Indians as Workmen.

The popular theory that the Indians cannot be made to work is not altogether unfounded. It by no means follows, however that he cannot be induced to work, and work well, when removed from his native surroundings and supplied with the proper incentives. The Indians in the industrial schools at Hampton, Va., and at Carlisle, Pa., have shown a readiness to acquire trades and a capacity to learn to handle tools skillfully that must stagger the prejudices of those who have adopted the frontier creed that the only useful Indian is a dead Indian.

At the recent public exercises at Carlisle, a Plain Indian was the proud though seemingly stolid, exhibitor of a wagon built by himself, a piece of work that older mechanics might not have been ashamed of. The Springfield Republican says that there are now on exhibition in Boston samples of shoes and harnesses made at Hamton Institute, which both in finish and serviceableness are able, in the opinion of competent inspectors to compete successfully with the products of regular workmen. The shoes are part of a contract for two thousand pairs which the Government gave to the Superintendent of Institute, General Armstrong, last spring. The Government has also ordered seventy-five sets of doubleplow harnesses.

General Armstrong is confident that within five years as the hundred Indians at Hampton, the three hundred at Carlisle, and others under instruction elsewhere, became masters of the craft, all the shoes and harnesses needed on the plains can be made by Indian young men at home.



About 400,000 head of young cat tle have been driven North from this state during the present season This vast army of cattle gave en ployment to 2,000 men, and brought into the state for disbursment by the stockraisers over \$2,000,000, not counting the profits of the drive While five million dollars looks like a great sum of money, yet the driving of these cattle to ranges outside of Texas is a clear anual loss of \$2,-000,000 to the cattle men. 
