Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds during the period January through September 1983 in Texas amounted to \$202,122,865, an increase of 28.5% over the same period a year ago, John W. Dixon. Chairman of the Board and CEO of E-Systems. Inc. in Dallas and Volunteer State Chairman for Texas, announced today. These sales represent 90.0% of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

Savings Bonds sales

Sales of Series EE Bonds were \$1,650 during September 1983, for a total of \$20,641 for the first ninemonths of 1983 in Donley County, Bill Lowe, Volunteer County Chairman, said. These sales represent 50% of the County's 1983 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally. September 1983 sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$315 million, up 22% over September 1982, making a ninemonth total of \$3.06 billion, an increase of 32%. Savings Bonds held by the public amounted to \$70.6 billion as of September 30, an increase of \$272 million for the month.

According to County Chairman Bill Lowe, the U.S. Treasury Department has announced a market-based interest rate of 9.38 percent for the first semiannual interest period of Series EE Bonds issued between November 1, 1983 and April 30, 1984. This is the third semiannual rate to take effect since the market-based. variable rates were introduced a year ago. The combined market based rates --11.09% from November 1982 to April 1983; 8.65% from May to October 1983 and this latest one of 9.38% for November 1, 1983 to April 30. 1984 -- make the average vield 9.70 percent for the three periods. Older Series EE and E Bonds and U.S. Savings Notes also receive the variable rate; however, all Bonds must be held at





ments of the license class for which the person is applying. "All classes of licenses including renewals will be valid for four years," Adams said. "The fee for obtaining or renewing all license classes will be \$10. An examination fee of five dollars will be charged for those drivers seeking a higher license classification or a motorcycle endorsement for

their current license." Drivers who have no moving violation convictions over a four-year period and who also have no physical limitations are eligible to renew their licenses by mail. To qualify for mail-in renewal, a driver must first receive a DPS form in the mail. This application should be mailed back to the department within one week after it is received. When the license is renewed, the driver will be sent a validation card which must be carried with the old license. A vision test and new photograph will not be required for mail-in renewals. Drivers who receive

mail-in renewal forms may also visit a driver license office and renew their licenses according to the standard procedure which will require them to be photographed and have their vision tested.







Wind breaks provide excellent protection to areas from the wind as well as providing wildlife habitat and screening from outside view. A major problem in establishing windbreaks is the need for water in addition to the normal precipitation.

Without the additional water, young trees have little chance for survival. Temporary wind and rodent protection should also be considered when planting small trees.



A drip irrigation system is a planned irrigation system in which all necessary facilities are installed for efficiently applying water directly to the root zone of plants by means of applicators operated under low pressure. The applicators



CANNOT BE REFILLED

Occasionally the pharmacist will attach an auxilary label to the prescription_container which reads "CANNOT_BE REFILLED". This brief message conveys several meanings, none of which may be immediately apparent.

Depending on the type of medicine prescribed, a "no refill'' label may simply mean that the physician did not want the prescription refilled. This type of situation frequently applies to those drugs which are intended for continual use leg, chronic conditions such as high blood pressure, diabetes, or heart problems). Refills may be limited on such medicines to encourage periodic check-ups which will help-insure that the medicine is still producing the desired effect.

Antibiotics [infection fighters] are another example of medicines_that often carry the "CANNOT_BE REFILLED" label. Refills are not needed if one round or course of therapy is sufficient to wipe out the infection. A lingering infection, on the other hand, may require additional visits to the physician.

Although auxiliary labels are intended to be helpful, they are sometimes confusing and misleading. If the exact purpose of any auxiliary label is unclear, it's best to discuss that label with the pharmacist.

Q: A neighborhood child was recently convicted for burglarizing my home, and he is free on probation. I lost several valuable items. Now I'm out the money. Do I have any recourse? Is there any way parents can be held responsible for the actions of their minor child?

The child acts intentionally;

The child is between 12 and 18 years old; and The parents were careless in failing to control him. In this situation you could probably sue the child and his parents, assuming they knew his dangerous tendencies. However, as a practical matter, you'd probably get more satisfaction by talking with the child's probation officer. Ask to have the judge order restitution as a condition of probation, and the child will have to work to pay you back.

Q: I am planning to divorce my husband. His two teenage daughters live with us, as well as our 5-year old son. We are buying a home. When I file for divorce, can I make him leave? Does he have to take

The court has a number of options, and the final decision will depend on the needs and circumstances of all persons involved, especially the children. On final hearing, the court may order the house sold and the proceeds divided. It may award the house to one of you and award the other spouse other property. It may set the house aside for the use of either you or

A: If you bought the

house during the marriage,

it is community property

and belongs to you jointly.

If you and your husband

do not agree what should

be done with the house, the

court will decide for you.



your husband until the children are grown and then order it sold and the proceeds divided. In the meantime, while a divorce is pending, the

court probably will give one or the other of you the use of the house. But, without a court order, neither of you has a right to make the other leave. Nor do you give up your rights if you leave voluntarily.

You should be aware, however, that if you leave and find another place to live, the court will probably not change that arrangement while the divorce is pending.





Study Shows Leasing Créates New Jobs Good news for American

workers from a study which shows that equipment leasing creates new jobs in the American econom



Computer equipment leasing created 177,000 jobs in one year

The study by Andrew Brimmer, former member of the board of the Federal Reserve, was commissioned by the General Electric Credit Corporation. Jobs are created, the study shows, when capital for new plants and equipment is created through leasing. Such outlays stimulate the demand for capital goods and for a variety of related products and services. As output rises to meet these demands, labor requirements increase and new jobs are created.

Among the eight indus tries studied, the number of new jobs ranged from just over 40,000 in construction machinery and equipment to more than 308,000 in transportation equipment.

The study also shows that lease financing has expanded to the point where it is the single most important source of funds for cap ital equipment, a whopping 57.6 billion or 16.6% of otal fixed investment by
