

County races decided Saturday

Saturday, May 1, election day in Donley County with 14 Democratic candidates vying for four county offices including Sheriff/Tax Assessor, County School Superintendent, and two County Precinct Commissioner posts.

As of Tuesday noon, 70 Donley County voters had cast absentee ballots. Two thousand four hundred fifty voters are registered in the county this year.

Traditional tote board showing how the voting for each candidate progresses during the day will once again be set up in front of Tunnell's Pharmacy on Clarendon's main street.

All polling places for Donley County will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday. Seven Democratic ballot boxes will be distributed in the county's four

voting precincts.

No Republican candidates filed last February for expiring county positions. A Republican ballot box will be located in the office of local Party Chairman Jim Hayes for those wishing to vote in the national primary elections.

On the Republican ballot, no candidate filed for county chairman, leaving this position open for write-in candidates.

Candidates for Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor are, as they appear on the ballot, Truett Behrens, James E. "Slick" Johnston, incumbent Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr., Carl Carter, Homer Holman and Louis Bogue.

Three candidates are seeking the County School Superintendent's position. They are incumbent Superintendent Maurice Risley, Jerry Hawkins and Richard Finch.

In Pct. 1 of Donley County, incumbent Precinct Commissioner Gene White is opposed by J.H. Spier, Jr. In Pct. 3, incumbent Commissioner Junior Hill is challenged by C.C. Ayers and Buford Holland for his position.

County Attorney John Knorpp is unopposed on Saturday's ballot.

Run-off elections will be June 1 if one candidate in any of Saturday's races does not poll at least one more vote than the total number of his opponent's votes. If the necessary number of votes are not obtained, the two candidates receiving the most votes would be in the run-off.

Because no Republicans filed for the local posts, winners of the primary election will be unopposed in the general election Nov. 4. Winning candidates will take office Jan. 1, 1977.

Voters must vote in the

precinct they are registered in. Democrats from Pct. 1 will have three ballot boxes where they may cast their votes. Box 1 will be placed in Howardwick's City Hall, election judge Mrs. Bill Littlefield; Box 4, the Old College Building in Clarendon, election judge Willard Skelton; and Box 6, at the Community Center in the Martin community, Pete Land, election judge.

Precinct 2 voters will have one ballot box. In past years, Box 2 has been located at the Oddfellows Hall in Clarendon. It has been moved this year to the Donley County Courthouse. Election judge will be Joan Kidd.

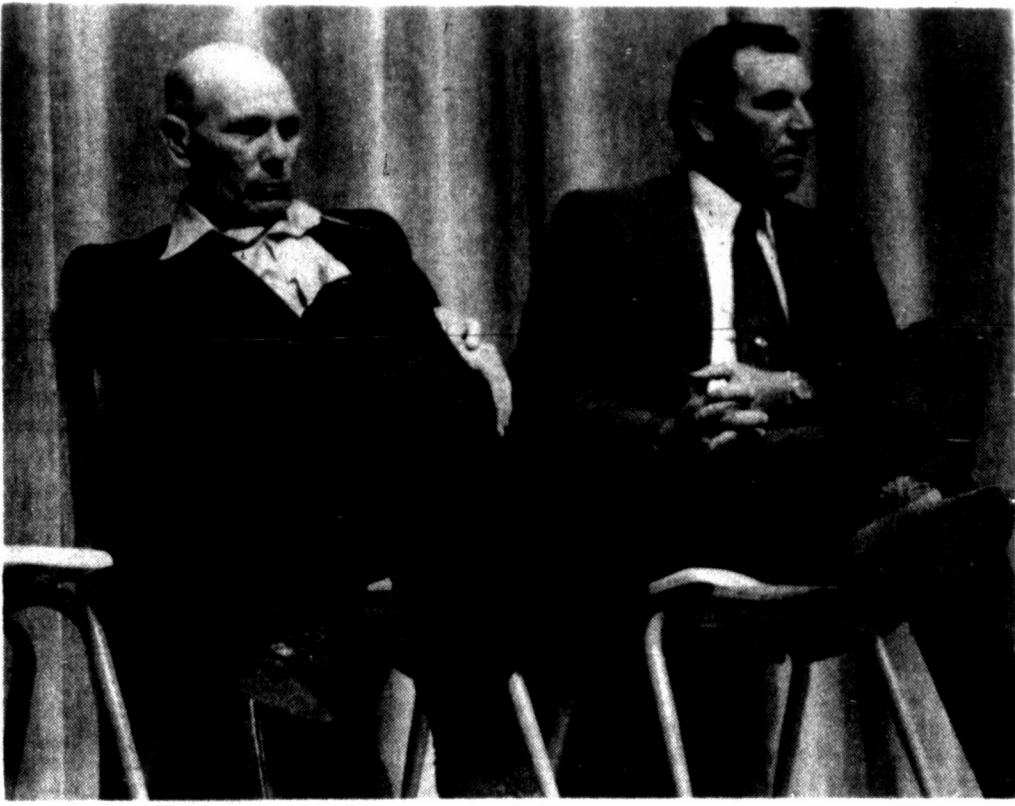
Two ballot boxes will be available for voters in Pct. 3. Box 3 will be placed in the Community Hall at Lelia Lake, J.L. Butler, election judge; and Box 5 will be at the Lions Club Hall in

Hedley, Mrs. Herlie Moreman election judge.

Pct. 4 will also have two ballot boxes. Box 4 will be at the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. in Clarendon, Mrs. Fred E. Chamberlain, election judge; and Box 9 will be located in the home of W.O. Hommel in the Alanreed community. Hommel will also serve as election judge.

Precinct conventions will be conducted at each voting locations when the polls close at 7 p.m. Saturday. Delegates to attend the county convention May 8 will be selected. For every 25 votes cast in Saturday's election from the individual precincts, that precinct may send one delegate to the county convention.

From the county conventions delegates to attend state conventions will be selected.

Weapons recovered at Greenbelt

Weapons stolen last November from Berger National Guard Armory along with a bank night depository bag containing approximately \$7,000 worth of checks was fished out of Lake Greenbelt over the weekend by Panhandle and local law enforcement personnel.

The bank bag was

identified as one stolen from the manager of a Gibson's Department Store last week in Pampa. A Pampa man, Paul Alan Long, was charged with that crime after being arrested minutes after the robbery near the Gibson's store.

Texas Rangers and Berger police along with Donley

County Deputy Eddie Hammonds and Greenbelt Lake Patrolman Troy Welty dug the Lake Saturday night, recovering much of the hidden cache. Two area scuba divers were brought in Sunday to aid in the search.

Eight M-16 rifles, four with grenade launchers attached; two .45-caliber

automatic pistols, a shot gun, three military type radio receivers and assorted ammunition clips for the rifles and pistols were recovered along with the money bag.

The weapons were identified by their serial numbers as those stolen from the Berger National Guard Armory last November. Paul Alan Long has also been charged in connection with that robbery.

The weapons and the bag were found on the east shore of the lake, just south of the Sandy Beach/Public Boat Dock area in about 5 ft. of water. Local authorities speculated they could have been thrown into the lake from the shore. The robbery from which the bank bag was stolen occurred Wednesday, April 21.

Borger Chief of Police Arthur Waight said Monday the weapons had been sent to Washington for a complete fingerprinting check. "At present we've got some suspects in the case," Waight said.

Wettest year, driest year, figures given

The recent rains and the hopes of more to come provokes the age-old debates concerning rain. Tommy Saye, who has kept a record of rainfall in Clarendon since 1956, recently wrote to Texas A&M's College of Geosciences for information concerning rainfall in Clarendon.

The department provided him with all total rainfall amount figures turned in to them for Clarendon since 1904. Amounts for six years since 1904 were not turned in: 1905, 1946-47, and 1949-51.

According to the college's figures, 1960 was the wettest year on record in Clarendon with a yearly rainfall total of 40.86 inches. Driest year was 1970, with only 8.08 inches of precipitation. Annual average rainfall here, averaged from 1933-69, is 21.51 inches.

Traditionally, May is the wettest month for Clarendon with an average rainfall amount of 4.02 inches. June follows with an average of 3.27 inches.

County auto accidents reported

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of March, 1976, according to Sergeant J.R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1976 shows a total of 12 accidents resulting in one person killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1976, shows a total of

448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 261 persons injured, as compared to March, 1975, with 446 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 217

persons injured. This was two more accidents, two less killed, and 44 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

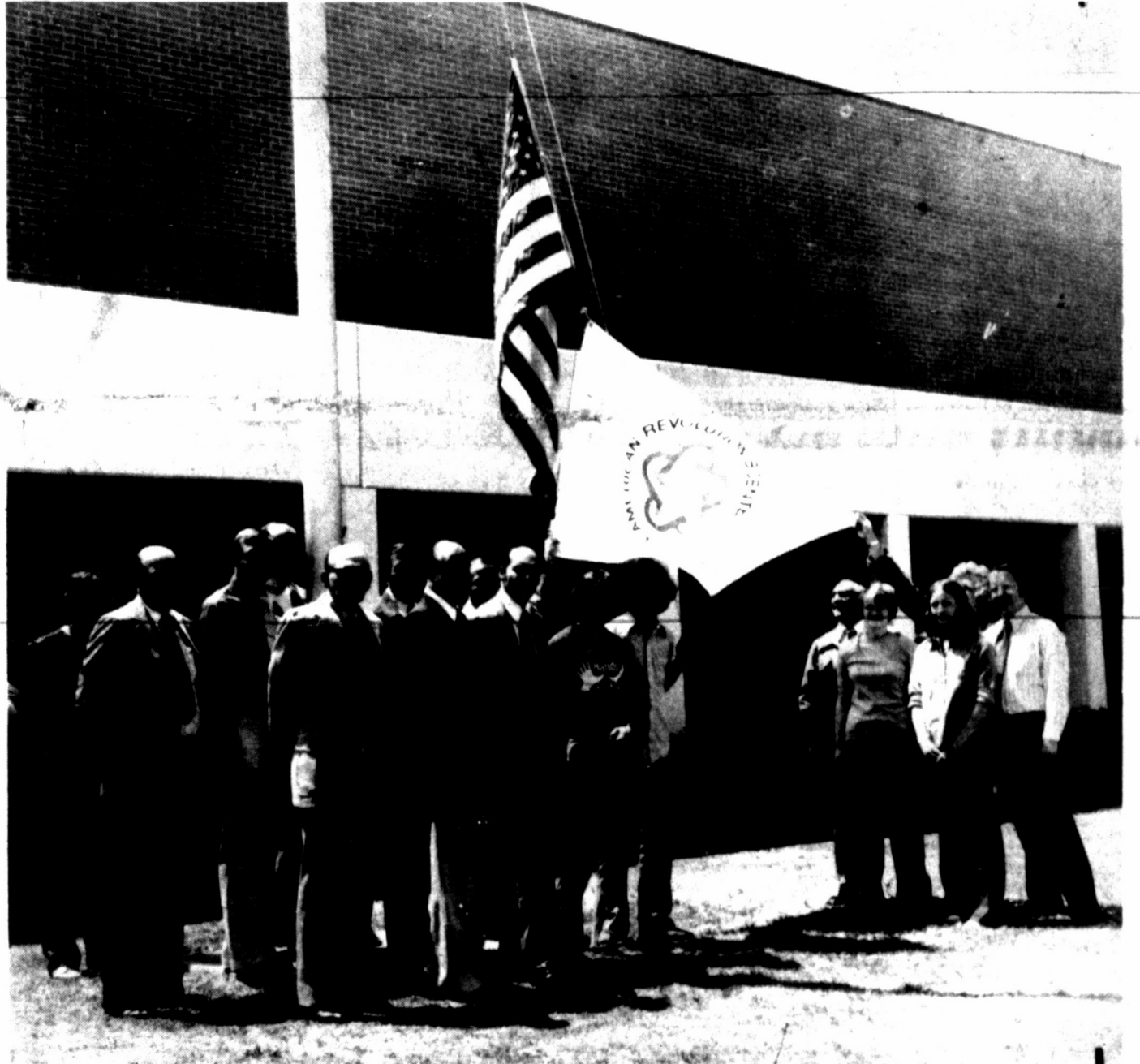

First to speak were the six candidates for Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor. Candidates drew lots for speaking order, beginning with Homer Holman, then incumbent Frank Lindsey, Louis Bogue, James E. "Slick" Johnston, Carl Carter and Truett Behrens.

Sheriff Frank Lindsey drew the most questions from the audience directed at sheriff candidates. In response to these, Lindsey said he believed the present county system of furnishing the sheriff a car had worked out well. He cited the economical feasibility of the arrangement, pointing out the county could obtain wholesale prices for gasoline and other items needed for its operation.

Lindsey also commented on the past problem of a dispatcher for county police calls. He said his home phone is currently listed for calls after regular business hours and on weekends his wife serves as dispatcher.

Lindsey said he recently hired a deputy now based in Hedley and was paying this salary out of his own salary. The deputy, Johnny Hoggatt of Hedley, has been hired on a part time basis, Lindsey said later, and will work nights and weekends. Lindsey said he had been hired for a three-month period pending a decision by the Donley County Commissioners Court on what part the County could afford to pay of the deputy's salary.

Lindsey said he is currently paying him \$200 a month out of his Sheriff's salary. He has requested that eventually the County pay \$75 per month of

this and the city of Hedley pay \$75. Lindsey said he would continue to pay \$50 per month.

Questions touched on by several candidates included relieving the sheriff of the county tax assessor position and combining the county and city sheriff departments into a single police commission.

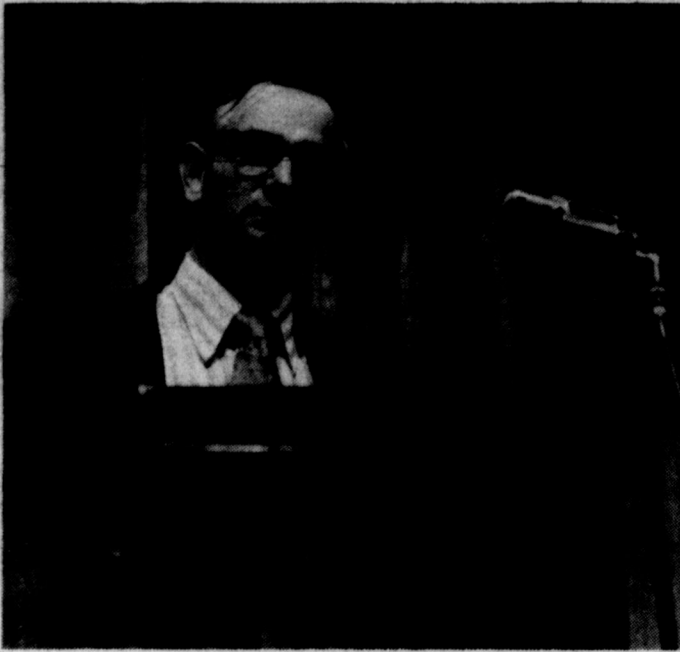
"Slick Johnston was first asked whether he favored separating the sheriff and tax assessor office. He said he would favor such an action because it would give the sheriff more time to devote to law enforcement.

Carl Carter later said separating the two offices would be up to the voters of Donley County, but if he was elected he promised "fair treatment" for everyone seeking help from the tax assessor. He pointed out the importance of the tax assessor job and promised to work to make the tax paying process in the county easier and faster for local citizens.

Several candidates discussed the problems of combining the county and city police forces. Sheriff Lindsey said he would favor it, but felt it might place a larger financial burden on the city and county if federal funds were withdrawn. Truett Behrens expressed doubt about combining the two police forces. He said he favored two county deputies, one based in Clarendon and one in Hedley, and paying these two an adequate salary.

A short intermission followed the presentation by the sheriff candidates. County commissioner candidates for Precinct 1 were next to speak with Junior Spier first.

He said he felt he could devote sufficient time to the duties of the position now that he had retired from business. He said he had no "personal axe to grind" against incumbent commissioner Gene White and that if elected he would "ask the people questions" concerning what they wanted from their county government.

Incumbent Gene White answered several questions from the audience including questions relating to Clarendon's Day Care Center and the financial condition of his precinct.

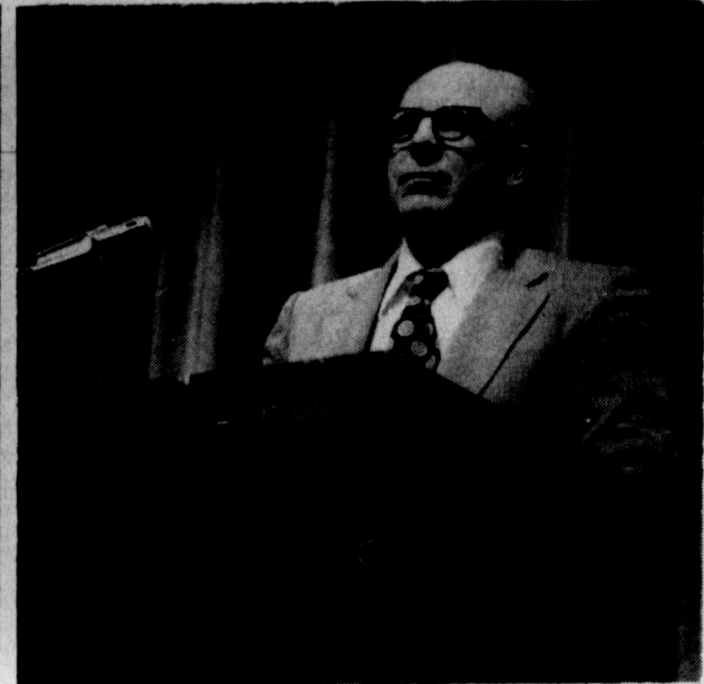
Concerning Clarendon's Day Care Center, White announced sufficient funds had been promised at a recent Panhandle Regional Planning Commission meeting to guarantee the Center could remain open.

White also said \$2,500 had been guaranteed through PRPC to the Donley County Senior Citizens group beginning July 1.

White also said there were sufficient funds available to Pct. 1 for its operation. He pointed out the county had approximately \$131,000 in certificate of deposits at the Farmers State Bank to be used as operating money during the year.

Final candidates to speak at the rally were three running for County School Superintendent. Candidate Jerry Hawkins drew first speaker.

Hawkins, a Vo-Ag teacher at Clarendon College, said because the superintendent's job did not require a full-time work load he could continue to teach at CC. He said he would do this without

pay because of the salary (\$17,592 per year) paid the superintendent. Hawkins speculated he would teach a 12 school hour work load.

Candidate Richard Finch said he would work to make the County Superintendent job a "respectable position." He pledged to become involved with the administrative duties at both school systems and to aid them in any way possible with his background in data processing and teaching experience. Finch said he would work at the job "full time."

Incumbent Maurice Risley was the final speaker. He noted his 18 years total experience in the Texas Education system and pointed out that another term as county superintendent would qualify him for full retirement benefits under the system.

Risley also pledged his opposition to what he described as a nationwide plan to reduce the number of school districts in Texas. "When you lose your school, next you lose your churches and then your businesses," he said. He said he would personally aid in any way possible the fight of the smaller school districts to remain open.

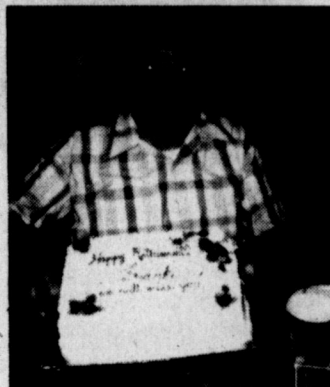
Bill Hill's wife, Mae, decorated the cake - being a graduate of the recent local class. Marvin Elliott's wife provided the rest of the food.

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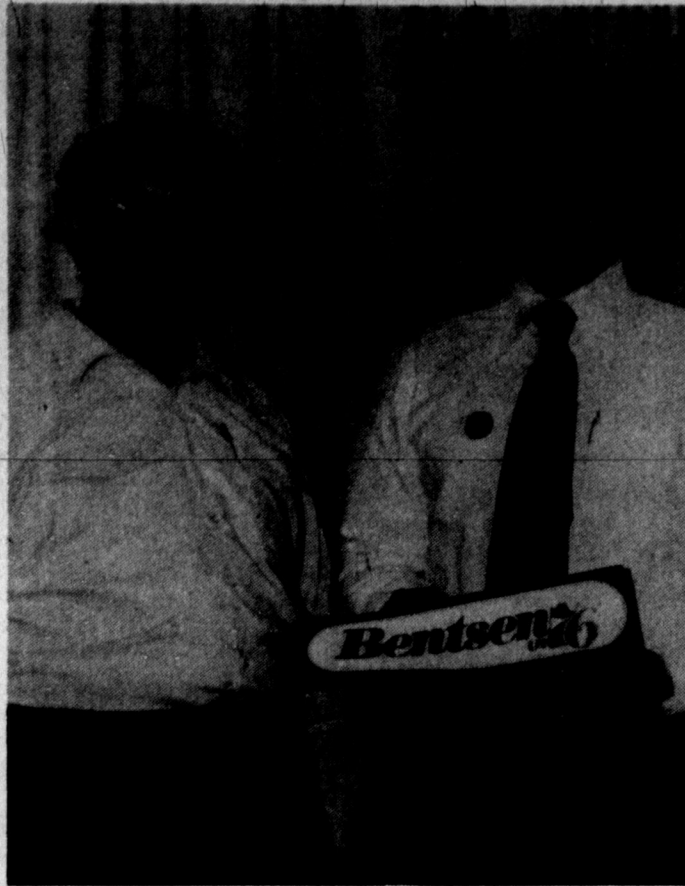


CC girl "outstanding" freshman athlete

TV used as tornado detector

Although the human eye is still the best method for locating tornadoes, most homes are equipped with a built-in tornado radar; the home television set.

If properly tuned, it is believed that a television set will detect a twister within a 15-20 mile radius.

Known as the Weller Method, the phenomenon is named for the Iowa scientist (Newton Weller) who first perfected the procedure.

The method is not foolproof and therefore should not be the sole source of information during bad weather. The National Weather Service recommends that anyone who lives in an area for which a "tornado watch" or "tornado warning" has been issued should keep an ear on up-to-date weather bulletins broadcast over local radio and television stations.

Weather bulletins are based on information from both radar and the phalanx of trained spotters deployed around a community whenever dangerous weather threatens.

As a supplement to this kind of protection, anyone can apply the Weller Method by following a few simple instructions:

First, warm up your television set as if you were going to watch it. The contrast control should be tuned to the maximum position.

Turn to Channel 13 and adjust the brightness control until the screen is just on the threshold of black. Then turn to Channel 2 without making any new adjustments to the picture settings. The audio (sound) settings may be adjusted as desired. If Channel 2 is not an operating channel in your area, be sure

to have a radio or second television tuned in for weather reports.

Monitor the screen as continuously as possible. Lightning will appear on the screen as horizontal flashes or streaks. On a color set the streaks will be in color.

A tornado within a 15-20 mile radius will cause the screen to glow brightly or cause the darkened picture to become visible and remain continuously visible.

Should this happen, it is important to take immediate safety precautions. Turn your television set off and open windows a crack to reduce the potential damage from pressure if a tornado passes nearby.

Take cover in a safe place, preferably near the center on the bottom floor of the building. A closet or small, windowless room offers best protection.

If you have a transistor radio, take it with you to the shelter area and continue to monitor weather broadcasts.

During particularly bad storms, when the electric power is off, the transistor radio can be used to augment the television warning system. To do this, set the radio alongside the TV and turn the radio knob to the lowest end of the dial (about 550 kilocycles).

At this setting the radio will pick up storm signals, emitting intermittent static when lightning is near and continuous static when a tornado is moving toward the signal.

Advance warning, from whatever source, is of no use if it is ignored. Anytime a tornado watch is issued persons living in the watch area should take precautions to protect their lives and property.

Loose items in the yard should be tied down during severe weather to prevent wind damage. Cars should be moved inside the garage, if possible, to prevent damage from hail or wind-blown projectiles.
