Mr. Bryan addressed the following telegram to Mr. Roosevelt in reply to the president's statement issued yesterday:

Haskell of Oklahoma to the effect that he was once in the employ of the Standard Oil company, and as such employe was connected with an attempt to bribe Attorney General Monett of Ohio to dismiss suits pending against the Standard Oil company. In indors. ing this charge you attack the democratic party and its candidate, saying that 'Gov. Haskell stands high in the councils of Mr. Bryan, and is the treasurer of his national campaign committee, and you add that the publication of this correspondence not merely justifies in striking fashion the attitude of the administration, but also casts a curious side light on the attacks made on the administration, both in the Denver convention which nominated Mr. Bryan and in the course of Mr. Bryan's campaign.'
