Burke Musgrove Launches Campaign For Second Term

State Representative Burke Musgrove formally launched his campaign for a second term this week with a public statement issued from his legislative office in Breckenridge.

Musgrove's present term began January a year ago when he took the oath of office in unique public ceremonies in the Palo Pinto courthouse on the opening day of the legislative session. Musgrove, wanting to be sworn in "among those who elected him to serve," rather than in the mass swearing-in ceremonies that day in Austin, invited all five county judges in the district to jointly administer the oath. That same day Musgrove joined other legislators in the State's Capitol for the opening of the 60th Legislative Session, a session which considered over 2,000 bills and major resolutions and which was described by many as the most action-packed work-load in Texas history.

"By making this many decisions on such a volume of legislation it becomes impossible to please all the people all the time, and if you do manage to please all the people all the time, something is either wrong or you aren't really doing anything," Musgrove commented. "I have endeavored to be outspoken, independent and objective in my consideration of legislative matters and in the fulfillment of the duties of my office. I feel the people of this district deserve and appreciate this type of representation."

"During my recent first campaign, I advocated full-time representation for our district and pledged to be a working representative for all the people. This, I feel, I have done. Not only is this the first time this district has had a full-time representative, but, with the help of many people in this district, the first office of State Representative was established and opened to the needs and various problems of the 70,000 people in this 5-county district. State government is the biggest business in this state and more scrutiny and research should be given to governmental matters by all members of the legislature. Between sessions, in the interim periods, a legislator can work on improvements for his district and can serve as a valuable mediator between state government and those individuals in the district who have problems with the many phases of governmental operations. Through my legislative office in Breckenridge, I have worked to resolve the various difficulties that people may have and I certainly feel this type of public service should be continued."

As the legislative leader against LSD and other dangerous drugs, Musgrove organized a statewide youth education program on the dangers of drug abuse to supplement the legislation which he initiated. "The new dangerous drug law provided Texas with the strictest drug laws in the nation," Musgrove stated, "but laws are only as strong as the public demand that they be enforced." The President of the United States in his recent State of the Union Message to Congress, proposed that laws very similar to Musgrove's Texas legislation be enacted on the nationwide level to control the growing problem with LSD and other dangerous drugs.

"I have made the development of our area's parks and recreational potential - and likewise tourist appeal - one of my main objectives," Musgrove continued. "During the session I sponsored a special legislative resolution which was passed and

signed by the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker, directing the State Parks and Wildlife Department to assist in the restoration of Shackelford County's Ft. Griffin, and appropriations have been budgeted to the proper state agencies (Continued Inside)

20th Annual Rodeo Here May 2, 3, 4

New Laws For Voters Listed

Voters in the May Primary who moved into the county on or before Nov. 4, 1967, must vote between April 15 and April 30 in the office of the county clerk in the county of your present residence, according to information supplied by Mrs. Beatrice Deal, County Clerk of Callahan County. Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved, unless one or more of the various types of district (congressional, legislative, judicial, etc.) included both the county of his former residence and the county of his new residence. If he had lived in a district for six months before the election, he could vote on statewide offices and issues and on the offices for districts in which he had six months' residence, but he could not vote on local offices and issues within the county.

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has been changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the twentieth day and the fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

The Zoppe Family, known as the Chiefs of the Resinback Riders have amazed lovers of horsemanship at top rodeos in the United States and Canada. They will be dressed in their bright colored Indian wardrobes, performing their daring acts of balance, perfect timing and a great sense of direction.

In promoting this year's show in other arenas around Baird, 1967 Rodeo Queen, Susie Haskew Tyson will appear on Channel 9 during the Harry Holt Show and Sandy Chappel Show. She extends to all rodeo fans an invitation to come down and enjoy the 20th Annual Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo at Baird May 2, 3, and 4.

for this purpose. The bill that I sponsored authorizing a State Park on Hubbard Lake was passed and laid the groundwork for the inclusion of this proposed state park in the new statewide master plan that was approved as a constitutional amendment by voters last fall.

"Following the legislation session I brought all three members of the State Parks and Wildlife Commission to our district to view, first-hand, Fort Griffin State Park, the proposed Hubbard Lake Park site, Possum Kingdom State Park and a proposal for a new 2,500 acre State Park on the Palo Pinto County side of Possum Kingdom. This new park proposal that I am advancing on Possum Kingdom would be a tourist boost to this area and would preserve scenic Hell's Gate and would maintain Sandy Beach as a public area," Musgrove added.

During the interim period, Musgrove also brought the State Highway Commission Chairman to our district and initiated several needs road improvements.

Rep. Musgrove said that recent efforts to plug abandoned "lost identity" wells, causing salt pollution in Eastland and Stephens Counties had resulted in more wells being plugged by the state in these two counties than in all other counties of the state combined.

Musgrove serves on five outstanding legislative committees and as a member of the Penitentiaries Committee personally inspected all 13 Texas prisons. Following the tour, Musgrove proposed governmental economies that he said would save taxpayers more than \$2,000,000 annually.

The first legislator in West Texas to publicly urge investigation of Liquor Control Board influences, Musgrove also spearheaded a two-month study into sales tax collection problems of retail merchants.

Early in the session, a serious legislative effort was begun to move Eastland County's 11th Court of Civil Appeals to Abilene. Calling the bill "an act of piracy," Musgrove took Eastland County's case direct to the citizens of Abilene during his appearance on a special Abilene television program. And, later in the session, he brought the legislative subcommittee considering the bill to Eastland to personally inspect the court's facilities. The battle raged throughout the session, but the

bill was finally killed in the House Rules Committee. "Without the tremendous support of Eastland County residents for keeping this highly-respected historic court - many of whom traveled to Austin by chartered bus to make known their feelings - our opposition on the move might not have been successful," Musgrove added.

"The rapid growth of both Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges automatically creates situations needing legislative help," Musgrove added, "and I have been greatly interested in assisting with the orderly growth and development of these two fine junior colleges." Representative Musgrove was instrumental in getting the vacated National Guard Armory buildings transferred to Ranger Junior College - which saved Ranger taxpayers over \$300,000 that would have been needed to construct similar buildings for the college.

During his first session, Musgrove also successfully sponsored legislation that provided Callahan County with Parks and Wildlife services, that established the Rising Star Hospital District, and a bill which permitted Breckenridge governmental refinancing.

Burke Musgrove was raised in Breckenridge and was selected "Most Valuable High School Student" by State and National Elks Foundation. He attended the University of Texas and S.M.U. and in 1963 was selected "Outstanding Student" from the 24,000 member student body at the University of Texas.

Interested in youth becoming participating citizens, Musgrove was the program coordinator of the first statewide Attorney General's Youth Conference against juvenile crime, and for nine years he has been active in co-ordinating the details of the American Legion Boys' State program.

Musgrove, age 27, is a recipient of the Sons of the American Revolution Medal of Honor and the Chicago Tribune Award.

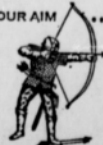

We further recommend that school officials make use of such resource assistance as the Texas Department of Public Safety, local and area law enforcement officials, and professional personnel with the medical knowledge regarding the possible, sociological, physiological and psychological effects of the use of narcotic drugs.

2. We recommend that Parent Teacher organizations civic clubs, and study clubs sponsor informative programs to educate the adults as to the danger and consequence of the drug use;

In making these recommendations, the Grand Jury wishes to make clear that we have the utmost confidence in the youth of our county. We feel that the majority of our youth are outstanding and responsible young men and women. However, the drug use does exist, and we feel that the solution lies in an educational program.
