Amaizing Curtailme
Packingtown firms are chafing under the meat inspection law, sending out press reports of how export trade is being ruined. They say the result of the agitation which brougnt about the law is by the department of commerce ad labor giving the figures of exportation for July. It shows an abnormal falling off, which cost the beef trust and cattle growers several million loss in thirty-one In July of last year there were and tinned meats at a total value of $\$ 542,187$. For the month just ended the total number of pounds
sent abroad was only $\mathrm{I}, \mathrm{O} 39,852$, and the value $\$ 104,710$. For the seven months ending in July there were exported in 1905 over 43,500 ,-
ooo pounds, at a value of over $\$ 4,000,000$, as against nearly $29,-$ 000,000 pounds in the same period
of this year, at a value of much less than $\$ 3,000,000$.
There was aiso a falling off in the export of cattle during July. A year ago the number sent abroad
exceeded 49,000 , at a valuation of almost $\$ 3,000,000$. This year there was a decrease of over 15,000 head and a shrin
in value of almost $\$ 400,000$. in value of almost $\$ 400,000$. In fresh beet there were exported at a value of $\$ 1,963,012$, as against the present year of $16,467,150$, valued at $\$ 1,546,19$ r.
The exports in salted and pick. ed beef, tallow. hog products, oleomargerine and dairy products so showed a marked decreas.

good quality. of beef and milk, as shown by experiments in Algeaia. Their size is far below that of our improved beef breeds however,
