Postmaster urges correct packaging of Christmas mail

"Why take a chance of dampening someone's holiday spirit by sending poorly wrapped Christmas gifts through the mail?" Postmaster Robert McCombs asks.

According to Postmaster McCombs, customers can be more assured that their gifts will arrive in good condition if the following packaging tips are followed.

A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, or expanded plastic foam. If two or more items are in the same carton, cushioning material should protect items from contact

with each other, and each item should have its own individual inner carton.

Fiberboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc. larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shifting of contents in transit. However, breakable items should have at least one inch clearance between the sides of the boxes and the item to provide adequate room for cushioning.

Fiberboard should have "pound test" strength of at least 175. This is usually shown in the box maker's certificate on the bottom of

the box.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

Tape used to close containers should be reinforced and should cover and firmly secure all flaps.

When paper must be used for the outer wrapping it should be at least equal in quality and strength to the draft stock used for grocery bags. However, it is preferable that paper wrappers be omitted if the box itself constitutes an adequate shipping container.

Proper packaging is par-

ticularly important for books and records. Because of their weight, books should be cushioned so they cannot shift within the box. It is not desirable to ship more than 25 lbs of books in one package.

The thin, long-playing records should be placed in a carton which is at least one-fourth of an inch thick.

Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address contained inside is assurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside

address should become lost or obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on the package.

And, finally, address the package correctly and legibly, so that it can be read at two feet. Be sure to include the ZIP code. (Call 874-3353 if you don't know your ZIP code.) Mail with the proper ZIP Code is processed more rapidly. When addressing mail to a foreign country be sure to spell out the country's name in full. Do not abbreviate.

Be sure to put only one mailing address on the outside of the parcel. Do not address more than one side.

Clarendon Post Office has two new employees. Employed here November 7 was Sarah Kennedy. Sarah formerly worked in the Post Office at Lelia Lake. She was employed there three and one-half years as a window clerk. In Clarendon she will handle parcel post items as a postal clerk.

Frances Ivey was employed here November 22. She moved to Clarendon

from Amarillo. This is her first time to work in a post office. Her husband, Granville, is a retired civil service worker.

The local post office employs a total of ten full time workers plus those necessary to serve as substitutes from time to time. Bob McCombs serves as Postmaster. Working with him are Bural Stubbs, Thelma Behrens, Sara Ken-

neddy and Frances Ivey. Jo Ann Kidd is mail carrier for rural route 1. Route 1 is the only rural route under civil service. Clarendon area is served by four star routes. These routes are under contract. Serving as route carrier for Brice Route is Charlie Murff; for Naylor Route, Dalton Swinney, for Palo Duro Route, Alta Adkins, and Jericho Route, Truett Behrens.

Clarendon Post Office is open from 8:00 a.m. til 4:30 p.m. five days a week Monday thru Friday. All first class mail and newspapers are put in boxes everyday regardless of weekends or holidays.

Postmaster McCombs says they are beginning to notice the Christmas rush. He urges everyone to mail early for Christmas.

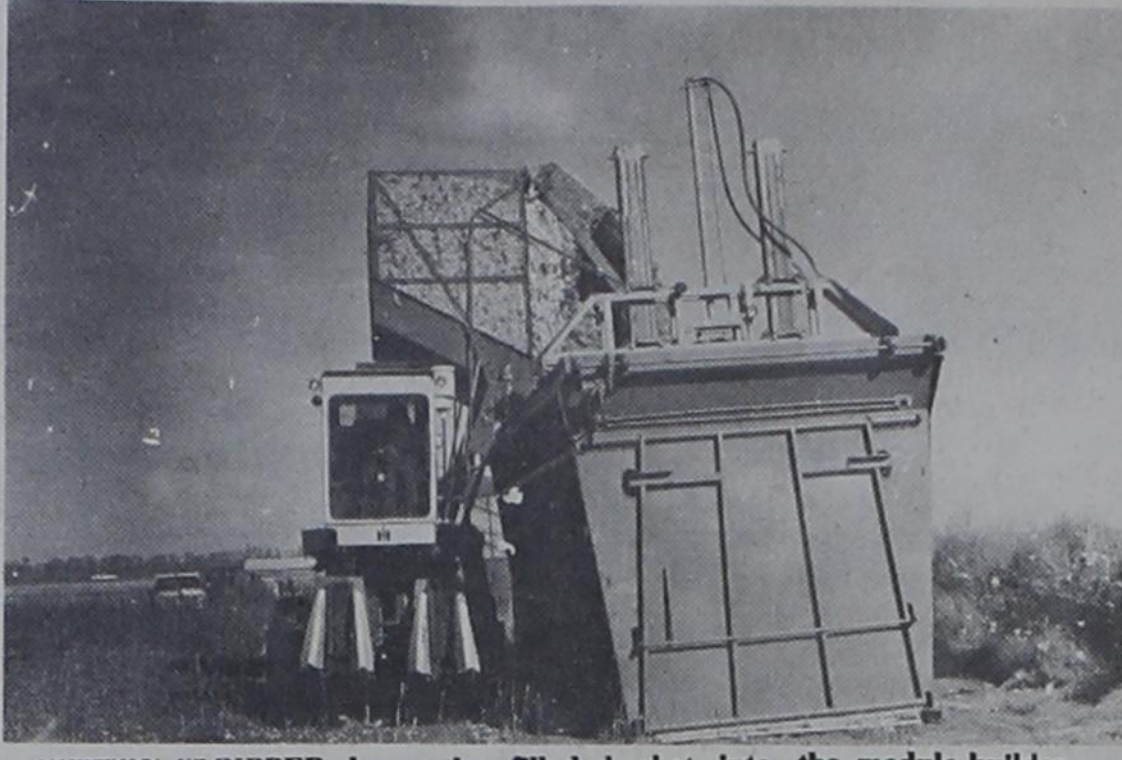

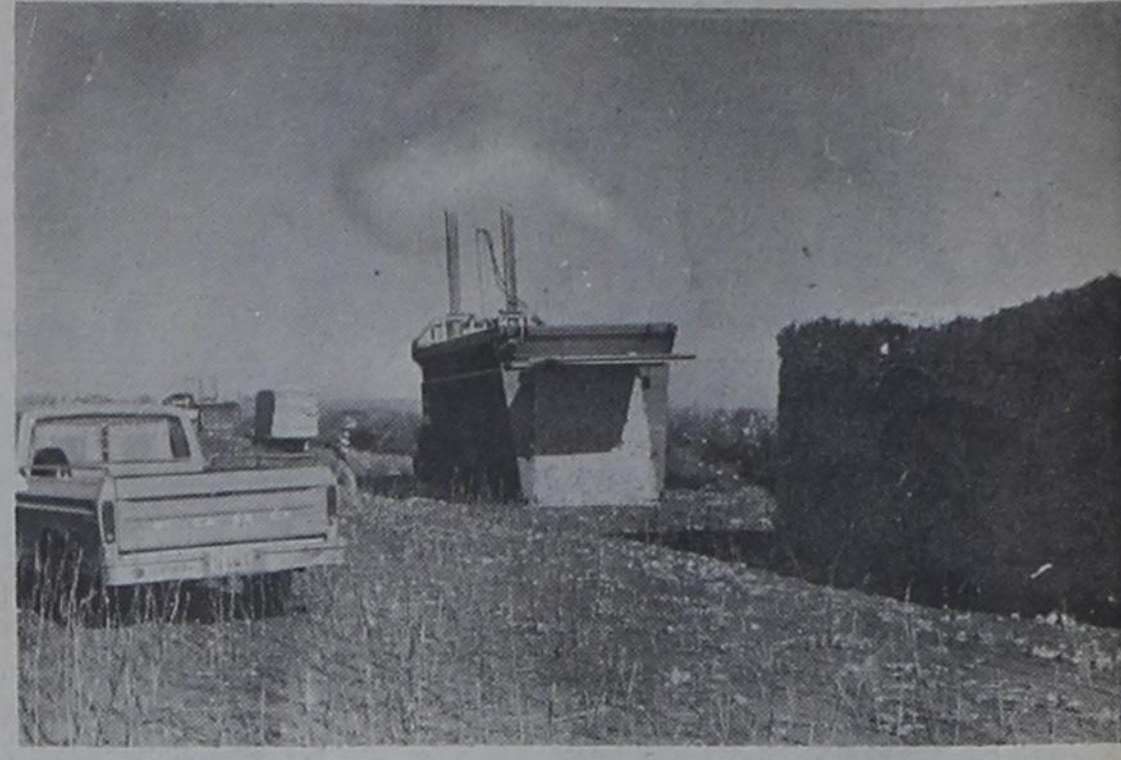

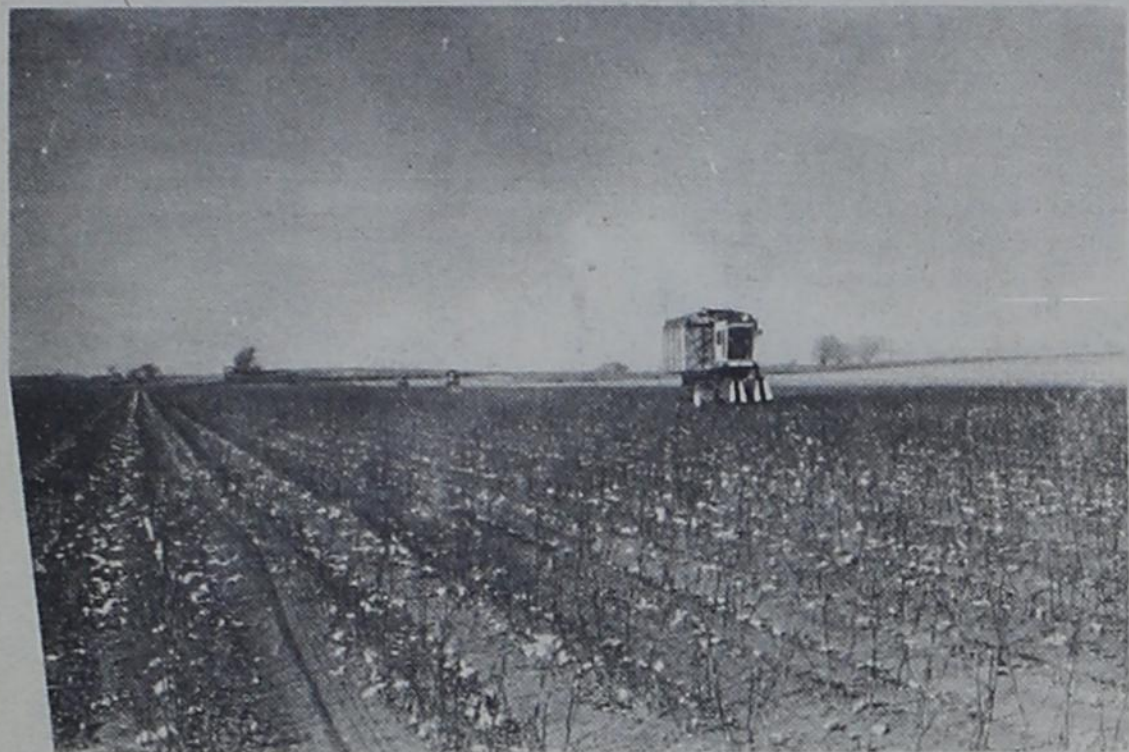
A MODULE builder is the newest innovation in cotton harvesting equipment.

Has cotton pickin' changed?

To see cotton harvested in the most modern fashion this past week all one had to do was travel down Highway 287, four and one-half miles east of Clarendon, to the Fuqua farm, presently farmed by Doyle Hall. On this hundred acre cotton farm, four cotton strippers and two module builders operated by a crew of seven men gathered the total cotton crop in two days. The irrigated place had an average yield of one and one-half bales to the acre. How long would it have taken to harvest this same crop twenty-five years ago?

More and more we are seeing cotton harvest crews using modern equipment sweep across our fields and gather the annual crop. The crew that custom harvested the Fuqua crop was from Lockney. They began harvesting the '77 cotton crop the 4th of August, south of Corpus Christi, and have gradually worked their way back into the Panhandle area over the past several months.

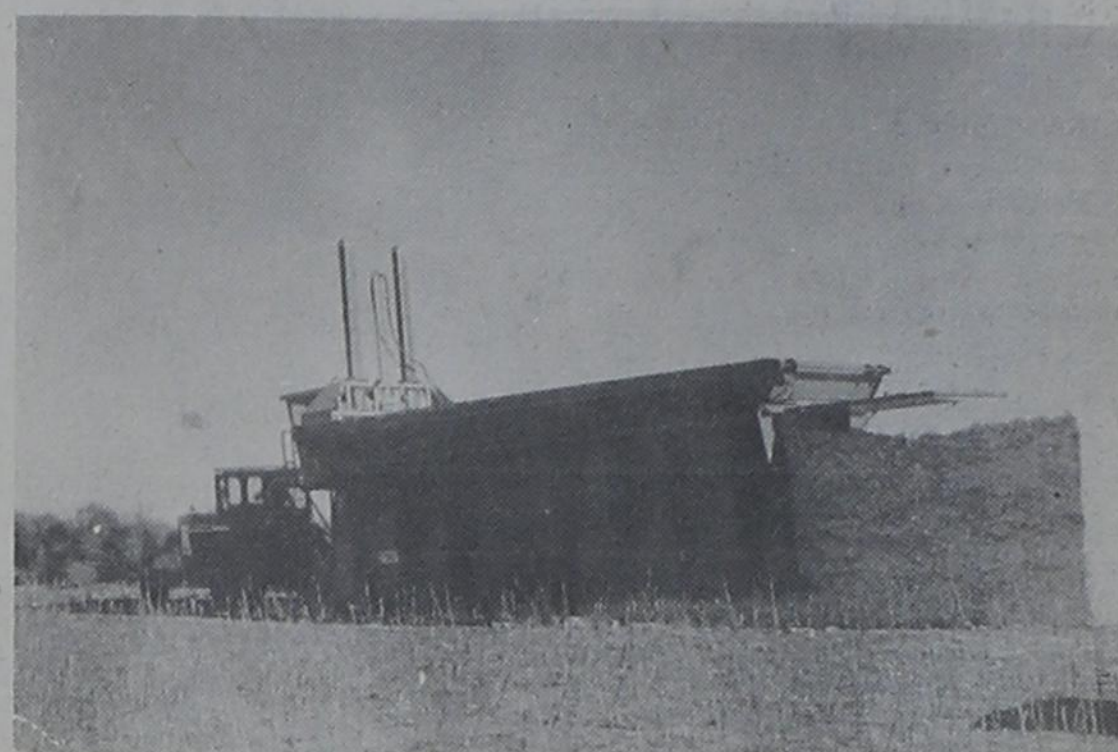
Cotton harvest has gone from dragging a cotton sack to module building. Moduling of cotton in the fields is an innovation in the cotton harvesting industry, which is becoming more common in this area. The new method originated in Louisiana seven years ago, and has been introduced and used in this area about three years. Presently there are six module builders with a crew of twenty-six men in operation in Donley County.

Moduling is a great help to farmers who customarily run short of cotton trailers because each module contains from ten to twelve bales of cotton. On the Fuqua place it took two module builders to keep pace with four cotton

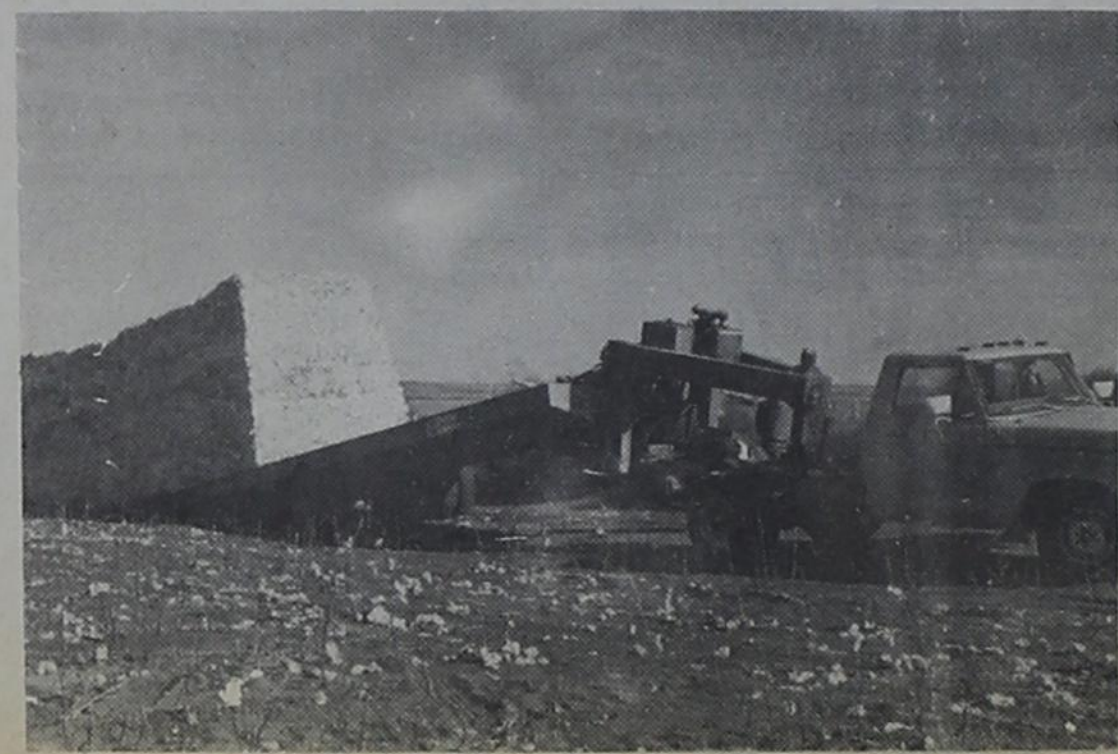
strippers. In comparison, if the module builders had not been used it would have taken fifty to sixty cotton trailers to keep pace with four cotton strippers. The module builder has other advantages too, it eliminates blowouts on trailer tires, a common problem encountered with the use of trailers, also, the cotton is packed tightly enough into the modules that it doesn't absorb rain like it does in trailers; and too, the farmer doesn't have his money tied up in cotton trailers sitting on the gin yards during harvest time. Other advantages are the farmer does not lose cotton in hauling to gins after it has been formed into ricks like he does from trailers, and time is saved in transporting the cotton from fields to gin. Trucks loaded with a rick of cotton can travel at a speed of 40 miles per hour. A charge of about 25 cents per hundred is charged for hauling modules or ricks to the gin. This is \$3.50 per bale or \$35.00 per rick, and is cheaper than the farmer can own, operate, and maintain his own trailers.

Equipment for moduling is quite expensive, but feasible for those who harvest cotton on large acreages producing heavy yields. A module builder sells for \$18,000 to \$20,000 and trucks and trailers for hauling the ricks to the gin cost from \$28,000 for trailers to \$64,000 for the big trucks.

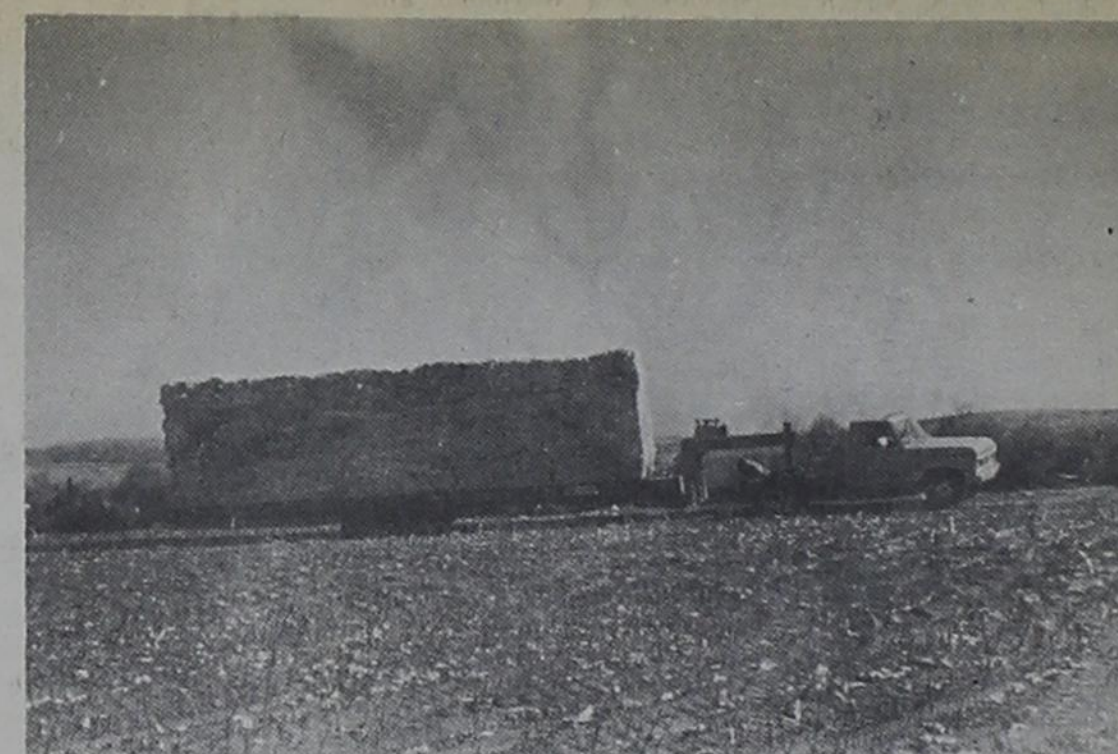
Most cotton yields are reported good in Donley County for the '77 cotton harvest, and the use of modern technology in the form of module building, and favorable weather conditions during harvest time, have facilitated much in this year's harvest.

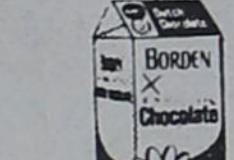

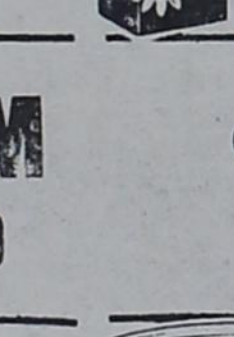

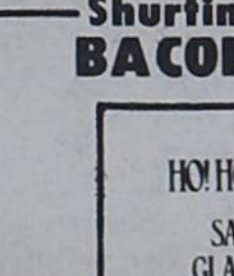

a parsonage have been constructed to further meet the needs of the church.

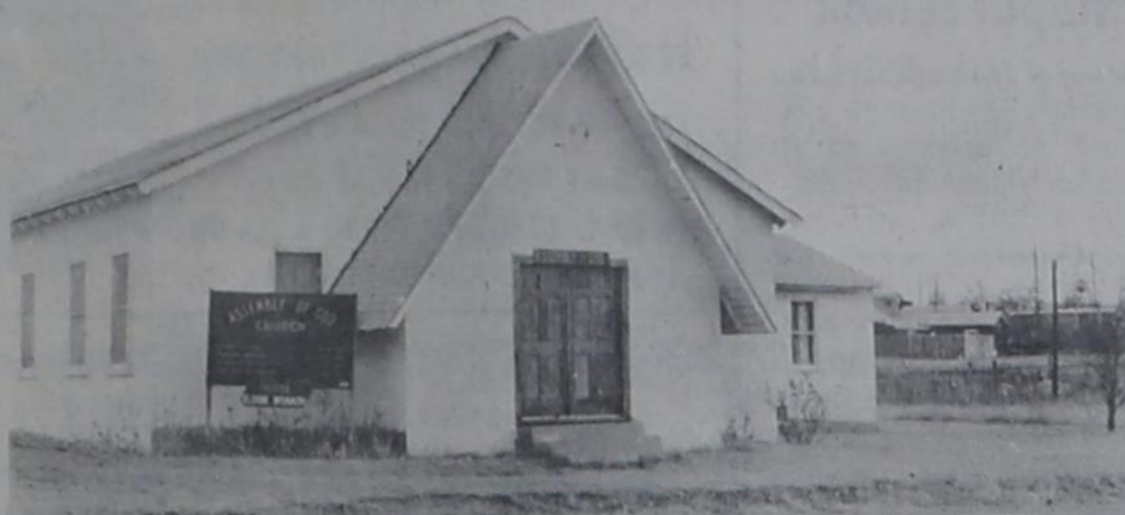

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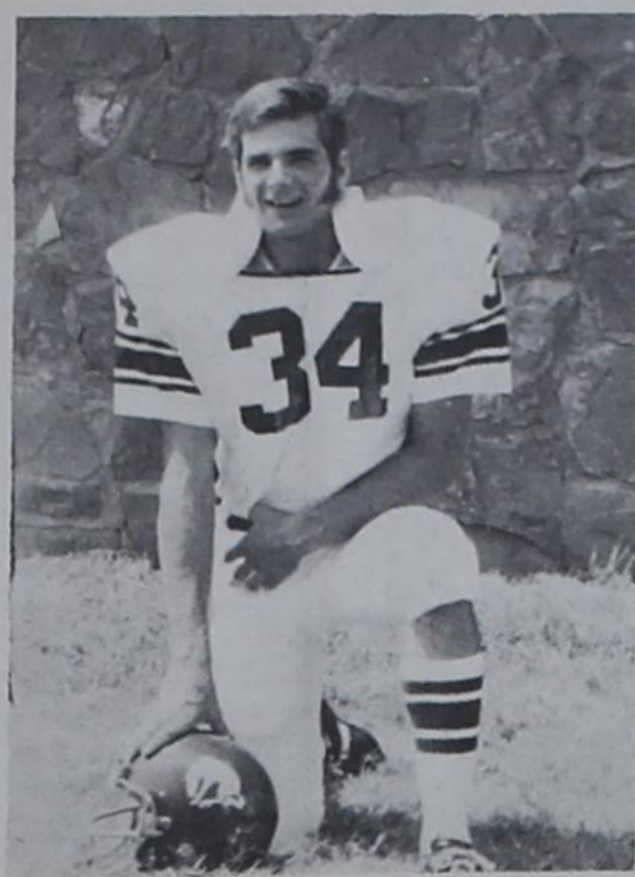

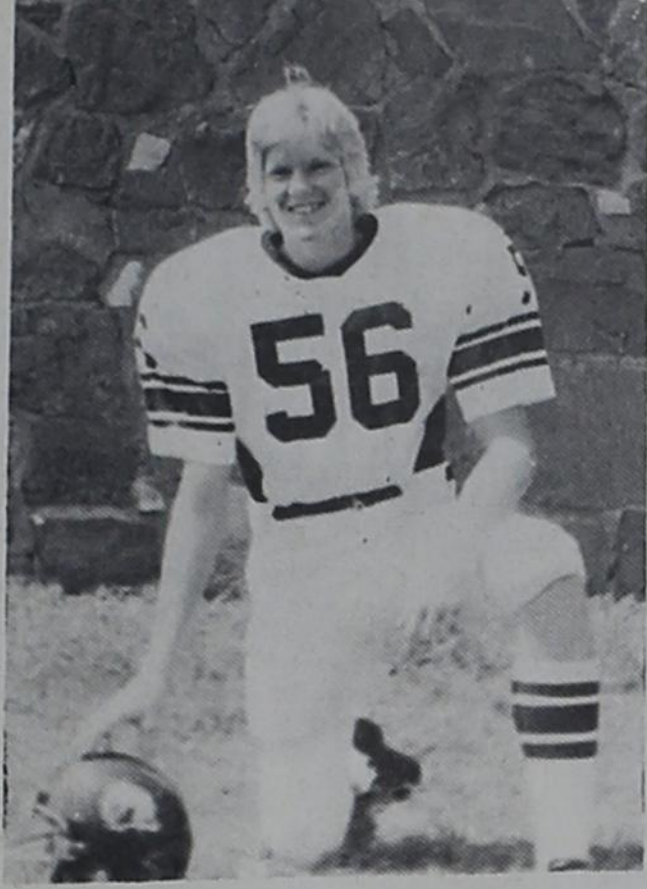

CHRISTMAS TREE INDUSTRY IS BIG

In the United States, the cutting and selling of Christmas trees has become a big business. Americans spend several millions of dollars to buy between five and ten million trees each Christmas. About half of these trees come from Canadian forests. The most popular tree is the balsam fir, because of its shape and because its needles do not drop fast. Other trees used are canyon cedars (a juniper species), Scotch pine, Douglas fir, blue spruce, and lodge-pole pine. Trees vary in height between five and thirty-five feet. They are usually cut in several sizes. Christmas tree cutting can be harmful to forests and to our cedar-studded canyons. To eliminate the waste often created by tree cutting it is well to consider purchasing a potted living tree. The price paid for a living tree in years to come will repay the purchase price many times over through the enjoyment and beauty they afford. Cut-trees often hardly last through the Christmas holiday before they dry and lose their needles never to be enjoyed again.
