

SENATOR BAILEY saw fit to make a bitter arraignment of magazines in the senate Tuesday on the' grounds that they were responsible largely for the postal deficit. That there are a large number of cheap story papers that should be excluded from the mail, there is no denying, but the better class of magazines are as much entitled to second class mail privileges as anything published, and much more so than a lot of stuff the Senator franks through the mail without any postage. It is a little singular, too, that the Senator made his discovery of the abuse of the mail privilege by the magazines since one of them justly saw fit to criticise this important senator. we do not know whether Mr. Bailey knows as much about religious papers as he does about race courses, or not, but in referring to religious papers, he said the cost of their transportation could not be begrudged, but protested against making the non-Christian taxpayer share the expense of their distribution. while Mr. Bailey is protesting, he might get it into his head that the tax-payers, both christian and non-christian, are protesting against sharing the expense of tons of campaign literature, and of the congressmen and senators franking office furniture, laundry and other wearing apparel, worthless garden seed and other such stuff. when this is done, the postoffice department will pay its way.





If you have men in state offices who are unworthy of further support, if your representatives in the legislative body of this great state betray their trust and debauch their office, do not for a moment let the fact that you are a Republican or a Democrat stand in the way of your casting an intelligent, truly American vote that will voice a mighty irrisistible protest against the abuses of power.

"I am not making a political speech. I am endeavoring to impress upon you at this solemn occasion the necessity of striving for the right. Valor at the cannon's mouth, the patient fidelity of the thousands who languished in vile prisons, the spirit of fortitude that the wives and mothers and sisters showed, were all incidental to any strife. It was the principle of the thing that is truly great. It devolves upon us now to see that their blood was not shed in vain.

The veterans here to-day may remember with unspeakable pride the fact that they made the greatest step in the history of the world towards the true realization of that principle, but there is still much to be done, wrongs almost as grave as that swept away by the emancipation proclamation are to be combated.
