

Improved methods of fertilization, feeding and handling of fish have made it possible for the Texas Department to cut the cost of fish and it is going down each year. In 1939 the cost of fish was one and a half cents. Last year there was a sharp drop in production cost to 9 mills and with the hatcheries expecting to plant at least 12,000,000 fish in the lakes and streams of the state the cost will be 5½ mills. That will make the cost of fish distributed this season approximately one-ninetieth of that fourteen years ago. Anglers benefit by the additional number of fish planted. Unless methods had been devised to raise more fish with the hatchery space and personnel available, more fish could not be planted due to the limited amount of money the Department has available for fish production.




