Hung jury causes mistrial

Failure of the jury to reach a decision resulted in a mistrial here in the State's case against Evert Johnson, former Armstrong County Sheriff.

Johnson was being tried for alleged theft of feed from J.A. Ranch property of over \$200 and less than \$10,000.

Selection of the jury was completed on Tuesday and testimony began on Wednesday.

The jury received the case about 10:30 Thursday a.m. and deliberation resulted in the deadlock after four and a half hours. At that time a mistrial was declared by Judge Montgomery.

The jury had exhausted attempts to come to a decision, and remained deadlocked at 8 for conviction as charged and 4 against the conviction.

Farm theft investigated

Theft of 20 pigs from the farm of R.L. Tolbert was reported to the sheriff's office Tuesday, October 4 by the owner.

The white feeder pigs were valued at approximately \$600 and were taken from pens on the Tolbert farm about six miles of Clarendon on Highway 287.

Discovery of the missing livestock was made when the Tolbert's returned home from a trip to Lubbock.

At this time the sheriff's office has little to report on the progress of the investigation.

Fire prevention week set Oct. 9 - 15th

Fires cause the death of more than 10,000 persons every year in the United States. They destroy more than \$300,000,000 worth of property. For these reasons it is more important to keep fires from starting than to develop means of putting them out. According to Fire Marshal Clyde Price about half of all fires are caused by carelessness or lack of common sense. One out of ten is caused by cigarettes, matches and other smoking materials.

Each year the President of the United States designates the week of October 9 as Fire Prevention Week. Members

of the Clarendon Fire Department emphasize that fire prevention should be carried on by the individual, the family and the community. During Fire Prevention Week each person is urged to examine his own home both inside and out, and to make it safe from fire. A house should be kept orderly and neat both inside and out. Rubbish should never be left lying about. Oily or paint stained rags and clothing must not be put away in closets or attics where they may burst into flame through spontaneous combustion. Such rags should be cleaned, kept in

airtight metal containers or destroyed.

Faulty heating and lighting equipment are frequent causes of fire. All chimneys, pipes and wiring should be inspected regularly to make sure they are in good condition. Inflammable liquids like kerosene or gasoline should be used with care for any other household purpose. Matches should be kept out of the reach of small children. Pennies should not be used in fuse boxes instead of fuses. Loosers, electric irons and other electrical appliances should be disconnected when they are not being used. An electrical

outlet must not be overloaded with too many electrical devices. Children's sleepwear should be treated with a flame retardant. Fireplaces must be kept well screened to prevent danger from flying embers. Lint screens on clothes dryers should be kept clean.

Campers must be careful to put out campfires. These are some of the ways people can take precautions against fire. The Clarendon Fire Department urges everyone to do what they can to prevent fires. Fire Marshal Price reminds all the best way to fight fire is to prevent it.

The Rev. Pettigrew Hamilton, chairman, announces the new leaders for the drive. Vice Chairman Allen Estlack of West Texas Utilities, will

organize the drive. Cynthia Manning, the Donley County Home Demonstration Agent, will be recruiting volunteers to help man the drive, and Cloe Ann Newhouse will be looking for professional volunteers, nurses, nurses' aids, student nurses, etc.

Strike plans outlined to farmers

Wednesday evening a large crowd of farmers and interested citizens lined out at Clarendon high school cafeteria for a meeting concerning an agriculture strike. Jerry Wright of Springfield, Colorado, who initiated the idea for a farm strike in all America was present and presented his plans and reasons for negotiating such a strike.

Wright pointed out the cost of living, and operating costs have gone up with inflation, but farm products have gone down. He said, today's farmers are getting the lowest pricing since 1933, and farmers are the lowest parity victims in any industry. Wright continued by saying farmers tend to underestimate what they can do, but that the future of the American farmer depends upon immediate action. Wright said, "One of four farmers today are in serious economic condition, and this year alone 23% of American farmers will be forced to give up their farms because under existing programs in Washington farmers cannot meet the cost of production." He went on to say if some action isn't taken immediately, if farmers don't join together so their voice can be heard in Washington and by the world, then the American family farm faces possible extinction!

In the strike plan farmers are demanding 1-100% of parity for all domestically used or consumed agricultural produce, 100% of parity for all foreign exports of agricultural produce, 3- All agricultural products produced for national and international food reserve shall be contracted by any or all governments at 100% of parity, 4- Creation of an entity or structure with inputs from farmers to handle marketing of American Agricultural products at 100% of parity, 5- Meat and livestock imports must be stopped until parity prices are reached.

If these demands are not met by midnight Dec. 13,

1977 then the strike will go into effect. Wright urged farmers to implement these measures: 1- Not to sell any farm products, 2- Not to produce any more agricultural products, 3- Not to buy any agriculture equipment, production supplies, or non-essential products.

strike is the result of desperation felt by farmers. He urged everyone present to support the effort, to make the plan a total success, and to strike with the same dedication that has been employed in making this the greatest food producing

Hamilton states that in the last six months at least thirty Donley County residents have taken advantage of this free volunteer blood program. "Most of the blood drawn at the last Blood mobile has been used by Donley County residents," Hamilton said. "We need 120 good people to give 90 units of blood this coming blood drive in order to keep us in the Red Cross Blood Program," Hamilton said.

The Blood Program requires 90 units of blood twice a year to provide blood for all the residents of Donley County for the year.

A Donley County resident needing to replace blood used at a hospital needs to contact the blood chairman, the Rev. Pettigrew Hamilton, and he will see that the blood is replaced.

"The Red Cross Blood Program is designed to make available the kind and amount of blood to meet any individual need or national crisis," Hamilton stated.

Blood on the open market, not including the processing fee, may cost between \$40.00 and \$120.00 a unit. Red Cross blood is free. The only cost that comes with Red Cross blood is the processing fee, which is about \$25.00 a unit.

More money needed

The rest of the game was primarily a defensive game.

The second half the Bronchos gained 161 yards for 7 first downs and they made two penetrations, but they just couldn't make the points needed to win. They allowed the Indians only 77 yards total offense. The second half the Indians made only 3 first downs and they did not penetrate the Broncho 20 in the second half.

The Bronchos and the Indians now hold identical season records of 2 wins and 4 losses. The Bronchos are fired up and ready to beat the Mustangs this Friday at Claude. Game time is 7:30.

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Pesticide Workshop slated

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First Presbyterian Church organized 1899

In 1899 the First Presbyterian Church of Clarendon was organized. Some of the charter members of the church were W. H. Cooke and family, George H. Morgan and family, George Smith and family, John Hoffer and family, Bob Muirs and family, Rev. Erwin and wife, Mrs. Bob Woods, Miss Fannie Driscoll, and others.

The church met first in the County Courthouse for a place of worship with Rev. W. P. Dickey serving the congregation as the first pastor. In Dec. 1899 a small frame church building was completed. The church was located on Kearney St. where the City Drug building is presently located. In 1901 Miss Sarah Edna Smith married Mr. William McElreath Montgomery. They were the first couple to be married in the little frame church. Sarah Edna Smith was the daughter of G. W.

Smith, one of the charter members of the church. Sarah Edna Smith and William Montgomery were the parents of Edna Montgomery Smith, who is a faithful member of the church's congregation today.

The church on Kearney Street was flooded on several occasions being located near the banks of Clarendon Creek, so in 1929 the congregation moved its church location to the corner of Fourth and Park. Funds raised by the Women's auxiliary were used to purchase the lot. In 1929 the building presently used by the church was erected.

Through the years the church has been served by many faithful and dedicated ministers. Today, the church is served by Rev. Owen McGarity. He also serves the Memphis church, and the two-county combination, Donley and Hall, composes the St. Andrew's Area

Ministry. In 1972 the Northern and Southern Presbyterian churches combined to form a Union Presbyterian Church U.S.A. Officers of the Clarendon church today are: Elders: Lee Bell, K.M. Windom, Trey Chamberlain, H.L. Shaller, Wilson Maxey and Edna Smith. Treasurer: Joe Lovell. Memorials Committee: Annje Mae Lumpkin, Gladys Blackburn, Lee Bell, Trey Chamberlain, Mike McCully, Diane Chamberlain, Edna Smith, Ernest Kent, and Tommy McGowan. Organist: Judy McCully.





FmHA extends farm loan deadline

The U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has extended to Dec. 2 the deadline for farmers in Donley County to apply for farm emergency loans to cover any losses caused by drought.

The agency's county supervisor, Robert A. Keown, said the extension has been ordered by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland for applications under drought designations that would expire before Dec. 2, provided the designations are based on disasters that have occurred on or after July 1, 1976. The Secretary's action was taken under requirements of recent emergency loan legislation (PL 95-89) signed by President Carter.

Farmers lacking other sources of necessary credit may apply to FmHA for loans to offset losses caused by drought or revive farming operations. Under the schedule of interest rates as revised by PL 95-89, loans are made at a rate of 3 percent on the first \$250,000 borrowed against actual loss, 5 percent for additional amounts offsetting actual loss, and 8 percent for loans not based on loss but needed

Mr. Keown said extension of earlier deadlines will give farmers whose crop returns are determined late in the year a better opportunity to assess their losses and credit needs, and enable FmHA to speed completion of work on applications now pending that need immediate processing.

FmHA emergency loan applications for farmers in Donley County are received at the agency's county office located in the Agriculture Building in Clarendon, where Mr. Keown's office period is from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. each Friday afternoon.
