It is given out that Mexico has no intention of adopting the gold standard. Another gold bug story come to grief.

THE FEAR is for John H. Reagan for the senate or for anything else he wants. If he declines to leave to a vote of the people we doubt he will win; but will be satisfied with the result whatever it may be.

Of course supply and demand regulates everything. That is why wheat has gone up and silver has gone down. Natural causes make the demand for wheat and the money grabbers of the world cut the demand for silver by legislation. There is no mystery about the high prices of wheat and the low price of silver. The gold bugs may rejoice as much as they please, but the people are not deceived by silver and wheat paring company.

The republicans say they are confident of carrying Ohio this fall. As Ohio is a rock ribbed republican state the only surprise caused by this announcement is that the republicans thought necessary to make it; especially as they have claimed ever since the election last fall that the silver cause is dead. The election in Ohio Kentucky and Nebraska will show whether the cause of silver is waving as claimed. If the democrats carry Kentucky and Nebraska it will be fully as much as they have any reason to expect. If they fail to carry these states, it will be a black eye for silver. On the other hand, if the republicans fail to carry Ohio it would be disastrous to them in the extreme, but they are not likely to be defeated there, hence as we would like to see old Hannas snowed under.

If you are inbested to the gold standard for the rise in wheat why will not cotton advance in price also? Why should the gold standard raise the price of one farm product and not another? The "wanting" is only temporary, and is due solely to natural causes for wheat and natural cause (hostile legislation) for silver.
