The Farmer and His Cotton.
During the meeting of the Farmers Union in Dallas this week, Pres dent Cavin, in speaking o cotton selling, said:
"Every farm product when put on the market shoud bear the union label. This label should be a badge of honesty and a guarantee that the package bearing it is honestly put up.
"Every bale of cotton sold by union men should have attached to it a union label. Nothing will do more to advertise the union and give it standing with the spinner throughout Europe than this.
Speaklng of the warehouse move ment, he also said:
" "It means that the time will come when the farmer will place his cotton in his warehonse, take his receipts and meet his obir turn the key and say to the manu facturer 'if you want to spin my cotton you must pay a just and equitable price for it.' It means equitable price for it. It means independence of which so much has been said and which he never can enjoy as long as he is compelled to sell his products he is compelled to sell his products on the atction block. It would be difficnlt to say bow many warehouses will be ready for operation this fall, but I confidently believe that the number will reach 150 or 200 .
These warehouses can be used These warehouses can be used for clearing houses during the time they are not used for storing and handling cotton and every farm product should be sold thrqugh them. The grain growers of Texas must build and own their elevators and sell their grain in a business-like way. With a properly conducted system of warehouses and grain elevators the supply of nonperishable products can be regulated to the demand, which of itself will bring about stability of price and speculation will cease to a large extent. What all should strive for is the abolition of the terrible scourge of gambling in farm products.

of the fines collected go to the prosecuting officers. Under such circumstances compromises might
easily lead to the suspicion that suits were instituted to enlarge he bank accounts of prosecutors ather than enforce the laws. Mr. Davidson should
 due penalties for their infractions or else they are entitled to a comlete and clear vindication after full and fair trial. In neither case is it the province of the at-torney-general and his assistants to render a decision.'
