President Roosevelt arrived at Keokuk, Ia., Wednesday to start familiar colloquatiliums.

"Isn't this good doctrine?" he asked, after stating his proposition, addressing the Grand Army group in front of him, and when he received a shout of consent he proceeded to say that he was always willing to help a man who stumbles who 'lies down.'

"It does him no good and it is too much for me," he added.

He dwelt on the necessity for self mastery, and adding, "If he else will do so."

In another connection he laid down the general proposition that "A private soldier is worth a number of poor major generals,' but added, "An Ar major general is invaluable, the point being that individual merit is the pearl of great price in every walk of life, He was willing to help the big railroad man if he was honest, and would protect him against the demagogue but he would not desist in his condemnation of those who were no acting honestly.

"You will remember that a year ago I expressed my opinion of certain desirable citizens and I stand by what I said."

He added that he would always condemn the man who incites to murder, and would demand punish ment for the crime of the corpora tion criminals. He would treat both alike, and just as he would treat other offenders. He also emphasized the importance of preparation for any work. BIG FREIGHT BILLS. Having disposed of the Oklahoma problem, the President sent for up with him the question of employing American vessels to transport the coal which will be needed by the fleet on its cruise to the Pacific. A total of 133,000 are needed of which 93,000 will be transferred to the battleship and cruiser bunkers en route or in South American ports and 40,000 dumped on the docks at San Francisco. The latter sum the American vessel owners claim the right to carry under the coastwise laws which forbid the employment of foreign vessels for the transportation of passengers or freight from one American port to another. The President does not believe that the law applies to supplies for the army or the navy and maintains that unless the American shipowners make reasonable prices he is warranted in employing foreigners. He does not, however, regard an excess of, say, \$200,000 on the 40,000 tons as excessive and the present indications are that if the Americans will get together and insure the government against an excess cost of more than \$200,000, or a total of \$480,-000 for the 40,000 tons, they will

Incidentally, the President has made it clear to all his callers that the naval fleet is going to the Pacific, that there are no ifs and ands about it. To illustrate he told one group of callers of a friend of his, the sheriff of a western town, who was warned that a number of voters had been imported to help carry an election. The sheriff warned each one as he approached the polls that he was known and pointed significantly to the adjacent calaboose. One, however, insisted upon voting. "And did he fall?" "Did he fall? If he hadn't have fell I'd have went round back of him to see what propped him up," was the answer of the sheriff, and the president added, "If the navy don't go to the Pacific I'll go round back of it to see what's propping it back."
