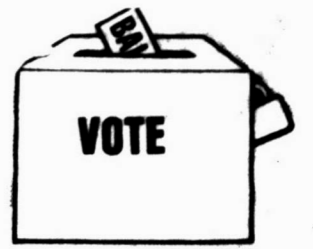

Funeral services held April 1 for Rev. Paul David Hancock

Funeral services for Rev. Paul David Hancock, age 48, were held at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, April 1, 1984 in the First United Methodist Church with Rev. Tom Posey of Memphis and Rev. Bill Watson, Pastor, officiating. Masonic graveside services and interment were in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Rev. Hancock died at 2:35 a.m. on Saturday, March 31, 1984 in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. He was born June 24, 1935 in Hall County, Texas and was married to Ruth Justiss on January 19, 1964 in Clarendon. At the time of his death he was working as a Financial Supervisor for the Texas Department of Human Resources. He had been a resident of Clarendon since 1958 moving here from Memphis.

He graduated from Memphis schools in 1954 and from Dallas Christian College in 1956. He served as the Pastor of the First Christian Church in Clarendon, Hedley and Miami from 1958 to 1973. He was the Past Master of the Clarendon Masonic Lodge #700, Past Patron of the Clarendon Order of the Easter Star, Charter Member and First President of the Almorah Shrine Club, Past District Deputy of the Masonic Lodge of Texas, Member of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, member of the Donley County Historical Survey Commission, President and charter member of Saints Rost Museum Committee and served as the choir director and Sunday School teacher of the men's class at the First United Methodist Church. He was a member of the First Christian Church and the First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ruth J. Hancock of Clarendon; two daughters, Amy Hancock and Buffie Hancock of the home; one sister, Mrs. Nadine Myers of Clarendon; and three brothers, Cecil Hancock of Borger, L.L. Hancock of Batson, and Johnny Hancock of Memphis.

Hedley citizens will vote for four school board members, three City Aldermen and a Mayor. They will vote at the Hedley Lion's Club from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Jon Leggett is the only candidate filing for the position of mayor. There are six candidates for the three positions on the Hedley I.S.D. Sunday morning burglary at Saye's

Crime once again darkens the streets of Clarendon, a town known for its peaceful and crime-free environment, commonly called the "Saints Roost" of the Panhandle.

Late Saturday night, March 31 or early Sunday morning, April 1, Saye's clothing store was burglarized. Entrance was gained by going through the roof by way of the air conditioning duct.

Once entrance was obtained, the burglar stole one \$60.00 sheep skin vest with approximately \$20.00 of dimes and quarters. The burglar then proceeded to leave by breaking out the front door.

Tommye and Lucy Saye, owners of Saye's, could not be notified until late Monday. The Sayes were in Dallas marketing for merchandise. His son, Tim Saye, was notified and was on the crime scene Sunday afternoon.

Tommye Saye indicated that the burglar damaged the store's ceiling when entering.

"This was the third time in 36 years my store has been broken into. The previous time was 10 years ago," stated Mr. Saye.

Currently Jimmy Thompson is conducting a thorough investigation pertaining to the robbery. Several clues have already been found since Sunday. Sheriff Thompson was asked if this crime was related to last month's hold up of Judy's Hair Design. He stated, "This crime is totally different from the previous one with absolutely no connections."

Sheriffs office to fingerprint school children

On Monday, April 30, all those interested in having their pre-school age children fingerprinted for purposes of identification are urged to do so at the Sheriff's office at 9:00 a.m. Sheriff Thompson will be available for printing at the Elementary School (grades K-6) on Tuesday, May 1, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Mr. Floyd Guinn will see that permission forms are sent home with the elementary students. The permission form MUST BE SIGNED by parent or guardian and returned to the school before the child can be printed. The school will keep the permission forms.

Only one set of prints will be made and that set will be the property of the parent. Under Texas law the police department CANNOT keep the prints. These prints need to be kept in a safe place in a manilla envelope, as they will smudge. A recent picture should be placed on the fingerprint card and updated every year. Pictures of infants need to be changed every 6 months.

Unfortunately, missing children are a reality — a possibility that we are forced to face. Please consider seriously what could be one of the most important of community efforts — IDENTIFICATION FOR CHILDREN.

Reasons for fingerprinting your child:

"In recent years a great many civil disputes across the country have resulted in one parent taking the child and leaving town. Particularly in cases where children are taken at a very young age and are gone for a number of years, they might be difficult to recognize.

"There are rings that go around the country kidnapping children for sexual purposes. Many people never find out what happened to

the book or books returned. Library books are sometimes easy to misplace and forget about, particularly if several family members use the library. Each lost book, however, is a money loss to a library operating on a small budget.

Mrs. Stavenhagen asks that everyone check to see if there could be a misplaced book among your own.

Texas-Australia Sesquicentennial meeting at CC

South Australia and Texas are each celebrating their sesquicentennial (one hundred and fifty years) in 1986. Libby Ellis, a South Australian government employee, visited Clarendon on Tuesday, March 20, 1984 to explain her country's twinning-cities idea here.

Libby is here on a second trip having been in Texas November of last year. Here previous trip was to areas of east and south Texas, and the Fort Worth-Dallas areas. She compared the two states, Texas and South Australia.

Each of them are in the south central position of their countries; their physical properties are very similar as they both have a southern coastal border, both are mostly flat with plains where cattle graze the ranges and wheat and other small grains grow. Ansimilarity is the scarcity of water. Water management is a prime target for South Australia as they are midway into their second hundred years.

Unlike Texas most of the states population is concentrated along the coastal area near Adelaide, the capital city. The Murry River Ms. Ellis likened to the Mississippi River with the river traffic. Some other differences are apparent also. A favorite breakfast item is South Australia for the children is vegemite spread on toast. If the average Texan does not know that vegemite (with a consistency of peanut butter) is black and derived from meat, the average South Australian does not know what guts are either. A hamburger in that country has in addition to the meat- onion-tomato-onion-slice of pineapple, an egg, bacon and cheese. The cost is a dollar or a dollar and twenty cents.

Schools will play an important place in the "twinning" exchange of the two states. This is another place of differences. South Australia has twelve grades, as we do, but there are 5 years of elementary and six years of advanced education. They have no middle school. Children begin kindergarten at age four and school at five years of age. Higher education, college and university study is free. However not everyone may go to these institutions. Those students who do go must have a grade level which will make them acceptable. Libby stressed that it did not matter who your daddy was or how much money he had, the grades were the factor on which admittance was based.

Another difference is the seasonal change. South Australia, being south of the equator has summer when we have our winter. Their climate is warmer than ours with the extreme temperatures varying from 120° (135 in the deserts) to a low of 45°. Mrs. Ellis shuddered at the thought of the recent blizzard which gave Amarillo and the panhandle national coverage February 26-27. They rarely receive any snow there.

One of the interesting events for the South Austral-

ian sesquicentennial is Libby's pet project, the running of the Inter-Colonial Express. This old steam train is nearly a hundred years old. The Orient Express is the sponsor of the three day trip which will incustoms inspections at the border as it did originally. The old wooden carriages are being restored and the fare is \$1,000 for the round trip from Adelaide to Melbourne.

In South Australia there are about 250,000 aboriginals. Ironically Mrs. Ellis reported that after years of effort to fit the aboriginals into the civilized life of the country, they are now reviving the culture of these original inhabitants. They even have classes at the universities to teach them some of the lost culture.

Clarendon was privileged to have this visit from Libby Ellis of Adelaide, South Australia and Jim Spears of San Antonio, who accompanied her as coordinator because Sara SoRelle, daughter of Zell SoRelle of Clarendon, turned on the television in San Antonio, and saw the program of the "Twinning Cities" with Libby Ellis. Mrs. SoRelle called her mother in Clarendon and the very interesting meeting with Libby was the result. Two Clarendon Households were hosts to the visitors. Mrs. Emmett Simmons was hostess to Libby Ellis and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Todd were hosts to Jim Spears.

The meeting was opened with Clarendon Hamilton, chairman of the Donley County Historical Committee, welcoming the visitor from South Australia. Libby visited 33 cities in Texas in November and she is working on the twinning of the cities at the community level.

There are some cities and towns with the same names. There is even a Clarendon in South Australia. However it is a suburb of a large metropolitan area. This would not be likely as an exchange, if that is a result of the visit here, since a community of similar size is the desirable choice.

TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS, REMEDIES, RESPONSIBILITIES!
 Charles SoRelle, chief appraiser for the Donley County Appraisal District, has announced the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

"Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings available to property owners.

The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to property taxes collected by all types of local government, including counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as hospitals and municipal utility districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by various taxing units including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of

their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze, or ceiling, on the tax bill from the school district on his house and yard," SoRelle added. "This ceiling is based on the taxes assessed when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption for the first time."

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that homeowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year need not apply again this year. Only those who became 65 during 1983 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must apply for 1984.

Homeowners may also be eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption for county tax purposes. This exemption is granted on the portion of county tax for farm-to-market roads and flood control.

Additional exemptions are available upon application to disabled veterans and to other disabled citizens or those aged 65 and older.

Owners of agricultural land which was taxed for 1983 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to re-apply unless requested in writing by the appraisal office to do so. However, applications must be filed before May 1 for land to be

taxed for 1984 under 1-d-1 open-space provisions, and by landowners who have not previously received productivity valuation.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax reductions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personnel as well as in the pamphlet," SoRelle said.

He said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making a protest to the ARB and ways to prepare and present the appeal.

Another section deals with the process of initiative and referendum by which voters are able to petition for an election to limit the amount of tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and to make any applications required, in order to get all the tax relief to which they are entitled. Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office before May 1," the chief appraiser said.

The pamphlet and other information is available from the Donley Appraisal District office in the Courthouse Annex in Clarendon.

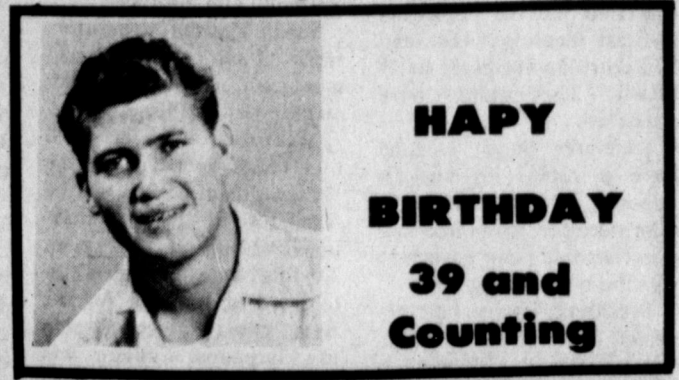
Once a Christian doctor and an unconverted doctor were talking together, and the unconverted physician said to his friend, "How can
