# Slick Highways Cause Many Area Accidents

## Water, Electric Meter Deposits To Be Refunded By The City

At a recent meeting of the City Council, it was voted to refund the original amounts of Water and Electric Meter Deposits to all consumers whose accounts have not been "in arrears" any time during the preceding twelve (12) months.

By "in arrears" in this case means that normal water and electric bills were not paid within 30 days from date of billing.

Those meeting the above requirements may present their Meter Deposit Receipts for refund on the original amounts.

Electric and Water Meter deposits will not be required in the future from consumers owning their home or business real estate, duly rendered for taxes.

All renters (or lessees) are required to put up Water and

Electric Meter Deposits, which will be refunded at the end of 12 months if their bills have not been in arrears during that period.

The City reserves the right to require Meter Deposits from anyone whose credit rating is not satisfactory.

Services will be discontinued in all cases when bills are not paid by the 15th following the current month.
