



It is an old trick of monopolists that the stock raisers or the farmers or the working men will suffer if the monopolict is required to coaform to the law. And in too many cases with all respect to conor less patience submit to robbery; with more or less patienc they may yield to imposition, but they balk very promptly when it comes to poisoned food. It is not at all surprising that the meat consumption in America has suffered a marked decline since the publication of Mr. Sinclair's book. The wonder is that every man who has read that







CLEBURNE, Tex., June 1.

To Texas Populists: My Dear Sirs and Brothers:

Referring to the above letter, I wish to say, that, after consultation with National President Bentley, we are agreed that a change in the grave. programme recommended by him in his call is desirable in Texas. A large majortiy of the members of the populist clubs in the State are farmers, most of whom are just now, and will be for awhile, very busy in their grain fields. Many of them think a State meeting un. necessary, and to meet their views and the views of the membership generally throughout the State, I recommend that all members of populist clubs in Texas, without waiting for any formal call from fice. Only 15 cts per 100 their officers, meet at their regular places of meeting Saturday, June 16, at 1 o'clock. p. m. for the following purposes:

First, to select delegates to attend the St. Louis meeting of June 27, or to select proxies to represent the clubs at St. Louis, and to send to them directions as to the wishes, of the clubs in regard to the matters likely to be acted on by the Conference. Second, to select delegates to meet in the county seats of their respective counties at 1:30 o'clock, p. m., Saturday, July 7 to receive, consider and act on the report of proceedings and recommendations of said St. Louis Conference. Permit me also to recommend and request that each member of a populist club in Texas will contribute 25 cents (no more) to be paid in by him to the Secretary or Treasurer of his club to be forwarded to me as soon as practicable after the meetings of the 16th. I will also ask that all other populists of Texas contribute each one alike amount to be forwarded by him to me direct. The money that shall be received by me will be used to assist in paying the absolutely necessary expenses incident to the said St. Louis Conference. You understand, of course, that these expenses must be met, and one or a few persons must not be permitted by us to bear the burden. The amount I am asking of each one of you is very small, but if each will do his part, as I am sure each will be more than willing to do, the amount of your contributions, in the aggregate, will assist very materially in meeting such expenses. Hoping and believing that the St. Louis meeting will be a splendid success, and will result in the speedy and thorough reorganization of the forces of populism throughout the United States.
