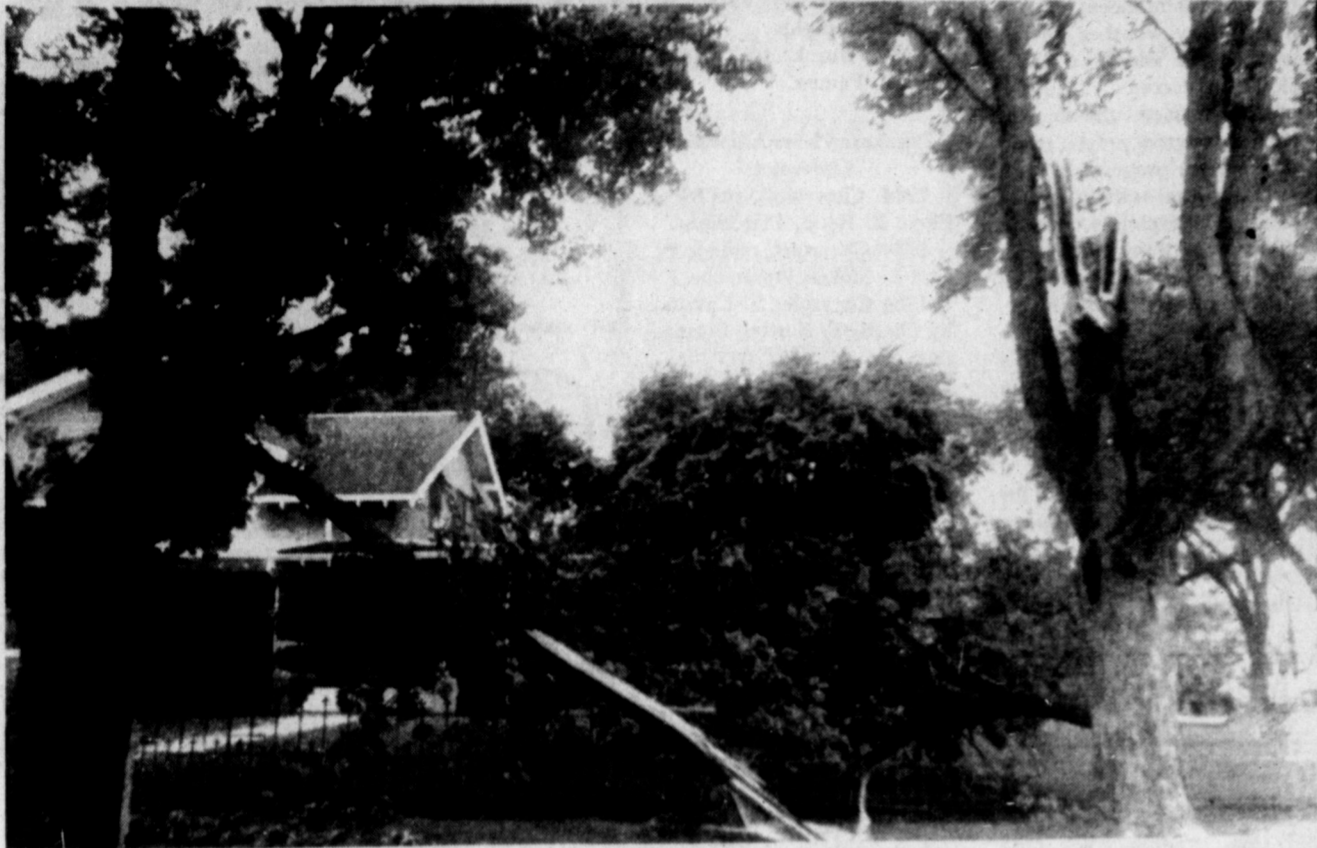

High winds, rain and some hail swept across the county Sunday night, giving the farmers ample moisture to plant their cotton crops. ASCS office reported little crop damage.

Most of the damage was done by high winds, but a few reported hail. Farmers in Ashtola community seemed to have had more hail than in other parts of the county.

High winds did a lot of damage to trees and rushing water washed a lot of sand and gravel onto Highway 287 and city streets.

A Blue Spruce tree was uprooted at the Wilbert Bernabe residence. Limbs from trees were scattered in yards and the street. The DQ sign at the Dairy Queen was blown out by the high winds.

However, in any case when the certificate of title is of the new design which incorporates the odometer statement in the assignment, then the assignment must be properly completed in its entirety, including the odometer statement.

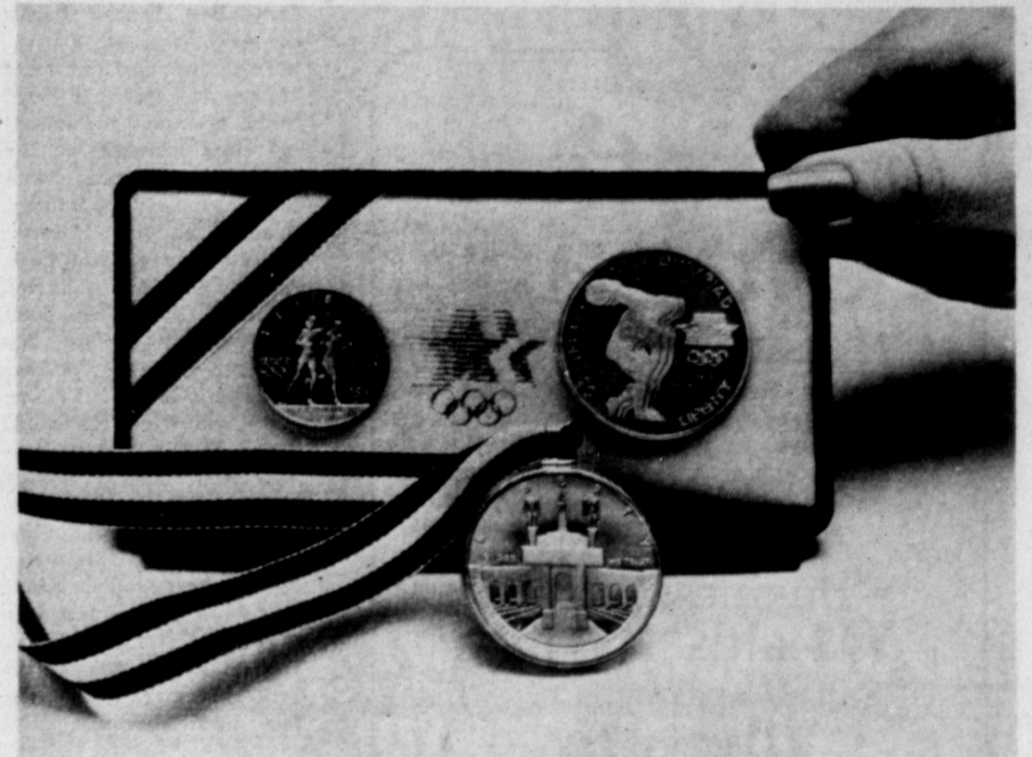

U.S. OLYMPIC COMMEMORATIVE COINS are now available at First Bank and Trust. The U.S. Treasury is minting these gold and silver coins to commemorate and support the Olympic effort. The coins from left to right, are the 1984 \$10 gold piece, the 1984 Olympic silver dollar and the 1983 Olympic silver dollar. Coins can be purchased singularly or in sets.

Olympic coins on sale at First Bank & Trust of Clarendon

Banks and Savings & Loans from rural Broken Bow, Nebraska to downtown Miami and suburban Temple, Texas are working together to raise funds for America's Olympic team. More than 2,000 banks and S&L's have joined the U.S. Treasury Department's Olympic coin consignment program including First Bank & Trust of Clarendon.

The banks are helping the nation's amateur athletes by selling gold and silver Olympic coins (over-the-counter) at almost 6,000 locations from coast to coast.

The public's initial response to the Treasury's first-ever national coin consignment program has been overwhelmingly positive according to Dean Mitchell, Director of the Olympic Coin Program. Mr. Mitchell reports that the Rayne Bank and Trust Co. in Rayne, Louisiana, sold out their first order of gold and silver coins within hours after the shipment arrived. When Linda Brooks at the Rayne Bank called the Treasury to reorder, she told officials "they were gone before we had a chance to advertise their availability."

Two years ago, Congress passed legislation authorizing the production of the gold and silver Olympic coins to commemorate the 1984 Summer Games in Los Angeles and to raise funds for the nation's Olympic effort. Three coins have been struck, 1983 and 1984 Olympic silver dollars and a 1984 gold \$10 coin. The gold piece is the first such coin to be issued by the U.S. Mint in 50 years. Proceeds from the sale of these coins are to be divided between the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee and the U.S. Olympic Committee. To date, the coin program has raised more than \$38.8 million.

The Treasury's decision to go nationwide with the consignment program was a result of a successful marketing test conducted by the Mint early this year with banks in Des Moines, Iowa.

The consignment effort is being supported by national television advertising as well as extensive radio and TV, public service campaigns and

a national public relations effort. Locally, Bronnie McNabb, president of First Bank & Trust of Clarendon, reports that sales of the Olympic

coins are going very well and that the bank will keep an ample supply of both the gold and silver coins available for purchase by area residents.

Moment of Meditation

"Be thankful and bless His name." Psa. 100:4

I read recently of a man who started to pray because he was in a crisis situation. Then he remembered he had scarcely thanked God for all the prayer answers he had already received. He decided he had better offer his sincere thanks for those before he asked God for something else. He began by thanking God for every answered prayer he could remember through his whole lifetime. It took longer than he had expected. Several days passed as he continued his thanksgiving. He noticed he began to be less critical of others and his outlook on life seemed fresher. Day by day he felt a deepening of his spiritual life. He kept this up for three months without asking God for anything new. He vowed it changed his whole life, and surprisingly he noticed his crisis problem

was gradually being worked out. Suppose every person who prays did the same thing for three months. Or suppose whenever we prayed we listed as many "thank you's" as "give me's". It could be an interesting experiment in practical christianity which might surprise us by its results. After all, social custom requires hand written thank you notes for gifts and services received here from mere acquaintances. These notes show whether or not we possess adequate social skills for success. Likewise our expressed thanks for each answered prayer could indicate our progress in faith and spiritual vitality. To pray effectively is not to lump everything under an umbrella sentence such as "thank you for all the blessings", or "bless all the missionaries". Instead, it is taking each answer or person and letting gratitude rise up within us as we think about them. The man taught a good lesson. As it worked for him it will work for anyone who will try it. The Bible says, "Be thankful and bless His name".

Catalytic Converters: State Regulation

The Texas Air Control Board and the Texas Department of Public Safety are currently holding interagency discussions in an effort to reconcile their regulations about catalytic converters on motor vehicles.

The Air Control Board's regulations provide that vehicles intended solely or primarily for use on a farm or ranch are exempted from a general requirement that catalytic converters may not be removed, or made inoperable, unless they are replaced with equally effective emission reduction systems. (Texas Administrative Code, Vol. 31, Sections 114.1(b) and 114.2(a))

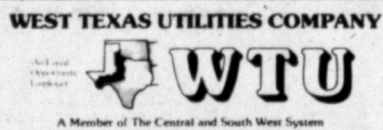

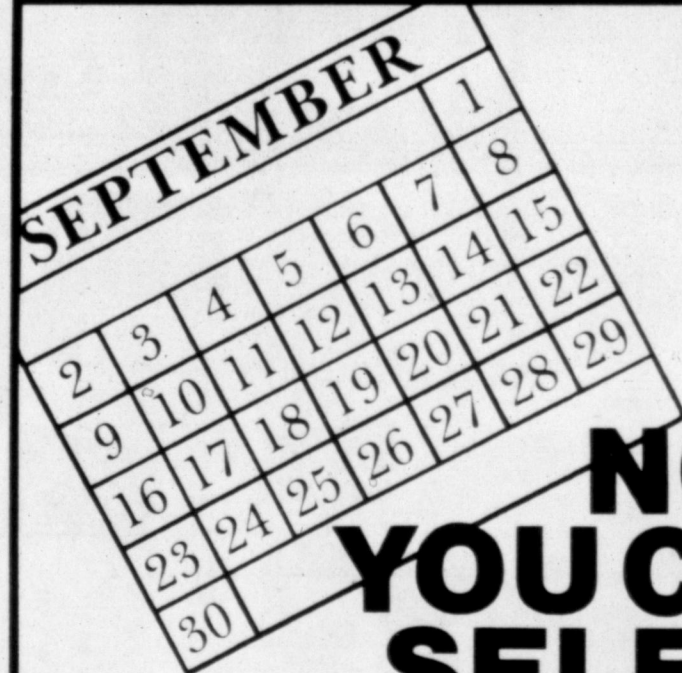

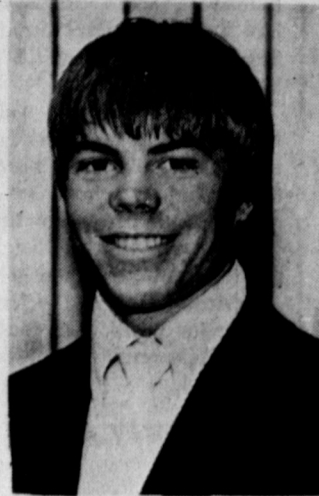

Following the discussion, motion carried to adjourn.

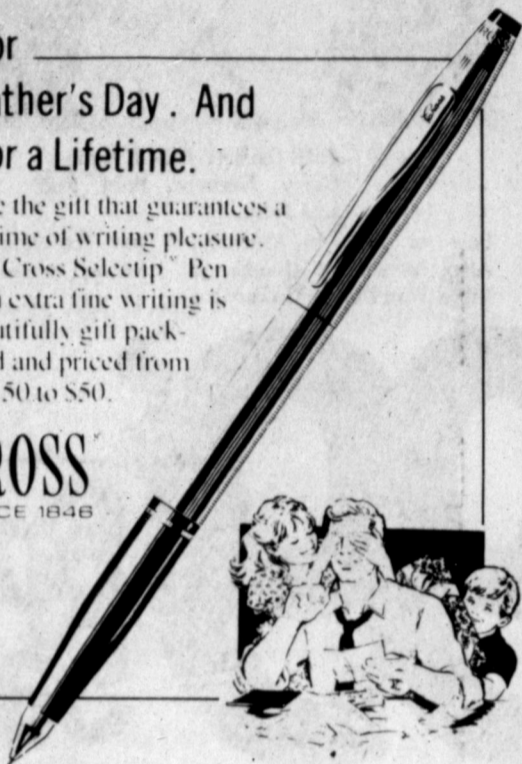

Student Loans Readily Available

Student and parents who have tried unsuccessfully to borrow money for college expenses may be surprised to learn that there is actually an abundance of long-term, low-interest money available for that purpose. The trick is to find a banker interested enough in making such loans to go through the paper work involved.

At least one West Texas banker says his bank is not only interested but is eager to process student loan applications. Jim Bullock, senior vice president and head of the consumer loan department of Texas American Bank of Amarillo says his department is "quite active in making student loans and would like to make even more."

Cooperating with the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Program, he said the bank will lend qualified undergraduate students up to \$2,500 per year and up to \$12,500 total over the course of his or her college years. Graduate students may qualify for as much as \$5,000 per year or up to \$15,000 total in student loans.

No interest is charged on the loans until six months after the borrower ceases to be enrolled as at least a half-time student. Then repayment at 8% interest may be made over five to ten years, depending on the amount borrowed.

The amount of the loan for which a student may qualify depends on the cost of attending college, other financial aid which may be received and the family's financial condition. Determination of the amount of the application are made by the financial aid officer of the college.

Bullock said that once the school completes its part of

the application, the bank routinely processes it and arranges for the disbursement of the cash. The proceeds from the loans can be used at any Texas school, including vocational schools, or by any Texas resident attending an out-of-state school, he said.

Although all Texas banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions may make such loans with the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan

Corporation insuring them against loss, apparently few are agreeable to handling the paper work or to lending money over such a long period of time at low interest rates.

Bullock said it is the policy of Texas American Bank of

Amarillo to participate in such programs as a service to the community. He pointed

out that the bank is an "open-door" lender and that no deposit relationship is required.

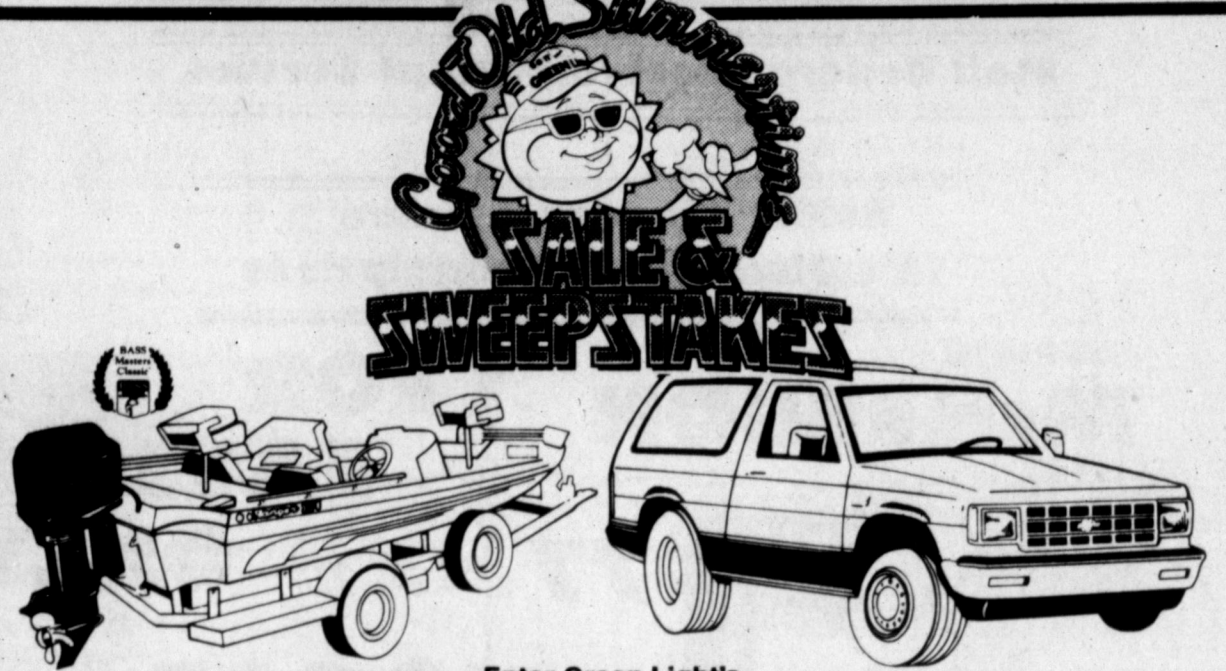
