## May was older American month

Every May we salute older Americans -- their achievements, wisdom, courage and strength -- but what really makes a person "old" in this era of increasing longevity?

Time magazine quotes comedian George Burns, now 88, as saying, "A lot of people practice getting old. They start practicing when they're 70, and when they're 75, they're a hit. They've made it, they are now old."

One of the myths accompanying the '65 is old' myth is that older persons are simply not productive.

According to Robert Butler of the National Institute of Aging, there's been a 26 year gain in life expectancy in just the last 80 years, which has

given the nation a population of 26 million people over the age of 65.

Clarendon has a very active senior citizens center, they serve approximately 85 noon meals a day, Monday thru Friday.

Exercise classes daily at 11 a.m. and Monday, Wednesday and Thursday at 2 p.m. They are busy on Friday afternoon with their arts and crafts classes. This winter they have been 'busy quilting.'

Every Thursday night, the senior citizens meet and play games of dominos, cards, 84 and 42.

Some 49 of them practice dancing every Monday night.

Then on the first Tuesday of each month they have a dance with live music played by a local band. Cecil and Alice Munden, Truett Behrens, Jack Davidson and others provide the music for this affair.

On the third Tuesday of each month they outgrow the senior citizens hall and hold their dance at the Lions Club, with a band out of Memphis playing the music.

The last Tuesday of each month they enjoy a birthday and anniversary pot luck supper, which honors those having birthdays or anniversaries during the past month.

As you can see from that schedule, the senior citizens

of Clarendon are not letting the world pass them by, the over-65 group is increasingly vigorous and healthy.

Older people are working longer and taking better care of themselves than ever before. Today, 83 percent of newborn babies will live into their 60's compared with one-third just 150 years ago.

One of the things the local senior citizens organization would like to get across about their noon meals, this is not a program for the low income or -needy, this is a well balanced nutritious meal which anyone can come and enjoy. There is a suggested price for those 60 and over and a little higher price for those under sixty.

# Sylvia Smith has Talent

Sylvia Smith has worn many hats in her day, from cab driver to YWCA house mother to glove seamstress.

Now, you might say her hat is that of craftswoman as Smith spends many hours each day crocheting tablecloths.  
The petite 70-year-old sits in an easy chair in her top-floor apartment at Autumn Heights, her fingers

nimbly working bedspread thread via a crochet hook into the round shape.  
"I don't call it talent; some people say it is, but it's just something I like to do."  
Smith has crocheted over 500 tablecloths in the last 15 years - their destinies all over

the country and world, including the White House.  
When Rosalynn Carter and then President Jimmy Carter came to Burlington several summers ago, Smith gave Rosalynn a tablecloth as a birthday gift.  
Rosalynn's thank-you - a

color photograph of the Carter clan and letter from her secretary - is elegantly framed on Smith's wall. "I was really happy when I got it. I couldn't imagine what I was getting from the White House."  
THE PETITE SMITH says she learned crocheting and sewing as a child. Her tablecloths began as a 28-inch doily and eventually became 70-inch tablecloths - ranging from all white to combinations like red/green/white for Christmas and green/yellow/white, orange/brown/white and more.

She needs 10 days to make one and works on it "from the time I get up in the morning at six o'clock until I go to bed at night. I just eat a little lunch and I might dust the floors."  
She's given away and sold her tablecloths to many friends and friends of friends, including her cab patrons and her "girls" when she was YW housemother.  
Three years ago, Smith had a heart attack, and her doctor told her to keep her hands busy. She's obviously been following his advice religiously.

WHEN SHE TIRES of a tablecloth, she might crochet a cattail (cat's toy) or play the piano in her bedroom.  
Smith's talent runs in her family. Her mother was a seamstress, her father liked to take out bicycle spokes and replace them and her daughter, Lynda Patton, Morning Sun, is a talented crocheter and knitter.  
Smith still likes to drive - she drove an ambulance at the Ordnance Plant during World War II - but now limits her surface to city streets unless accompanied by a friend.  
And Smith is looking forward to hopping on a different set of wheels this summer. Her bicycle's ready for some sunshiny days.

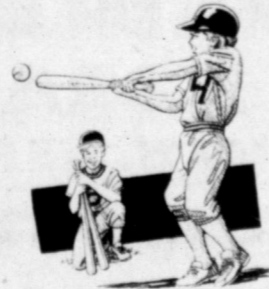

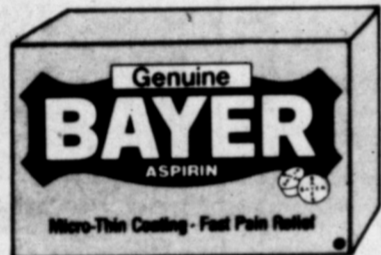

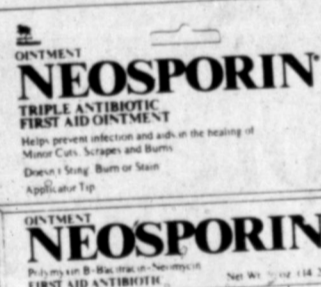

### Education Assistance Bill

Sherrie Hill-McDougal receives national recognition

Sherrie Hill-McDougal, a native of Hedley, Texas, received national recognition recently, for her performances both off and on the basketball court. A guard for the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma (Chickasha) women's basketball team, Hill-McDougal was named to the prestigious National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Academic All-American team.

One of only 26 qualifiers in the nation for the honor, the USAO junior maintained a 3.58 grade point average in the classroom, while topping the Lady Drivers in scoring with a 14.5 average.

In addition, Hill-McDougal averaged four rebounds and three assists from her point guard position. She hit 47.3 percent of her field goal attempts and 76 percent from the line.

Besides her national recognition, Hill-McDougal was named first team all-conference and second team District IX. The Lady Drivers, under the leader-

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particular provision, however, is also for targeted personnel whose military specialty is vital to national defense.

H.R. 5167 is the Fiscal Year 1985 Defense Authorization Bill, and was reported out of the House Armed Services Committee on April 11, 1984. That committee had the bill for some 11 months following unanimous approval by the House Committee on Veterans Affairs. Persons caring to do so may contact their Congressman and Senator to express their comments either for or against the proposal.

### Veterans Job Training Act

Veterans of the Korean and Vietnam wars in Texas could find their war duty a distinct advantage in finding a job as a result of a federal legislation passed last October.

Called the Emergency Veterans' Job Training Act (Public Law 98-77), the bill features the direct wage reimbursement for participating employers. So far, 1,125 Texas employers have committed 3,344 training positions under the new law and have hired about 600 jobless veterans.

In addition to authorizing job placement assistance for Korean and Vietnam veterans, the legislation also authorizes the federal government to reimburse employers who train and hire the veterans with 50 percent of the veteran's starting salary.

That means employers who participate in the program could receive up to \$10,000, said Stephen Lemons, Director at the Waco VA Regional Office.

To qualify, veterans must have served 180 days or more on active duty and part of their service must have been during the Korean or Vietnam wars. Because those wars were not officially declared wars, the federal government has determined

that Korean veterans must have served at some point between June 27, 1950, and January 31, 1955, to be eligible under the program, and Vietnam veterans must have served at some time between August 5, 1964, and May 7, 1975.

The veterans also must be currently unemployed or out of work for at least 15 of the last 20 weeks, prior to applying for placement assistance under the program. Maximum training period for the veteran is nine months, through disabled veterans or those with serious employment handicaps may be trained for as long as 15 months.

"Disability does not necessarily mean inability," Lemons added, saying a disabled veteran could be someone who had suffered a heart attack 10 years ago or someone who had diabetes.

Employers who qualify under the program must have jobs available in a growth industry or one which requires new technological skills, or they must have a situation where there is a low number of trained workers for a certain position. Lemons noted that some employers might find these restrictions misleading.

"That sounds more limiting than is actually is," Lemons said. "In reality, you can look at it as a fast-food restaurant. That's a growth industry."

Another example, Lemons said, would be a construction company. Just about any of the construction trades would qualify because the demand exceeds the supply of labor. Local Texas Employment Commission Offices can tell you if your company, or business falls into this category. Any new technological skills involving computers, lasers, microwave or nuclear energy would generally qualify for approval.

Those veterans or employers who are interested in the program should contact a state veterans employment representative or call the Waco VA Regional Office toll-free number listed in your local telephone directory under "Veterans Administration" or "U.S. Government."

# Farm Loan Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon, FmHA county supervisor Marvin L. Crabtree said today. Armstrong County is one of 77 counties in Texas

recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought. Mr. Crabtree said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit

**The Clarendon Press, Thur., May 27, 1984**  
 from private commercial lenders, the interest rate of the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent; interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent. As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Crabtree said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss. Applications for loans this emergency designation will be accepted until September 19, 1984, but farmers

should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Crabtree said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on

farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through

Friday. The office in the Court-house in Claude is open from 10 a.m. to 12 noon the first and third Wednesday of each month.

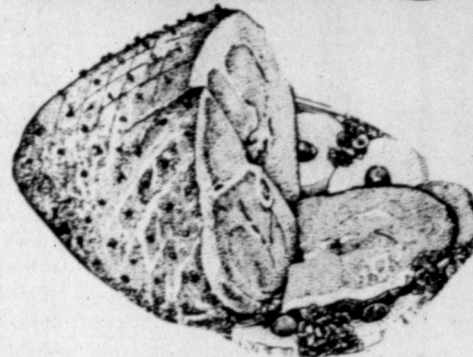

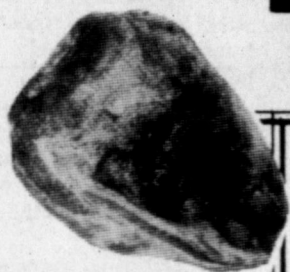

# ASCS News

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block today announced emergency measures implemented by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to aid producers in areas still affected by a continuing drought and other adverse weather conditions.

Block said the emergency measures include expanding the emergency feed assistance program, allowing haying and grazing on cropland taken out of production in the 1984 farm programs, and providing assistance to live-

stock producers in locating hay or other roughage.

"Those who are involved in the business of agriculture know full well that they always risk facing adverse weather," Block said. "However, weather conditions in certain parts of the country have been especially severe. This is why USDA is taking every reasonable action possible to provide assistance to those who are most affected."

Approval for haying and grazing privileges on idled

cropland in the 1984 farm program will be given on a county-by-county basis. Producers should contact their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for information on obtaining these privileges. Block said he has directed ASCS to give requests for approval highest priority. "I would like to see a 24 to 48-hour turnaround in handling the requests," he said.

The agency also is providing the assistance in locating hay or other roughage for livestock producers to purchase. All ASCS offices will maintain updated lists of producers who have hay or

other roughage available for sale in each state. Producers needing assistance should contact their local offices, Block said.

Under the provisions of the emergency feed assistance program, counties automatically become eligible for this program after they have been designated by Block for the emergency loan program administered by USDA's Farmers Home Administration.

The emergency feed assistance program allows sale of Commodity Credit Corporation lower-grade corn at reduced rates to livestock producers whose feed harvest suffered because of drought, hot weather or other natural disasters and who have insufficient feed available to preserve their foundation livestock.

The corn also may be available to producers in counties not designated by the Farmers Home Administration if those counties meet requirements under a special designation for emergency feed eligibility.

Block said about 10 million bushels of U.S. No. 4, 5 and Sample grade corn are available for sale. About 4.1 million bushels are currently stored in Texas, 2.5 million in Minnesota and 2.7 million in Nebraska.

The cost to eligible producers will be 75 percent of the 1983 basic county loan rate in the county where the corn is stored. Producers will be responsible for transportation costs in moving the corn to their livestock, he said.

The Board discussed the Pothole Bill Resolution that the Texas Municipal League is trying to get passed to provide funds for upgrading streets in Texas cities. A resolution was called supporting increased State highway funding. The resolution is as follows:

**RESOLUTION**  
WHEREAS, authoritative surveys reveal that:

(1) Texas leads the nation in the number of deficient bridges (172,000) and deteriorated state roadways (7,740 miles).

(2) The state's 5c per-gallon motor fuel tax is the lowest in the nation, and has not been increased in 27 years. Moreover, in 1965, 27% of the state budget went for transportation, while in 1982 only about 10% of the state budget was spent for transportation-related purposes.

(3) Each Texas Motorist pays a "bad roads" tax averaging \$291 per year for wasted gasoline, tire wear, car repairs, insurance and medical bills.

(4) Additional transportation spending of \$51 billion will be needed over the next 20 years to overcome the current backlog of needs--including \$6.2 million for road and bridge rehabilitation, \$30.3 billion for reconstruction, \$6.7 billion for new roads and \$7.7 billion for maintenance; and

WHEREAS, the state's transportation funding problems are reflected at the local level, as follows:

(1) The current backlog of city street repair needs exceeds \$1 billion. Texas cities are spending an estimated \$193 million per year on street repairs--more than ever before. But they are still falling further behind each year, because the street repair backlog is growing at rates that exceed local spending increases. The cities must have state financial assistance in order to bring their streets and bridges up to standard.

(2) Upwards of 20 percent of all municipal streets--more than 13,000 miles--are currently in need of major repair.

(3) The deterioration of city streets and bridges will accelerate in the future. The 10 million motor vehicles already in the state are wearing out local roads and bridges faster than they can be repaired; twenty years from now, the cities will have 16 million vehicles to contend with--more than half again today's volume; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Municipal League supports the state funding and tax increases necessary to bring our state-local roads and bridges up to par;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon that the Texas Legislature is urged to enact a state-local road and bridge financing package composed of the following:

(1) An increase of \$1 billion per year in funding for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

(2) \$100 million per year for the City Street Improvement Fund (the "Pothole Bill") proposed, but not approved during the 1983 Legislative session.

(3) Doubling the rate of the state motor fuel tax to 10c/gallon and increasing motor vehicle license fees as necessary to generate adequate funding.

## Dr. Holcombe's Advice to Cattle Buyers

Here's a suggestion for livestock producers in those areas of Texas where rains have occurred recently:

Don't buy brucellosis. "That's a good practice any time under any conditions. But now that rains have fallen in parts of this state including some of the drier areas, there will be a tendency to restock when grass returns."

"The temptation to buy cattle will be great, and producers should remember a basic management practice relating to brucellosis control: make sure the cattle you buy are free of brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe said.

He also urged producers to isolate any cattle they buy at any time from their herds and test them in 45 to 120 days following purchase to check for animals that might

have been in the early stages of infection.

You might also want to consider buying cattle from a certified brucellosis free herd. There are now more than 1,100 such herds in Texas. The Texas Animal Health Commission area office nearest you can provide you with the names of owners of certified brucellosis free herds in your area.

"We have made a lot of progress throughout the state in reducing brucellosis infection, and this is especially true in the drought areas of Texas. Producers should follow through with this progress by remembering to check first on the brucellosis status of any cattle they buy. This is one situation where an ounce of prevention can prevent a whole herd of trouble," Dr. Holcombe said.

## Number of Women Veterans increases

The number of female veterans continues to grow slowly but steadily according to a report published by the Veterans Administration's Office of Reports and Statistics.

Women veterans living in the United States and Puerto Rico as of March 31, 1983, were estimated at 1,150,000, or 4.1 percent of all living veterans. The total was about 39,000 or 3.5 percent higher than the 1980 Census figure, an increase which represents an upward trend not characteristic of the male veteran population.

Administrator of Veterans Affairs Harry N. Walters pointed out that as the number of female veterans grows, and as more and more move into the older age groups, their needs will increase correspondingly.

"The special problems confronting these women and the VA's response to their particular needs will be better addressed as detailed demographic data become available," Walters said. "This comprehensive profile of the female veteran population will assist all those involved in the planning for future demands," he added. Last year Walters appoint-

ted an 18-member Advisory Committee on Female Veterans to assist him in addressing the needs of this group of veterans.

The 1980 Census marked the initial time that detailed information on female veterans had ever been gathered. The data represent an extremely valuable set of baseline statistics from which future projects have been prepared.

Other findings in the study include:

- \*Thirty-six percent of female veterans served during peacetime only.
- \*One of every five female veterans is at least 65 years old.
- \*California has the largest female veteran population (149,800), followed by New York (74,100), Florida (73,200), Texas (72,800), and Pennsylvania (55,500).
- \*Collectively these five states accounted for 37 percent of all female veterans living in the United States.
- \*The female veteran population is expected to increase slowly but steadily throughout the next several decades.
- \*The elderly female veteran population is projected to grow at a slower pace than that for males.

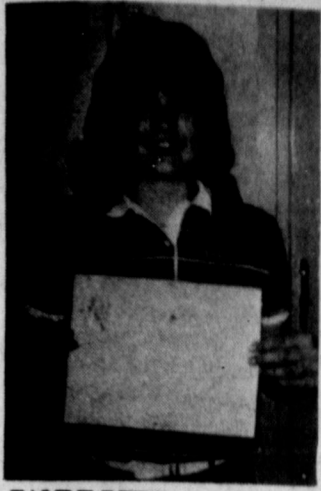

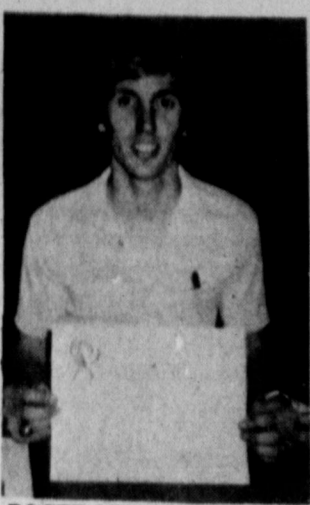

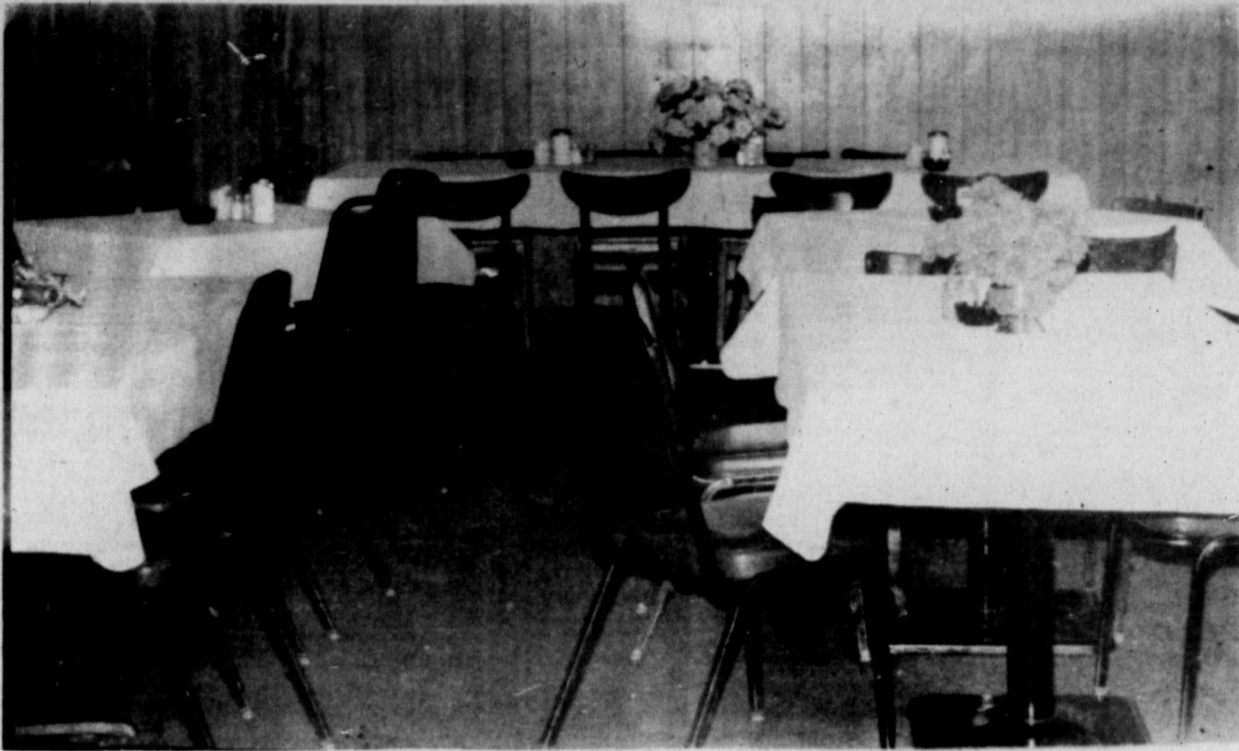
