# Conversion Complete Med Center Accepts More Elderly

The long and tortured existence of the hospital district may be coming to an end with the opening of the hospital wing as an expansion of the elderly care section already in operation.

With the minimal remodeling required, the hospital is effectively converted to accommodate twenty more elderly people.

"I don't think the board sees this move as the ultimate purpose of the center at all," says hospital administrator Gerry Knight, "but rather the best long range alternative to paying off the considerable debt load the district is carrying right now."

With the long unused wing paying its way as an elderly care facility Knight sees hope that the hospital district will not only eliminate a

number of outstanding debts but will begin to clear a small profit.

With a steady crossfire of lawsuits and alternating public apathy and outrage for a backdrop, membership on the board has not been a coveted position.

Chronology of the hospital conversion begins with move to research possibilities of conversion early in 1975.

The move coincided with the creation of the Health Facilities Commission," points out Knight, "the new personnel of that office knew less than we did about new rulings on remodeling and repairing facilities."

So comprehensive is the commission's authority that should the hospital's roof be blown off by a tornado, the actual rebuilding can't take place until approved by the

commission.

When the board did apply for an exemption certificate they were forced to seek instead a certificate of need.

Requirements under the certificate's provisions caused the board to halt continued advance toward compliance until June of 1976 when the board agreed to make full application.

Following successful qualification for the certificate in November's hearing at Austin the board began actual conversion of the health care facilities in the wing.

Knight sought and received extension of the nursing home certificate with the license's effective date February 1 but repairs continued in the hospital wing.

There is a considerable waiting list right now and if

the wing doesn't fill immediately it won't take long after the first few weeks," commented Knight.

"There was no short range alternative to the hospital's financial condition," points out Knight. "We were looking at approximately \$90,000 in direct operational loans, \$60,000 in past due accounts payable with \$118,000 in accounts receivable with thirty to forty percent of that uncollectable because Blue Cross, Blue Shield Medicare and Medicaid never approved our patient admission costs."

In reviewing the hospital's financial performance under those conditions without the facility ever having remained open for an extended length of time the effort to decrease indebtedness was always strained.

As of January first, the hospital board brought accounts receivable down to \$38,000, which is approximately uncollectables. Accounts payable have been brought down to a current level and warrants are down from \$90,000 to \$60,000.

During the same period from 1974 to January of 1977 the hospital board was able to absorb the operating loss and make bond payments of \$46,000. The ability to operate the rest home wing during this financial crisis spells the difference between eventual repayment and closing the doors.

All of the steps toward opening the hospital and operation of it as another wing of the rest home is legally permissible under the authority given the

Hospital District by Senate Bill 825, section 8," said Knight. "The bill gives the board discretion over the construction of, among other things, convalescent domiciles and geriatric facilities. Senate Bill 525 is the document that established the Hospital District June 24, 1969."

"Knight hoped that the community would now understand how grave the financial condition of the hospital district had become. Citing 1975 as the watershed

year for the hospital, Knight explained the board came very close to defaulting saying that the inability to obtain further warrants during that crucial year would have been the final straw.

"It was tooth and nail that whole year and public interest was very low. Talk of not paying hospital taxes may be fine to relieve

## Clifford Seeks City Council Seat

"I think we have some women in town who could do a good job serving on boards and councils in the town and I hope that my running might just encourage other women to think about contributions they might make," says Shirley Clifford about her recently announced decision to run for one of the at large

council seats at City Hall. Clifford, the mother of three children and married to Jack Clifford of Clifford Growers thinks that a number of city women have more time to devote to public service positions than men who have the ability but simply can't devote the necessary time.

"I certainly don't have any axes to grind at City Hall but I do know a little about the work of city government having served once at assistant tax assessor for the City of Clarendon. At that time the city government was structured around two commissioners and a mayor instead of the present five aldermen and mayor," pointed out Clifford.

Clifford feels that while she can offer no specific program at this point her previous experience leads her to believe that some of the needed revenue for the city's budget could be raised by reviewing the city's tax rolls for outstanding delinquent taxes.

There are a number of pieces of property in this city owned by people who haven't been in the town for maybe twenty five years. This property should be

taken for taxes and sold so that it could be put back on the tax roll on a paying basis," points out Clifford.

The question of working with an all-man board doesn't seem awkward or impossible for Shirley.

"There's not a person on that board I don't think I could work with right now and I don't feel the men on the board would resent a woman serving on the City Council at all," says Shirley.

Shirley, a citizen of Clarendon now for twenty-three years, is originally from Childress. She graduated from Clarendon College. After Jack and Shirley were married, Shirley spent a year in Germany while Jack was stationed there in the Army. Involved in the grocery store's business, Shirley contemplates to devote considerable time to community and church activities.

An avid gardener and flower grower she has a greenhouse for year around flower cultivation. Shirley disclaims the reputation that has grown around her gardening.

"People call me to ask about a flower problem and I really can't help them that much."

As for campaigning, no is the answer to that.

"It's never been done to my knowledge for this job," says Shirley. "I'm announcing and I hope people vote for me but I won't be broken hearted if I don't win. I just feel that maybe I could provide some new ideas and I will work hard at the job. The job doesn't pay enough for coffee money so it tends to draw hopefulness solely for service to the community."

"One thing I would like to stress is that people in this town should become more

concerned about their city government. They go down and vote this time for a mayor and two councilmen and then they'll forget about it for another two years," points out Clifford.

Shirley suggested a column in the paper on a monthly basis as a possible avenue to informing the public about their city government.

Clifford cited the lack of a mosquito control program last summer as an example of the need for communication with the city population.

"As I understand the situation, they didn't have the equipment and didn't have the money to get any either. I hope we can do something about that come another year," urged Clifford.

Clifford urged an effort to apply for federal grant funds

available to small cities.

"I understand at least one alderman has been looking into the application for federal grant funds and while I can't say this is exactly what should be done I think it should at least be explored. There are a number of things this community could use," pointed out Shirley.

"If they can help New York City they can at least help Clarendon, Texas a little bit. These are our tax dollars and there's no reason why we shouldn't try to get some of it ourselves," continued Clifford.

Clifford pointed to the potential advisory aid available through the Texas Municipal League and hoped that the city council could tap the services available to the city through the organization.

frustration over the hospital's not opening but actually doing so would have effectively stopped all future bond issues for schools, the city, the college in this county. You cannot dissolve an entity like this with outstanding debts," pointed out Knight.

"In review of similar small town hospitals and their very peculiar problems compared to large city hospitals, Knight pointed out that there are basic problems associated with small rural community hospitals. First, the fact that all federal legislation for hospitals see ms to be aimed at two-hundred plus bed units. Second, if the hospital is to ever open, the board must participate in those federal programs.

"Small town hospitals have enough problems. We have to import RN's and let's face it, few professional people want to move to a small community. Response was so low in this community when we interviewed the Korean doctor recently that the board felt it would be very risky to spend a chunk of money in hopes the community would accept him and make him their family doctor," said Knight.

Knight points out that individual response to supporting the Korean doctor was very encouraging, but claimed that experience of other communities, Claude in particular, seemed to bear out the fact that no amount of individual support can keep a doctor if he cannot build up a sufficient practice.

"People are going to have to fight for a hospital. And unless they do it boils down to this, the community doesn't want us unless they need us. That's fine but what do you do if you suffer a heart attack and cannot get to Memphis, Groom or Amarillo in time?" asked Knight.

Knight explained that when the Korean doctor visited the community only twenty-five to thirty-five people from the community attended the all day reception for him.

"We called the college downtown merchants, the Chamber of Commerce with little response anywhere. Apparently the concept of a foreign doctor was not popular and therefore the board was in no position to speak for the community," summed up Knight.

frustration over the hospital's not opening but actually doing so would have effectively stopped all future bond issues for schools, the city, the college in this county. You cannot dissolve an entity like this with outstanding debts," pointed out Knight.

In review of similar small town hospitals and their very peculiar problems compared to large city hospitals, Knight pointed out that there are basic problems associated with small rural community hospitals. First, the fact that all federal legislation for hospitals see ms to be aimed at two-hundred plus bed units. Second, if the hospital is to ever open, the board must participate in those federal programs.

"Small town hospitals have enough problems. We have to import RN's and let's face it, few professional people want to move to a small community. Response was so low in this community when we interviewed the Korean doctor recently that the board felt it would be very risky to spend a chunk of money in hopes the community would accept him and make him their family doctor," said Knight.

Knight points out that individual response to supporting the Korean doctor was very encouraging but claimed that experience of other communities, Claude in particular, seemed to bear out the fact that no amount of individual support can keep a doctor if he cannot build up a sufficient practice.

People are going to have to fight for a hospital. And unless they do it boils down to this, the community doesn't want us unless they need us. That's fine but what do you do if you suffer a heart attack and cannot get to Memphis, Groom or Amarillo in time?" asked Knight.

Knight explained that when the Korean doctor visited the community only twenty-five to thirty-five people from the community attended the all-day reception for him. "We called the college, downtown merchants, the Chamber of Commerce with little response anywhere. Apparently the concept of a foreign doctor was not popular and, therefore the board was in no position to speak for the community," summed up Knight.

## Remedies for 'Dark Ugly Wood'

by Cynthia Manning

A common old-house complaint centers around what to do with unattractive, dark woodwork. Many turn automatically to paint remover, but this can be a needlessly messy and expensive solution. Chances are there is a serviceable finish obscured beneath many layers of wax, grime and shellac. Often, this finish can be revived with much less effort than completely stripping and refinishing.

The first rule is test. There are a variety of revivers one can use, so find the least conspicuous area of woodwork and run a series of test procedures, starting with the easiest and working up to the more drastic and time-consuming.

The following procedures are suggested in reviving old, dark woodwork.

- 1. Try cleaning first. Mineral spirits (benzene) or turpentine will remove any of the heavy wax build-up. As long as rags are picking up soil, you are removing surface accumulation, which will tend to leave the surface dull looking. If the color is promising, let the surface dry and then apply a thin coat of lemon oil or wax.
- 2. Try stronger cleaners next—cleaners that will dissolve a portion of the finish. You can make your

own strong cleaner by dissolving 1 lb. of washing soda (sodium carbonate) in a gallon of hot water. Use rubber gloves, and rub down the woodwork with this solution and 2/0 steel wool. Household ammonia will also dissolve shellac. Rub with the cleaner until wood reaches a shade you like. Finish as above.

3. There are several different chemical solvent formulas you can try: 15% (by volume) lacquer thinner in mineral spirits; 50-50 mixture of lacquer thinner and denatured alcohol; pure denatured alcohol. Start with the first mixture because it will remove the least amount of finish. Apply with 3/0 steel wool, wetting surface and changing pads as they become loaded. Appearance of the surface while wet with the solvent is the look it will have when the final coat of wax or lemon oil is applied. When the 'right' amount of the old finish has been removed, wash the surface with cloths saturated with benzene or mineral spirits.

For a harder and more durable finish than that provided by lemon oil or wax, apply a satin finish varnish, or a hard oil finish such as that provided by tung oil or a penetrating sealer finish. Only after all of the above cleaning and reviving procedures have been tried should you move on to the ultimate step of removing all the old finish with paint and varnish removers. CAUTION: Never apply wax over a surface that has been treated with lemon oil. Unlike tung oil or linseed oil, lemon oil does not dry. Wax will dissolve in the lemon oil and make a gummy mess. Likewise, do not apply lemon oil to a surface that has been waxed. The resulting glop that is formed, if the disaster should occur, can be removed with mineral spirits or turpentine.

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### Final CC Enrollment Figure Up

Final registration figures at Clarendon college reflected an increase in enrollment over the Fall registration at the college.

A total of 525 students are attending classes this semester compared to 521 in the fall. Although this is an increase of only four students, the college enrollment is pleasing to the college officials and faculty. The national trend among colleges and universities is to experience an approximately 10+ decrease in enrollment from fall to spring semesters. Spring enrollment totals show 337 in attendance at the Clarendon campus and 188 enrolled in off-campus programs, with 161 of those enrolled at Pampa.

## New Income Tax Reform

**TAX REFORM ACT OF 1976**  
The Tax Reform Act of 1976 imposes a number of new penalties which apply to income tax return preparers. Any person who prepares an income tax return or claim for refund for compensation or who employs other persons to prepare income tax returns or claims is considered an income tax return preparer.

1. A penalty is charged the income tax return preparer for not signing a return or claim. The penalty is \$25 for each return or claim not signed. The preparer should sign in the space provided for preparer's signature.

2. A penalty is charged income tax return preparers for not providing their identification numbers. The penalty is \$25 for each return or claim that does not show an identifying number. An individual preparer should use his or her social security number, an individual who is employed by another preparer should use the employer identification number of that preparer. For this purpose, the partner in a partnership is considered an employee and should use the partnership's employer identification number. The number must be entered on the return or claim in the space provided.

3. A penalty is charged the income tax return preparer for not furnishing a copy of the return or claim to the taxpayer by the time it is presented for the taxpayer's signature. The penalty is \$25 for each return or claim not so provided.

4. A penalty is charged the income tax return preparer for not keeping a copy or list of the returns or claims prepared. These records must be kept for 3 years. The penalty is \$50 for each return or claim not recorded, with a maximum penalty of \$25,000 for each return period.

5. A penalty is charged an income tax return preparer who employs other preparers but does not file an information return on Form 5717 listing the preparers employed. For this purpose, self-employed persons are considered their own employers and must also file information returns. The information return must be filed by July 31 following the end of a return period. A return period is the 12-month period beginning on July 1 of each year, except that the first return period is the 6-month period beginning on January 1, 1977, and ending on June 30, 1977. The penalty is \$100 for each failure to file and \$5 for each required item that is missing from the return. The maximum penalty is \$20,000.



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

## Adobe Walls Hires First Woman Exec

Miley added that "I believe Scouting offers tremendous learning opportunities for young people."

Miss Miley is a graduate of the University of Alabama and holds a master's degree in recreation from Florida State University. She is 33 and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald H. Miley of Freeport, Florida.

Miss Miley will serve as district coordinator between local units, the council and Boy Scouts of America.
