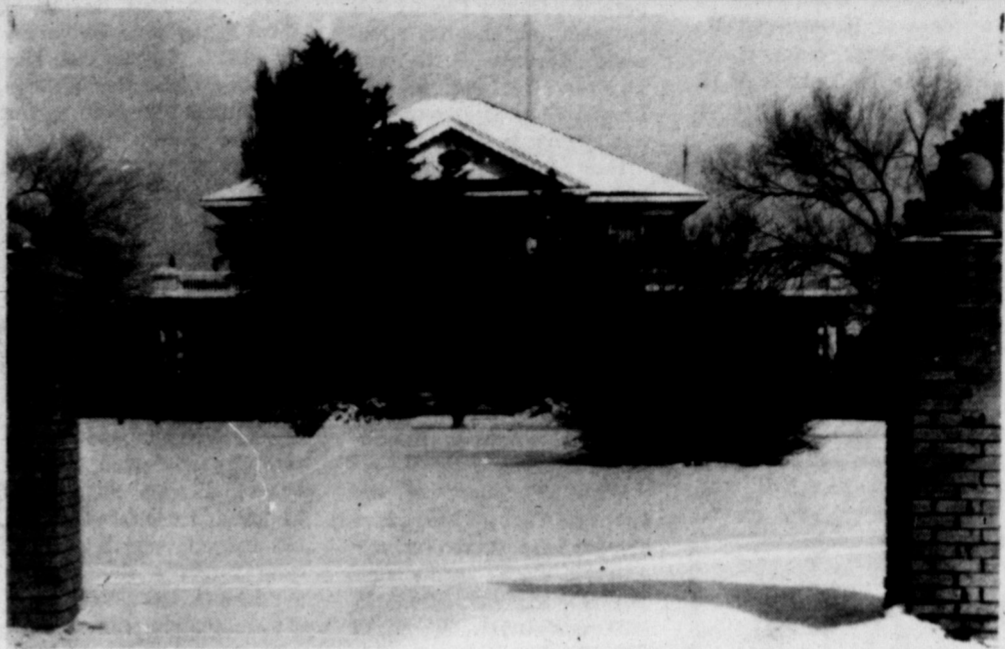

Prisoner walks away from jail

John D. Russell, a prisoner at the Donley County jail, walked away from the jail Saturday night, January 21, at 7 p.m. The sheriffs department quickly sealed off all avenues of escape by blocking all highways and roads leading out of Clarendon.

Sheriff Jimmy Thompson and Deputy Sheriff Butch Blackburn apprehended the prisoner two hours later, only three blocks from the jail. They found him hiding in a storage shed next to the railroad tracks at about 9:10 p.m. He did not resist arrest and was taken back to the Donley County jail.

Russell was scheduled to go on trial, Monday, January 23 for attempted murder.

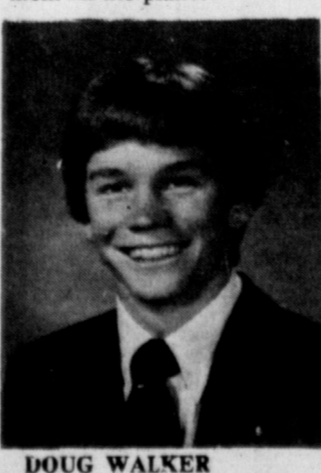

-13 degrees record breaker

The weather outside was frightful, the fire was so delightful, let it snow, let it snow, as the song goes. This song certainly applied to Donley County this past week. A record breaking -13 degrees was recorded by weatherman Tommie Saye, Wednesday night. Mr. Wells of the National Weather Bureau confirmed that this was the coldest ever recorded for Clarendon. In February of 1930 a -11 degrees was recorded.

An oddity about the -13 degrees low for Wednesday, was a 13 degrees recorded as a high for the same day. Sure glad it was not on Friday the 13th, no telling how cold it might have gotten.

Five inches of snow was recorded. The moisture content was only .43 for the 5 inches. The Weather Bureau reports if the snow flakes are small they contain less moisture than when the flakes are larger. It takes about an inch of snow to make .10 of an inch of moisture.

The Donley County Sheriffs office reported that drivers were careful on the hazardous streets, as the sheriffs office did not have any reports of accidents.

The ranchers have had to feed their cattle and chop ice out of watering places. Fortunately cotton farmers were approximately 98 percent finished harvesting and the cotton gins had just about finished ginning.

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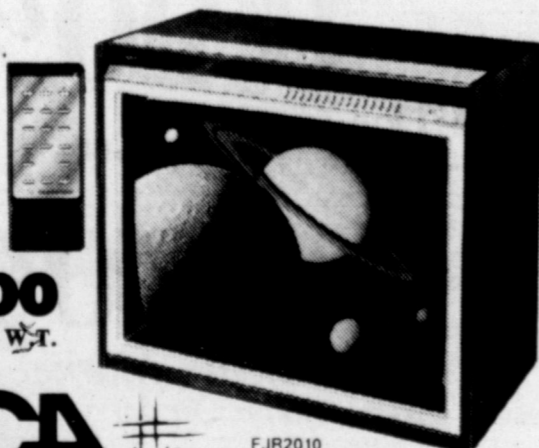

VA phone unit ranges 2,000 time a day

Most people would pull the telephone off the wall if it rang 2,000 times in eight hours -- but if the phones at the Waco VA Regional Office ring any less, it's been a slow day.

The telephone interview unit at the regional office receives 1,200 to 2,500 calls a day from veterans and their dependents. Each of the unit's 15 veterans benefits counselors answers an average of 120 inquiries daily. The toll-free service puts an experienced benefits counselor within reach of any veteran anywhere in Texas.

"The telephone unit was established to provide personal consultation to veterans unable to visit the regional office," said regional office Acting Director W.E. Welstead. "Our telephone counselors can discuss eligibility and entitlement for all VA programs during a telephone conversation."

Seated at desks in front of computer terminal screens and wearing telephone head sets eliminating use of a traditional hand-held receiver, telephone counselors take calls one after another covering everything from home loan guaranty eligibility to lost checks.

VA's "Target" computer terminals give each counselor immediate access to VA's national records system. Counselors can identify and expedite action on a lost VA benefits check, give a caller an update on a benefits claim in process or verify the accuracy of a benefits check during a phone call. The counselor can also identify benefits a veteran may not have known were available.

"Access to the computer system is activated when a veteran or beneficiary answers seven personal questions and provides a VA claim number, social security number or military service number," explained Welstead. "This question-answer process protects a veteran's file from exposure to unauthorized individuals."

Welstead advised any veteran or veteran's dependent or survivor to call the telephone unit with questions about VA benefits Monday-Friday, 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on the following toll-free lines:

PUC asking a moratorium on service disconnects

The Public Utility Commission of Texas is asking electric utilities to place a moratorium on service disconnects for customers unable to pay unusually high December bills.

In a letter to chief executive officers of Texas electric utilities, Chairman Al Erwin outlined the program which utilities may participate in voluntarily. The voluntary moratorium applies only to electric utilities. Guidelines are:

- *Customers must request that the utility not disconnect their service.
- *Utilities may offer extensions or payment plans following PUC rules.
- *The moratorium is voluntary and statewide.

The plan is intended to address only the December usage and billing period. Almost \$300 million in state-wide damages resulted from the unusually cold weather which was experienced throughout Texas in December.

"We hope that the electric utilities will want to participate in the moratorium in order to prevent service dis-

connections to customers unable to afford a single payment for December's usage," said Chairman Erwin.

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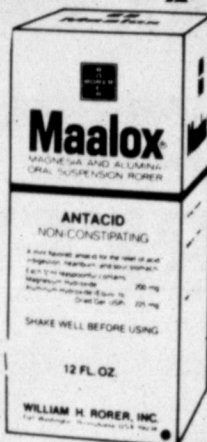
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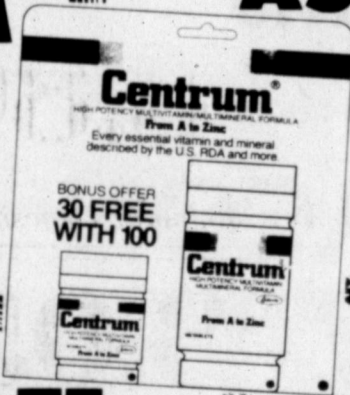
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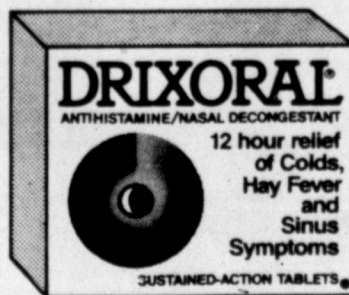

*Bills incurred by the City in the month of December, 1983, were presented and ordered paid.

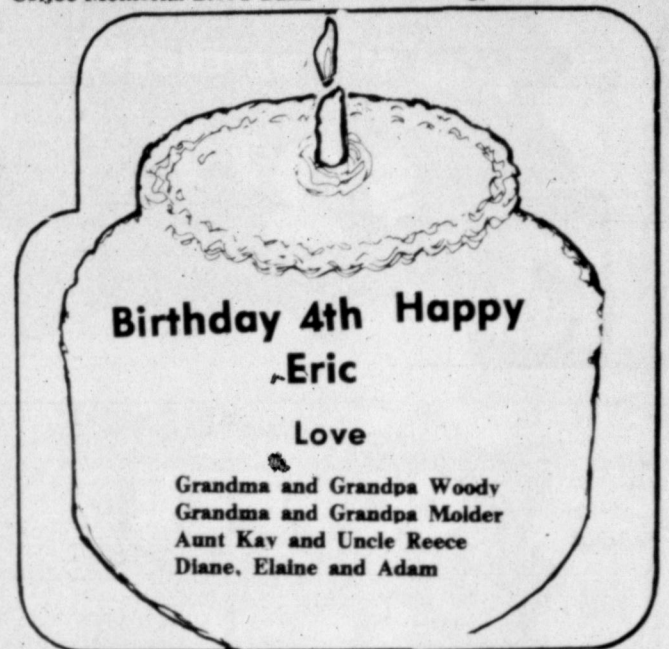

Facts On Fever

Fever is one of the body's major ways of reacting when something goes wrong. Besides fighting infection, it alerts us to take action to help the body relieve the problem.



If fever strikes, doctors say, go to bed and stay there.

If someone comes down with a fever, the best thing for him or her to do is to go to bed and stay there. Drink lots of liquid, but no alcohol. Light food is allowed, but don't force yourself to eat.

Often the symptoms that accompany a fever are important in finding out what's wrong. If the fever came on following a fall, if a rash develops, if the fever is over 101 degrees or lasts longer than a couple of days, contact your doctor.

For ordinary fever, bed rest, aspirin and lots of liquids should help. If the fever is accompanied by stomach cramps or nausea, aspirin might be harmful. Check with your doctor first.

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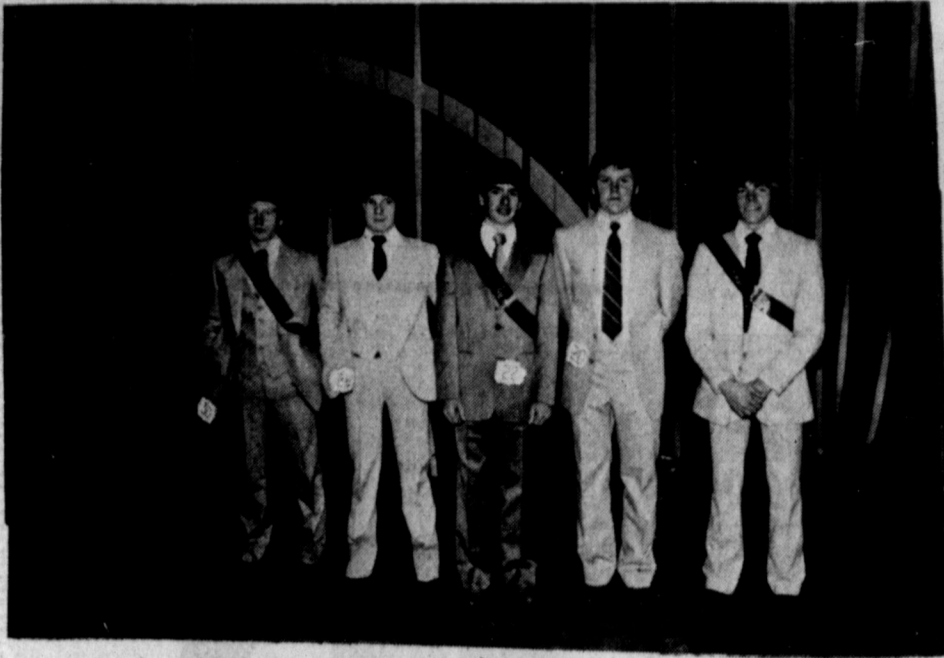
