In July of last year there were exported 5,232,764 pounds canned he said: and tinned meats at a total value of \$542,187. For the month just ended the total number of pounds sent abroad was only 1,039,852, and the value \$104,710. For the seven months ending in July there were exported in 1905 over 43,500,-000 pounds, at a value of over \$4,000,000, as against nearly 29,-000,000 pounds in the same period of this year, at a value of much less than \$3,000,000.

There was also a falling off in the export of cattle during July. A year ago the number sent abroad exceeded 49,000, at a valuation of almost \$3,000,000. This year there was a decrease of over 15,000 head and a shrinkage in value of almost \$400,000.

In fresh beef there were exported in July, 1905, 21,074,326 pounds at a value of \$1,963,012, as against the present year of 16,467,150, valued at \$1,546,191.

The exports in salted and pickled beef, tallow. hog products, oleomargerine and dairy products also showed a marked decrease.






