"Oklahoma intends to require the state banks to deposit a sum sufficient to guarantee the bank de dositors of every State bank in is found in proper condition, to be permitted to do business in the sate," said Senator Owens.
"It is proposed to allow any na onal bank in Olklahoma, approve by the Bank Commissioner, to con ract with the state for insurance of erms to out of the fund, upo terms to be agreed upon by the State Banking Board, the Bank Commissioner and the Comptroller of the Currency of the United States. The bill will go into effect
within 60 days from its passage. A arge number of examiners will im mediately report upon the condition of the state banks.
"If the Comptroller of the Curncy, or Congress does not im mediately make arrangements for a he national banks, these may give op their charters and become state banks."
