



for more than six months immediately preceding application for a license Members of the Armed Forces with proof of assignment on active duty at any federal installation within the state for a period of more than 30 days may purchase a resident license.

Hunting license fees include: resident hunting \$5.25; combination hunting and fishing \$8.75; nonresident small game hunting \$37.75; non-resident generalhunting \$100.75. A nonresident small game hunting license will allow out-ofstate hunters to participate during the legal season for. quail, pheasant, and other small game. The nonresident general hunting license will allow out-ofstate hunters to hunt all legal species of game including small game, deer and turkey. Those wishing additional

information may contact the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The game warden currently serving Donley County is Gary Hunt.






