The Clarendon High School senior points casually to the daily scribbles in his journal that his mother made him promise to keep before he left his homeland. As the months pass, the writings gradually move from his native language to the English he has learned in the states.

That is not to say that his English is perfect. Conversations with the leggy LeJan sometimes move at a slow pace as he carefully ponders the use
of the English language to express himself. Lone gone are the days, of the English language to express himself. Lone gone are the days,
however, when LeJan and his host family, the Phil Barefield family, constantly referred to an English/French dictionary.
