers that controlled them. Therefore, in this fellowship of Christians the man who was lost to patriotism and the fanatical patriot came together, and no doubt there was between them all kinds of views and backgrounds and opinions. Christianity began by insisting that the most diverse people should live together and by enabling them to do so, they were all living with Jesus.

Judging them by worldly standards the men Jesus chose had no special qualifications at all. They were not wealthy; they had no special social position; they had no special education; they were twelve ordinary men. But they did have two special qualifications. First, they had

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Tourist Development Is Theme Of Regional Meeting at Comanche

"Community effort in tourist development" will be the main theme of a County Historical Survey Committee regional meeting in Comanche on May 22. B. C. Chrisman, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee as well as committee members have been invited to represent their county at this meeting.

Among topics to be discussed is the governor's new proposal calling for the designation of a state-wide system of "Recreational, Scenic and Historic Roadways." Connally said the basic idea for the roadways is: "to guide tourists off high-speed expressways and into our byways. This would encourage tourists to stay longer and Texas would benefit from the increased revenue."

Participating in the meeting will be Phil Davis, community relations chief, Texas Tourist Development Agency. Davis will make a presentation on HemisFair '68, and give pointers on

what local communities can do to attract tourists during 1967, which in Davis' words, "promises to be the biggest year for tourism in the state's history."

Officials of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to participate in the meeting are: Executive Director Truett Latimer, to speak on "History and Tourism," and Robert L. Watson, director of field operations who will talk on "Effective County Committee Organization."

Carriers To Deliver Survey Cards

Postmaster John Towler reminds rural patrons of Baird Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey Cards. Next week mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," the Postmaster explained. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. In this way the Department of Agriculture gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holding."

Carriers assisting with the survey will be Mr. Terrell Williams, Rural Route No. 1, Mr. George Gillitt, Star Route 1, and Mrs. Winnie Burks, Star Route 2.

Survey Cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets. Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions. The cooperation of all patrons is earnestly solicited.

Veterans May Claim Medals

Millions of unclaimed medals earned by World War II and Korean War veterans are stacked up in warehouses around the country, according to the Veterans Administration.

Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco, revealed that the Army alone has some 800,000 pounds of medals in a Philadelphia warehouse.

Among the medals there are over one and a half million Victory Medals, a decoration earned by almost everyone who served in World War II.

The VA manager said that veterans interested in securing medals to which they are entitled should write a letter to the military branch in which they served.

Letters should contain full particulars about their military service, units to which assigned, and above all, the letter should contain the veterans name and serial number.

The Poetry Society of Texas announces the recent appointment of Mrs. Harrell Cheves of Clyde as its area counselor. The Society, organized in 1921, has more than 600 members. Members are eligible to compete in the monthly and annual contests sponsored by the Society.

A permanent collection of nearly 900 books and pamphlets of holograph poems by members is kept in the Texas Room of the Dallas Public Library. Persons in sympathy with the general purposes of the Poetry Society are cordially invited to join. It is not necessary to be a practicing poet in order to be a valued member.

Social Security Benefits Up in Co.

\$1,287,264 in social security benefits was paid to residents of Callahan County last year, up 9.8 per cent from the year before.

At the end of 1966, 1760 men, women and children in Callahan County were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$107,272. R. R. Tuley Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, reported today, 1483 were older people, he said, receiving benefits as retired workers, the wives and husbands of retired workers and as the surviving widows or aged dependent parents of workers who have died.

"But social security is not just for older people," Tuley pointed out. 151 young widows and children in Callahan County were receiving benefits amounting to \$8,466 at the end of December. 126 disabled workers and dependants were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$8,078.

Texas totals were \$68,178,133 going monthly to 1,068,955 persons. The national figures were \$1,638,548,392 to 22,767,252 persons.

"Practically every young family in Callahan County has survivors protection under social security that can be worth up to \$75,000 or more, and equally valuable disability insurance protection."

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies, leaving two or more children, can range from \$66 to \$368 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security.

Social Security survivors benefits, Tuley said, can be paid to the family of a young man who has worked and paid social security contributions for as little as a year and a half during the three years before his death.

Benefits to the mother and children continue until the youngest child reaches 18, or indefinitely, if the child has a disability which began before his 18th birthday and makes it impossible for him to work and become self-supporting. Under a change in the law enacted in 1965, a child's benefits can be continued up until age 22 if he or she continues in school, and is unmarried.

"As is pointed out in testimony before the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives in hearings on changes in the law now being considered," Tuley added, "the financing of the social security system allows for increases in the benefit level as earnings rise in the future without any change in the contribution rate."

Comparing social security's retirement and survivors coverage for persons past age 65 to the state old-age assistance program, he noted that out of each 1,000 such Texans, 757 received social security and 256 received old-age assistance. The national ratio was 822 on social security and 110 on old-age assistance per 1,000 persons over age 65. New Hampshire, with 892 of each 1,000 that age on social security, had the highest rate, while Louisiana, with 455 of each, 1,000 aged on assistance with high in that category.

AUSTIN — Redistricting bills are ready for test votes in the House.

A court reapportionment measure which would add 16 courts, eliminate two and provide for district realignment, was reported favorably by the House Committee on Judicial Districts.

Bill would provide two new courts each for Dallas, Harris, Bexar and Tarrant Counties. Single courts would go to these districts: Hidalgo County, 200th District; Comal and Guadalupe Counties, 201st District; Duval, Jim Hogg, Zapata and Starr Counties, 202nd District; Collin County, 203rd District; Gregg County, 204th District; Crockett, Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, Edwards, Real, Kerr and Bandera Counties, 206th District; and Wharton, Fort Bend, Matagorda and Brazoria Counties, 66th District.

It would combine district courts serving Hill and Freestone Counties with other counties. It provides for abolishing the 88th District Court, effective January 1, 1970, and the 82nd District Court, effective January 1, 1971.

Candidates for the new judgeships would run for office next year, taking over on January 1, 1969.

A congressional redistricting bill, required by an order of the federal court, is complete. But it has been held back due to controversies.

Congressional redistricting as drawn by the House Committee would require incumbent congressmen to run against another incumbent. Committee Chairman Gus Mutscher of Brenham said the bill would carve 23 new districts which vary no more than five per cent in population.

Mutscher indicated that the redistricting measure for House seats is virtually complete and will follow congressional reapportionment by about 10 days.

HORSES GALLOP AGAIN — In less time than it takes a fast stepping thoroughbred to romp a mile, the House Committee on Counties approved, on a local-option basis, a bill to legalize pari-mutual horse race betting in Texas.

House sponsors said they are not sure when they will ask for a floor vote.

Here's what the House bill proposes: Racing would be permitted in counties where voters want it, with 85 per cent of the betting pools going to bettors, two per cent to counties where tracks are operated and 13 per cent to be split between the state and the track operators. State would, in turn, divide half of its share (on a population basis) among the counties having no tracks. Bookmaking and off-track betting with bookies would be made a felony.

Senate bill has been out of committee since February but, so far, the sponsors haven't brought it to a floor test.

OPEN MEETINGS — A bill to outlaw closed-door meetings of government agencies passed the Senate unanimously.

However, an amendment would exempt departments, agencies and political divisions not supported by or spending tax funds.

Misdemeanor fines are provided for violations, and "any interested person" may launch court action for mandamus or injunction against closed meetings.

Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena handed the measure in the Senate. It now goes to the House where Rep. Bill Rapp of Raymondville is sponsor.

REVISION PLANS ADVANCED — House overwhelmingly passed a resolution proposing a method of state constitutional revision. A 20-member commission assisted by a 20-member citizens advisory committee would report recommendations to the next Legislature for submission to voters.

Rev. R. H. Cory of Victoria is author of the House resolution. Senate State Affairs Committee approved a bill to establish a 45-member constitutional revision commission. Under this

bill, by Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston, the commission on would be limited mainly to recommendations. It would offer suggestions to the Legislature for eliminating obsolete and repetitive sections.

POLLUTION MEASURES CLEARED — House passed the Senate bill to strengthen water pollution control and establish a new Texas Water Quality Board as a separate agency. Amendments will send the bill back to the Senate.

Meanwhile, the Senate has approved a bill to provide the mechanism for enforcing air pollution control measures. An amendment would allow the Air Control Board to set different standards for agricultural processors including cotton gins than are set for industries.

GRANT APPROVED — U. S. Public Health Service has approved a \$315,650 grant to Texas for a statewide immunization program.

Funds will be used for immunization campaigns in cooperation with local health agencies and medical societies against measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough. Project will continue through April 30, 1968. An additional year has been tentatively provided for with a \$325,000 grant. Supplemental budget of \$35,775 for polio vaccine has been requested.

OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY — House and Senate both have passed the compromise occupational safety bill. It now awaits Gov. John Connally's signature.

As finally passed the bill is a compromise among labor, management and the governor. It would create a Division of Occupational Safety as a part of the State Department of Health.

DOS would have the power to make and enforce rules and regulations on safety, plus authority to inspect places of employment. A qualified safety engineer would be hired to administer the program.

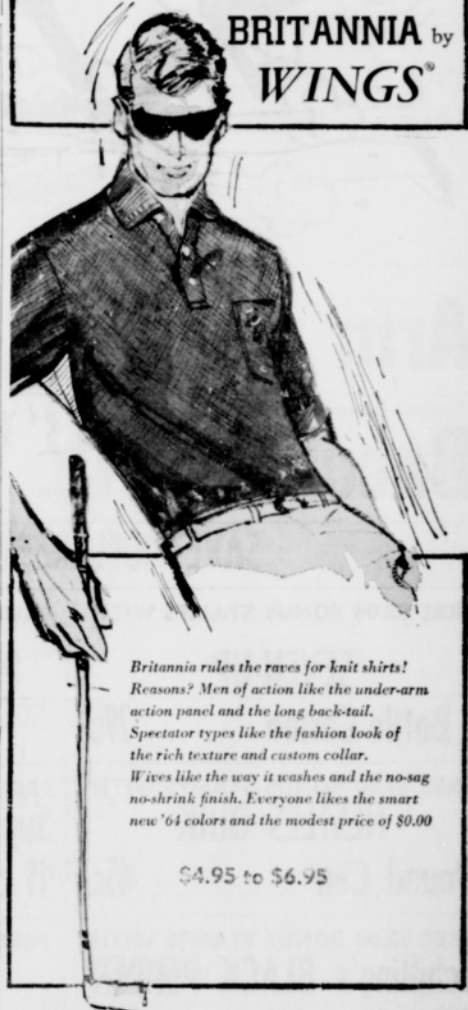
