George Stocking who was nam-ed Saturday by President Roose-Board was formerly superintendentt of the Clarendon schools and had taught at Panhandle, Texas.

Son of Mrs. Sarah M. Stocking of Clarendon he is professor of economics at the University of Texas but has been on leave of absence since his appointment to the National Defense Board last

September. Stocking who was educated in Clarendon schools and at Columbia University was one time supervisor of education in the Igerote provinces of the Philippine Islands and has held professorships at Maine University and Dartmouth College.

Under various fellowships Mr. Stocking has spent much time abroad. He did a survey in state control of the potash industry in Germany and later made an economic and sociological survey of Great Britain, Germany and the Balkans. In Mexico City he carpetroleum industry. Stocking's book entitled "The Oil Industry and the Competitive System" won the \$1,000 cash prize award offer-ed by Hart, Schaffner and Marx a few years ago.

Early in 1940 there was a general trend pointing to increased cost of all raw materials and commodities used in the manufacture and selling of ice cream, and in most sections of the country ice cream prices were advanced.

We were hopeful at that time that this trend would not continue and that economies might be effected to offset these advances, and consequently we made no change in our selling prices. Experience for the year shows an increase of 12% in our finished products cost. During the Fall of 1940 milk products increased as much as 30% over 1939 and there was a general advance in cost of packaging, both paper and steel, as well as flavoring, fruits and other ingredients. Increase in selling and delivery expenses as well as taxes must also have consideration.

As a consequence, we have no alternative but to make a slight advance in our selling prices effective as of February 15, 1941. New schedule of prices is attached.




