**SIDELIGHTS**

The Donley County Museum has recently been the recipient of a number of additions to its exhibits. C. E. Griggs of this city has donated the following: several interesting pine burrs from the pinon tree, a specimen of stone from the walls of old Fort Ojo Caliente, in Box Canyon, Socorro County, New Mexico; pieces of china, Indian pottery, and glassware from the fort, some snapshots taken of the Fort and of Box Canyon; a bottle of sand from the famous White Sands desert near Almagorda, N. M.; specimens of lead from the lead mines of New Mexico; and a cane

made from a cactus stalk, and found in the Black Range mountains near Silver City.

Mrs. Ed Barnes of Clarendon has given an old-fashioned trunk to the Museum, and a fine mounted horned owl was given by Bagby Lennox of Clarksville, Texas, a nephew of Mrs. L. S. Bagby.

Mrs. Myrtle Cowan of Hedley has placed on display some relics brought back from Germany by her husband at the close of the first world war. They are a cup found in a dug-out in Germaoy, a belt picked up in No-Man's Land, a leather helmet which was a German officer's dress hat, and an iron helmet worn by himself in the trenches. ### Water Survey Has Begun

Under the sponsorship of the Texas State Board of Water Engineers, and Donley County, the Work Projects Administration is conducting a detailed survey of the underground water resources of this county. The work will be done under the immediate supervision of Wayne G. Christian, geologist, who has conducted similar surveys in Randall and Deaf Smith counties.

During the last four years complete or partially complete surveys of underground water have been made in 25 counties of the High Plains region of Texas. This region has long been noted for its abundant supply of ground water. Water for nearly every enterprise has been obtained from wells. Due to this fact it is important that this extremely valuable natural resource should be wisely used.

These surveys are being made in order that the people may know more accurately the extent of underground water and its availability for various uses. It is necessary to measure the existing wells and watch them closely for water level fluctuations; drill test wells in order that underlying strata may be carefully studied; also important is the study of springs and streams for discharge and run-off data.

There has developed a popular theory that the good wells in the High Plains are the result of the tapping of an underground river which heads in the Rockies. In fact the extensive beds in which the water occurs have been cut off by erosion from the mountains on the west. The water stored in the underground sand and gravel beds has resulted from untold years of rain and snowfall.

"Most of the surface of the High Plains is underlain by sediments that are cemented with calcium carbonate and usually called caliche. These deposits probably prevent deep penetration of surface water over most of the Plains. In places, however, the caliche is thin or has been partly removed by solution, and in such areas the water may move downward to the water table. The principle area of ground-water recharge apparently are depressions or sinks, occupied by intermittent ponds; sandy stream beds, and adjacent sandy flood plains; and sand dune areas."
