# Documentary Segment Filmed in Clarendon

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** It was just another Wednesday afternoon. The papers had just been mailed out. For a brief spell the phone would not ring, no people with business would want your attention. It's like the weekend for 'normal people.' Who would have guessed that some UCLA students and a friend would want to film and record life in Clarendon. What happened follows below.

Right now I guess we're calling this movie *Shoe String Productions Presents Marty Ollstein on the Road to Mardi Gras*, said Richard Saradet jokingly. Richard, an actor with parts such as a pilot in "Midway" to his credit, owned the old Ford van he and French-born Florence Favre le Bret and Marty Ollstein are using to make the trip to New Orleans and back to Los Angeles.

Marty, a UCLA graduate student, is the cameraman for the film but the project is really Florence's. Using four thousand dollars in grant money from the French National Cinema Center in Paris, Florence is making a film about life in the Southwest as part of her master's degree in motion picture production from UCLA. She is no stranger to the camera. Her father is president of the Cannes Film Festival.

Friendly, engaging, both Marty and Richard want a thumbnail sketch of Clarendon and Donley County.

"What can we film and record in about one hour, we have to be in Dallas tonight?" Richard asks.

Indeed, what can you tell anyone really about the town where you make your home and your living in just one hour?

"What is unique about Clarendon? A boot shop and a saddle shop for starters. The three seem interested and now the four of us pile into the old Ford van. The trio have just three weeks to film to New Orleans and back. Already they have filmed small segments at Shiprock, Arizona; Farmington, New Mexico.

"We didn't have much luck with a Navajo mother. She had sick babies and wouldn't talk much. But Monument Valley was magnificent. Florence had never seen the Grand Canyon before either and she wanted to see that so we swung down there," said Marty.

The equipment includes a shoulder-held 16mm color camera and a three thousand dollar tape recorder. At several points in the taping, Florence would gesture wildly to someone to stop chewing gum, the microphone was so sensitive.

James Owens just hap-

pened to be standing in front of his shop when we drove up. I'm sure he must have had real doubts when he led the crew back into the shop, after the initial introduction.

"When did you start making boots, what's the most expensive pair you make? Did you ever want to do anything else for a living? Don't mind this light, we need it to get enough light for the camera."

An interesting thing happens when someone appears with a camera. It forces people to react, somewhat but always to react.

Now isolated from anyone else, James squints into the bright hand-held light Richard points at him and fields questions.

Richard waits for the signal from Marty and Florence. When the equipment is ready Richard asks, "What does living in Clarendon mean to you? How do you feel about being an American?"

Now those are questions a lot of us can go half a lifetime and never have anyone ask especially in front of a movie camera. Standing in the background with my own camera recording the filming I wondered what they would go away thinking of us.

James uses the experience of serving in Korea as proof for him this is still the best country to live in.

A natural interview, the crew got situated with Richard holding the microphone now trying to start a conversation with Jep. Eighty years old, the twinkle still dances in Jep's eyes when

Richard haltingly asks him something about his feelings about being an American.

"Used to be when you came to town and got drunk you got arrested. Now, you just come to town and get drunk," Jep teases. "Yep, I remember when we'd come to town in wagons and stay over night, it was too far to go back the same day. We'd pay a little money to sleep in a shed down town. Cost too much to stay in a fancy

hotel."

By that time all work had stopped at the boot shop. The UCLA students had found a first-rate 'character type.' Jep obviously was enjoying himself.

Why did three people from Los Angeles pick Clarendon in the first place?

"To be honest, we overshot Goodnight," Rich-

## Breedlove Urges Interest in City Elections

It's your town, you're going to have to take some responsibility for its government," said Flip Breedlove over the lack of enthusiasm for running for city posts.

Breedlove, mayor for the last seven years, calls it quits in April. "We need some young people to take hold of this city's government. It's fine to sit on the outside and say this is what I'd do but the best way to find out what can be done is get involved," Breedlove pointed out.

Noting the token salary elected city officials receive, Breedlove urged people to take up the responsibility out of concern for the future of the city.

"I think we need some

young people, downtown businessmen who have a stake in the future of Clarendon to run, get involved," stated Flip.

With filing deadline now just a week away Breedlove is concerned that no one may file for mayor.

"I'm real flattered that friends have called and asked me to run again but enough is enough, let someone else do it for awhile," said Breedlove. "We've accomplished some things with the budget we have to work with but there's a world more needs to be done. Water lines, streets, these are problems that won't go away and need constant attention."

Summed up Breedlove as he urged greater concern over the welfare of the city.

## City Posts Dump Ground Hours

Continued scavenging at the city dump in violation of new city ordinances regulating entrance to the grounds prompted the city council and City Manager Knorpp to warn all would-be scavengers that state law requires that removing garbage and trash from the grounds is a violation of State Department of Health Re-

sources law. Dumping illegally will be fined by up to \$200 upon conviction.

New hours effective February 28 will have the dump ground open three week days, Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 3:00-6:00 p.m. Weekend hours are Saturday 1:00-6:00 p.m. and Sunday 3:00-5:00 p.m.

## Johnsons Plead Not Guilty to Theft

Following a grand jury hearing Friday morning an Armstrong ex-Sheriff and his son, a former ranch foreman, for the JA Ranch were indicted on felony theft charges stemming from an investigation begun early this year.

The pair, Everett W. Johnson, 60, and his son, Roger Johnson, 26, were arraigned before 100th Circuit Court Judge Robert E. Montgomery Friday following the grand jury hearings in the morning.

Both men entered pleas of not guilty indicating they had retained legal council of an Amarillo lawyer. March 8 was set for trial date and both men were released on personal recognizance bonds of \$5000 each.

The indictments for theft were for 82 bags of cattle feed cubes taken from the ranch property in Donley County at the Ashtola Camp, February 6, 1977. Officers later found the feed stored in Armstrong County in a garage next to the Armstrong County jail.

As the grand jury probe loomed, Everett Johnson resigned as Sheriff of Armstrong County explaining that it would be "best for all concerned in the face of charges pending against him."

The indictments are for theft over \$200 but less than \$10,000. John Topper of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, said the JA Ranch called on the

TSCRA to investigate loss of feed about the first of January and other law enforcement agencies were brought in on the case when evidence linked a fellow law-enforcement officer with the thefts.

The grand jury heard testimony from five witnesses including Monte Ritchie, President of the JA Ranch Corporation with testimony beginning at 10:00 at the Donley County Courthouse courtroom.

Following grand jury testimony which ended around 12:30, Charles Darter and Tom Curtis, respective district attorneys from Wellington and Amarillo obtained two sealed indictments against the Johnsons needing only warrants

from the district clerk to obtain formal arraignment.

Both Johnsons waited in Sheriff Truett Behrens office while final paperwork on the indictments was taken care of. Both men appeared voluntarily at the Courthouse and were not under guard during this time.

Both Everett and Roger Johnson waived their right not to appear for arraignment until two days after the indictments were presented and heard the charges against them then as read by Judge Montgomery.

Earlier newspaper reports included information that the older Johnson had been a

The steer was sold in the Junior Livestock auction sale on Friday, February 14. Last year's sale record was \$5104.00. Mark's steer set a new record at \$7312.50.

As part of the publicity and promotion for the show and Crowbar Trucking Company, company officials posed the steer, with a pile of five thousand one dollar bills for local news media after the steer had been sold.

## Auto Accident Sends Man to Intensive Care

Three people were involved in a one-car rollover Monday seven miles west of Clarendon on farm-to-market road 2362.

The accident occurred Monday night about 7:45 on a curving stretch of the road. David Lane, driver of the vehicle, was sent to St. Anthony's in Amarillo in serious condition with severe head injuries. Taken to Groom Osteopathic Hospital for examination and released were Lane's son, David Martin Lane and Kelley Tunnell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Tunnell of 1019 West Fifth Street in Clarendon.

Lane and his passengers were apparently returning from farmland west of Clarendon where he had been applying fertilizer all

day. The accident was investigated by Patrolman Ray Burch of the Highway Patrol and members of the County Sheriff's Department.

Instead of going next to Marr's Saddle Shop and Art Gallery as planned, the trio wandered across the street to the Charm Beauty Salon. What better place to get a chance to see what Pan-handle women look like and what they think?

When asked if there was anyone in Clarendon who could speak French, Pettigrew Hamilton, the Episcopal priest, came to mind. When he heard he had on blue jeans and a carpenter's apron, he said, "No matter, when Florence Lavre le Bret heard him speak she immediately acted like she'd died and gone to heaven. How perfect! The film, when edited, would eventually appear on French television."

Father Hamilton spoke at length with Florence as the camera and taping machine whirled away.

Anita Spengler, beautician, was an even better subject in several ways. German born, Anita immigrated to the United States and gave a relative newcomer's view of life here in this country.

Sam Combs of 100 W. Martindale and another local man stood before the camera light in the dark street and talked about the years working for the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad and their church activities among other things.

What was to have been an hour's stopover in Clarendon ran into three hours but gave the students a chance to film aspects of Clarendon's people and their life style.

### Local Stockmen to Attend Screwworm Meeting

A group of cattlemen from Donley County will be among the more than 1,000 producers from across Texas participating in the Governor's Conference on "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms," in Austin Feb. 24.

The special conference has been called by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to launch a campaign to eradicate screwworms from Texas in 1977, points out Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Municipal Auditorium.

Local producers tentatively planning to attend include Wayne Riggs, Jiggs Mann

and Joe Robinson of Clarendon and Earl Wheatley of Hedley.

The conference program will feature a welcome by Gov. Briscoe, remarks by a representative of the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture and the Mexico Secretary of Agriculture, and discussions on various phases of the screwworm eradication program by officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Animal Health Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service and the Mission Screwworm Lab.

According to Gooch, the special campaign is being launched this year because the potential is high for dealing a final death blow to screwworms, those flesh-eating pests that cause millions of dollars in losses to livestock producers each year.

Three factors exist that can make this special eradication effort a reality: The cold winter will reduce the number of screwworm flies this spring.

The new screwworm plant in Tuxtla Gutierrez, Mexico, which opened last July will double the sterile fly production capacity.

A new strain of sterile flies has been developed which should be a significant improvement over earlier flies.

Overall, the campaign is designed to create a new vigilance on the part of livestock producers in handling and treating livestock so that the screwworm can be completely eliminated from Texas. The goal is within reach if everyone does his part, contends Gooch.

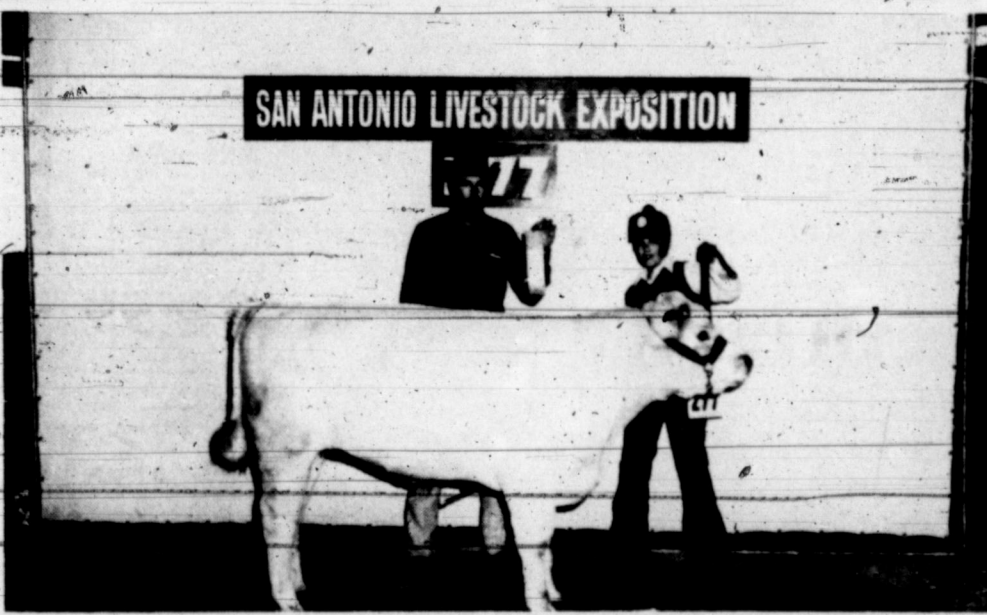
